
#### Medical Science Where Stands

One of the best known and ablest surgeons in the world is Dr. Ablest surgeons in the world is Dr. Howard A. Kelly, of Baltimore, professor in John Hopkins Uni-versity, and head of the Howard A. Kelly Hospital. Not long ago he gave this judgment against al-cohol, which, coming from him, is of the greatest possible impor-tance and significance: "I am opposed to the select

It destroys the body and the minu, corrupting the moral sense and all finer sensibilities."

Many people seem to suppose that "intoxication" and "drunk that "intoxication" and "drunk-enness" are synonymous terms. This is not the case. Intoxication means simply poisoning by alco-hol, and one does not need to go to the extreme limit (drunkenness) to be intoxicated. In other words, long before the user of alcohol ap-pears to the casual observer to be drunk, he suffers from a species of alcoholic poisoning which may not be revealed by tests of gait and speech. speech.

Dr. Harvey Wiley, of the Unit-ed States Bureau of Food, Sanita-tion and Health, recently stated that alcohol is a toxic substance that alcohol is a toxic substance, whether taken in large or small quantities. He reports a case of an accountant who was mentally incapacitated for the day's work, though not visibly drunk, by in-duging in a single glass of beer. Dr. Wiley declared the fact was capable of demonstration that beer containing only one-half of one per cent. of alcohol is intoxi-cating.
