"As the result of operations Sat-urday night and Sunday morning we are now in complete possession of Turkish first and second lines southwest of Kut-el-Amara, on the right bank of the Tigris, on a fronti of 4,300 yards. We also hold the enemy's third and fourth lines on a frontage of 600 yards. "Turkish dead to the number of 950 already have been counted and collected. More remain to be count-

ed. Prisoners aggregating 127 were taken, together with one gun, one maxim, three trench mortars and a quantity of other material."
