Dillon, the third of the trio which gave Glenn gulch to the world. died at Eagle a few weeks ago while the trial was in progress. Belsea and Beardsley looked particularly well and contented yesterday while at the comptroller's office weighing in over 800 ounces of gold dust which is but a portion of their net cleanup this season. Upon presentation of their dust to the comptroller, together with a certificate from the U S. customs official at Eagle stating that it came from American territory, the pokes are sealed up and are thus carried through the Yukon without being, compelled to pay the export tax which would be otherwise collected. 





Of that sum the expenthree miles, \$6000; Gold Bottom, three miles, \$6000; Lower Dominion, six and on-half miles extending as far as 130 below lower, \$16,250 Lower Dominion extending from the mouth of Gold Run to the mouth o Sulphur, four miles, \$10,400; Sul-\$5000; cutoff, Hootalinqua to Livingston creek, three and one-half miles \$8700; Henderson creek, sixteen miles, \$10,000.
