Lovers of beautiful horses will note with pleasure the growth of the interest in the great international horse show at Olympia, which exceeds even the ardent dreams of the organizers. By June 7 London will see the best horses of the world. Stabling will have to be found for over 1,000 horses outside Olympia.

Excitement about the show is expressed in scores of cablegrams from all over the world. The Canadian Government is making an official grant so that their horses may be worthly represented. The Ministers for War in Belgium and France have given special leave to officers to wear uniform in the riding and jumping competitions, and very attractive some of the light blue uniforms will look. A number of fine jumpers and harness horses are arriving from Spain and Belgium. From Paris, M. Roy, one of the most famous dealers in the world, is sending sixteen carriage horses; and M. Thome, the millionaire known for his incomparable "turn outs" to every Parisian, has entered many singles and pairs.

The American and Canadian entries are not yet complete. But besides Mr. Vanderbilt's troupe of twenty-seven, Mr. Armour is sending his six splendid greys, which are the champion draught—not, as has been said, park—lorses of America, and they will be conspicuous by the electric lights that are fitted into their harness. They will compete with the splendid teams owned especially by English brewers, of whom Mr. Watney's will be incompared even apart from the international element, the show will be incom-

But even apart from the international element, the show will be incomparably the finest and most representative collection of English and Irish horses ever seen anywhere. Hundreds cannot get employment; and, as for the fruit in the King Country, there is no market for same. The railage and freight takes away all the profits. I know several instances that have come under my notice as an agent. In one case a farmer sent 160 bags of potatoes from a country district. He had to leart them seven miles to the nearest railway station, pay rail charges and commission, and the only return he got was £1, which did not pay for the seed, and I could not ask any commission. Fruit in a country district near Dunedin is left to rot on the trees, as it would not pay to send by rail, the charges being too high. If you allow the people to come to New Zealand (they will come on a fool's errand) they will be stranded; hundreds would go back if they had the money. This is not a country for anyone to come to nnless they have £300 or over. By the time they look around, get a place, plant it, and reap the harvest it would take double the money before it was their own.

From the Dim Past.

There have just been placed on exhibition in the Egyptian galleries of the British Museum a select few of the Egyptian inscriptions recently discovered in the Sinaitic peninsula. One of the most interesting is a sandstone stele and altar set up by Sebekher-heb, an overseer of the Royal apartments, and a subordinate official named Kemen, who were attached to the Royal Chancery. The tablet, which is dated in the forty-fourth year of Amenen-hat III., about B. C. 2300., is of red sandstone; and contains an inscription in which a prayer is offered to Athor, the "lady of the truquoise land," by which name the Sinaitic peninsula was known to the Ancient Egyptians. There is also the Ancient Egyptians. There is also the James and the lower portion of a statue of Usertesen II., B. O. 2333, dedicated to Hathor by the King's officials stationed in Sinai, and the lower portion of a seated figure of Hathor, dedicated to the goddess of Senefru, a captain of the boats in the reign of Amenemhat II. The objects were discovered at Serabit-el-Kadim, in the Sinaitic peninsula, and were presented to the British Museum by the Egypt Exploration Fund.

There exists a stone which, it is said, unfailingly foretells the changes in the weather. The stone was found in Finland many years ago by an explorer and has since been watched by scientists with great interest. It presents s white, mottled appearance in sunshine, gradually turning from gray to black as a rainstorm approaches. The stone is composed of clay, niter and rock salt. In dry weather the salt in the stone is prominent, but when the air is filled with moisture the salt absorbs the moisture and turns black, thus forming the barometer. J. N. Wallace, D. L. S., who left
Prince Albert in May, 1906, to survey
the fourteenth baseline running north
of township 52 and who returned to
Prince Albert at the end of tht following March after about eight
months in the north. Interviewed by
an Advocate reporter, Mr. Wallace
said his party experienced considerable difficulty through large muskegs
in the summer and deep snows in winter, and of the fourteen pack ponies
with which he started out only five
survived. He found several considerable errors in the oursten pack ponies

survived. He found several considerable errors in the unsurveyed territory
as shown on existing maps, and in
one case this got him out of a serious difficulty.

Shortly before the freeze-up he was,
according to the old maps, about 25
miles from the Hudson Bay post at
Pasquia Mountains and 23 from Birch
Island. The nearest food supply was
at the post, and there was no fodder
nearer than a cache on Birch Island.
The camp was reduced to such straits
that to go for food meant the starvation of the horses, and to return for
fodder a similar fate for the men. Mr.
Wallace decided to sacrifice the horses
and started out for the Hudson Bay
post, which he suddenly came upon in
township 52, range 7, instead of in 53,
range 4, as he had expected. The
post being 16 miles nearer than was
known saved a journey of 30 miles,
and Birch Island was reached in time
to save the horses. Indian Reserve
29A is close to the post and is on the
maps shown 16 miles east of its true
position.

After running the 14th baseline from the third to the second meridian, Mr. Wallace went north to the Carrot river and ran the meridian from there to the Saskatchewan, a distance of only about 16 miles. He made the return trip to Prince Albert almost in a straight line, via Fort la Corne, his pack ponies traveling 160 miles in nine days.

