To His Excellency the Governor-General.

THE PETITION of the UNDERSIGNED Masters, Mates, and Seamen, who were heretofore engaged on British sealing vessels engaged in sealing voyages in the North Pacific Ocean and Beiring Sea

HUMBLY SHEWETH:

1. Your Petitioners have all for several years past been engaged in the occupation of sealing, either as Masters, Mates, Hunters or Seamen. The particulars of the employment of each of Your Petitioners will appear in the accounts of their sealing transactions, which are contained in the appendix hereto.

2. Appended hereto is a statement showing the years in which Your Petitioners were employed in the sealing business, the capacity in which they were so employed, and the amount of money earned by each of them in such employment.

3. Your Petitioners beg leave to refer Your Excellency to a Petition presented to Your Excellency by a large number of the owners of sealing schooners engaged in sealing in the said seas, and to ask that the facts therein stated may be considered as if contained in this Memorial.

4. By that Memorial it was contended on behalf of the owners of the sealing schooners that if further restrictions were imposed upon sealing operations, or if sealing operations were absolutely prohibited, compensation should be paid to them, sufficient to provide for payment of the capital actually invested as well as to cover losses sustained by the Sealers in consequence of restrictions already imposed, as well as those which may hereafter be imposed.

5. Your Petitioners desire to point out that they each and all have for years made sealing their chief employment, that they have devoted their whole attention to becoming expert in the prosecution of that business, and that if further restrictions are placed on the industry, or if it should be entirely stopped, their chief means of livelihood would be taken from them and they would find themselves compelled to engage in other occupations for which many of them have no special training.

6. Your Petitioners contend, and most respectfully submit, that it would be unfair toward them, and against the best interest of this part of Canada, that any further restrictions should be placed upon sealing, and they desire most respectfully to ask Your Excellency on their behalf to protest against any further restrictions being so imposed.



7. If, however, circumstances should occur of such a nature as to render it expedient that further changes should be made, and that they should be prevented either by restrictions or absolute prohibition from carrying on their trade in as full a manner as they have heretofore been able to do, Your Petitioners submit that they should receive compensation for the loss which they most undoubtedly will sustain.

8. Your Petitioners would point out that it is in line with precedents always acted upon by the British Parliament, that whenever the trade or property of one set of individuals has been injuriously affected by a public act for the benefit of the nation, full compensation should be given to the persons so injuriously affected, and that this principle applies to the present case.


9. They further submit that they who were engaged in the practical part of seal hunting are entitled to such compensation equally as well as those who happen to own ships engaged in that business. All the arguments that can be used and have been used in favor of granting compensation to the owners of vessels apply, it is submitted, with equal force to our case.

10. In addition to ourselves there are other men who stand in the same position as we do. We will respectfully ask Your Excellency that steps may be taken to enquire into the claim put forward by Your Memorialists, and further that if this question should be one brought up for the consideration of the International Conference now sitting, that the facts of the case presented by Your Memorialists may be brought before that Conference for consideration, so that in case a question of compensation may arise between the Government of Great Britain and the United States, the claim of Your Memorialists may not be overlooked. And in any case, whether the matter is raised before the Conference or not, that Your Excellency may take steps for the obtaining of compensation for Your Memorialists, either from the Canadian Government or the Government of Great Britain.

11. The annexed table showing the earnings made by Your Memorialists while engaged in the said sealing operations will serve as a basis upon which compensation might fairly be calculated.


