Here and There

48,000,000 bushels of grain awaited the opening of navigation at Fort William and Port Arthur this spring.

Flood conditions in New Bruns-wick and Maine this spring were the worst since 1887.

Damage to Canadian Pacific property in Western Canada by floods this spring amounted to approximately \$200,000.

Calgary is the leading telephone city on the continent with one instrument to every 4.10 persons. The phones in this city are automatic.

The per capita debt of Canada is approximately \$165, as compared with \$230 for the United States, \$750 for Great Britain, \$850 for France and \$250 for Australia.

Canadian Pacific steamers "Mar-loch" and "Metagama" decked at St. John with over 600 Hebridean im-migrants to Red Deer, Alberta, and various parts of Ontario.

The 1923 camp of the Alpine Club of Canada will be pitched in Larch Valley, near Moraine Lake, nine miles from Lake Louise in the Cana-dian Pacific Rockies.

Travelling 572 knots in twenty-four hours, an average of from 23 to 24 knots per hour, the Canadian Pacific liner "Empress of Canada" recently established a record for commercial vessels on the Pacific.

The last link in the great 6,500 mile scenic tour through Western Canada and the United States will be thrown open to traffic on June 30th when the Banff-Windermere Motor Highway will be officially opened.

A car of timothy and grass seed arrived in Vancouver via Canada Pacific Railway from Toronto ten days after an order had been wired to the Ontario Capital. This constitutes a record in service.

In architectural style the new Basilica at St. Anne de Beaupre will be a combination of the Roman and the Gothic. The steeples in front will be 225 feet high and including those in the chapels the new Basilica will contain twenty-six altars.

The honor of running the first ship into Montreal harbor from the ocean fell this year to Captain Edmund Aikman, commander of the Canadian Pacific steamer "Boling-broke," a freighter. The "Montrose" of the same line was the first vessel to carry trans-Atlantic passengers into the port in 1923.

Topping the grain shipments from St. John of the 1921-22 winter season by almost four million bushels and establishing a record for the port for volume in a single shipment for one vessel, the 1922-23 grain business through the Canadian Pacific elevators up to May 1st totalled 15,249,261 bushels. 

Practical Instructions on Runing This Useful Machine.

Give the Cutting Bar and Steel Plate Attention—Keep the Knife Sharp —Go Over the Machine Daily—

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

This machine has given splendid service to the farmers of the past and present generations. Fifty years ago the mower was a perfected machine, and the improvements since that date have not been of a revolutionary

nature. Watch the Cutting Bar.

This machine is subjected to a number of abuses, traceable to the carelesaness of the average farm hand, lack of attention in oiling, dull ledger plates and knife operated over rough or stony ground. With the knife running close to the soil surface, injury from contact with gravel, and and small stones is frequent. tace, injury from contact with graves, and and small stones is frequent. The watchfulness of the operator to avoid subjectins the outier bar to injury is the best protection when the mower is in use on rough ground. The cutter bar with its numerous guards can be elevated or tilted quickly by an experienced operator and obstructions avoided. The guards should be kept tight and in perfect alignment.

Olive the Steel Plate Attention.

the knife edge performs the scissor movement should be kept sharp or at least not permitted to wear round. These plates, commonly known as ledger plates, become dull with use, a condition that greatly reduces the smelency of the mower and increases the draft. A mower with dull or rounded ledger plates will stick in heavy cutting or damp srass. A sharp knife and sharp edged ledger plates means light draft for the team and clean, free cutting of the crop. The Knife Must Be Kept Sharp.

Too much attention cannot be given to-the cutter bar with its atlached guards and quick moving knife. If the mower sticks at every mouse nest or tuft of grass, the place to look for the trouble is in the dull knife, the ledger plates, the worn guards, or the keepers that hold the knife down in place. With the new mower it will be noted that the cutting edges are sharp, that there is but little play for the knife other than as intended. In the past too little attention has been given to keeping the ledger plates sharp. With these dull, no matter how good the knife is, tough material will be frawn beneath the knife instead of being cut, forcing the blade up sgainst the guard causing wear that gives a loose fitting knife, poor work gives a loose fitting knife, poor work and greatly increased draft.

changes the shape of the section considerably, and in such a way as to reduce its efficiency as a cutting implement. The man doing the grinding should endeavor to keep the original shape of the section in so far as possible. Many of the emery grinders used in sharpenns mower suffers grind away the points of the section to a serious extent without doing very much sharpening. A specially shaped emery or carborundum stone or file should be used and the work done in the farm shop. A spare knife should always be at hand in the field.

The mower should be gone over carefully twice each day and all bolts tightened. The main bearings should be olied at least once each hour, and the pitman bearings at least every half hour. When the mower is not in use the knife should be removed. The cutter bar should be elevated to the vertical position when the machine is not in use. A little heavy mineral oil should be brushed over all parts that are likely to rust. Don't use paint oils. The mower, like the binder, to give its best service, should be given good care.—L. Stevenson, Sec., Dept. of Agriculture.