Mr. Wallace passed through large forests of spruce and tamarack on the

Mr. Wallace passed through large forests of spruce and tamarack on the line and he states that he found the Pasquia Mountains to be 1,500 feet high. During the whole period of abscence the party only lost two weeks' time. There was a good deal of excellent agricultural land seen about Birch Lake and on the Candle Lake trail.

Ancient Counterfeiters.

It is difficult to think of counterfeiters in connection with the golden days of Charles I., but a recent discovery of old coins in the well which is being excavated in the ruins of Scarborough Castle, England, seems to prove that they not only existed at that time, but were frequently in danger from the officers of the law.

The find in question consisted of a large mass of copper or brass strips, two of which coins had been punched, together with a number of imperfectly struck coins. The discovery took place at a distance of 130 feet from the surface of the ground.

H. A. Grueber, the keeper of the coins at the British Museum, to whom a portion of the find was sent, pronounced them to be incompleted farthings of the reign of Charles I. issued between 1826 and 1830. It appears that the right to issue these coins was granted by King Charles to the Dowager Duchess of Richmond and Sir Francis Crane, who no doubt made a considerable profit on the monopoly. The result of this monopoly seems to have been that extensive forgeries took place, and the British Museum's expert is of opinion that the coins found during the excavations at Scarborough Castle are forgeries struck at the time, and that in all probability they were thrown down the well to escape detection.

Chicage, June 10.—Twenty-nine known dead and forty persons injured constitute the list of casualties resulting from storms of wind and rain which swept over Southern Illinois and Indiana and Central Kentucky Saturday night and yesterday. These fatal visitations came in the shape of cloudbursts, high winds and electrical disturbances. The property damage is many thousands of dollars. Houses were swept away, bridges demolished and thousands of acres of growing crops destroyed.

The disaster was due to the erratic behavior of Big Creek, which was already swollen by recent rains. When the cloudburst precipitated 6 inches of rain in an hour on Gradyville and vicinity, the creek took a new course, with the force of a tidal wave.

Inhabitants of Gradyville were nearly all in bed when the foaming waters struck the town carrying away six residences, a mill and a number of small houses. Nearly all the victims were drowned, but four were crushed by the collapse of dwellings.

Gradyville is a village of 175 inhabitants in Adair County, six miles from Columbia, and 187 miles from the nearest railroad station.





Medicine In Ancient Egypt. There is much evidence in inscriptions and manuscripts that the ancient Egyptians practiced medicine and surgery extensively. Probably their practice was based on little knowledge of anatomy. Each physician treated only one or two diseases. The sick were exposed in public places so that others who had suffered similarly might tell them of helpful remedies. Diseases of the eye were best understood and received both medical and surgical treatment. The most important medical manuscript found in Egypt is the Uapyrus Ebers, written 3000 B. C. and discovered in Memphis. Disease, according to the Egyptians, was due to the anger of some deity, the result of the triumph of evil in its struggle with good, an idea which is still very general throughout Africa and Asia and which at some time has been prevalent in modified forms in almost every race.

Two men had stolen two steers and sold them to a butcher in the town for the extremely low price of \$37.





Defense Will Try to Shift Responsibility For Awful Crimes

Orchard Keeps Cool on the Stand-A Horrible Tale of Atrocities

Boise, Idaho, June 10.—The cross-examination of Harry Orchard, by his own confession the slayer of eighteen men with bullet and bomb, is likely to last through Monday and Tuesday of next week, possibly longer. Orchard has now been on the stand for 14 hours. The state had him in hand for nearly eight hours. In that time he told a horrible tale of crime during the last eleven years of his life.

Orchard spared no incident under questioning by the state, which might prove to the jury his readiness to slaughter for low pay and his utter indifference as to the number or condition of his victims.

Under cross-examination by E. F. Richardson, counsel for W. D. Haywood, Orchard has so far described the series of tragedies prior to the year 1904. Three more years and may murders are yet to be analyzed. For purposes of its own, not so far revealed, the defence is determined that Orchard shall relate in his testimony the most diabolical or the most squalid detail. Slowly but surely the defence is developing the lines by which it hopes to break down Orchard's testimony, so far as it affects Haywood. If it is possible to heap further obliquy on the witness, they have done so by proving him capable of petty crimes.

No Crime Too Low.

By his own admission, Orchard is a bigamist, a thief, a liar and an incendiary; he has been treacherous to his employers; he has deserted two wives, and his children. All of these offences he has been forced to confess, but notwithstanding a gruelling examination by Mr. Richardson he has stuck stubbornly to his story.

By its questions the defence has plainly indicated its intention of proving that Orchard was the hired agent of the mine owners, who, harrassed by the Western Federation of Miners, and determined to wipe out union labor at the Idaho and Colorado mines, planned assassinations, train wrecking and mine explosions which could be laid to the federation and

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continuous and the penitentiary says that Orchard shows no sign of nervousness or strain. He eats well, and speaks without particular emotion of the events of the day.

One of the interesting features of yesterday's examination was that Orchard aids his first wife, whom he deserted in Canada in 1895 to run away with another man's wife. He testified that since imprisoned he sold a locket and chain and other objects for something like \$115, the greater part of which he had sent to his wife. The objects, beside the locket and chain, were a fishing-rod, a gun, a revolver, and some little things. He said that the warden disposed of these for him, with the understanding that the person buying them could have them "after the trial."
