CHARLOTTETOWN IN THE PAST.—We publish to-day, as promised in a recent No., "Charlottetown in the Past," being the introductory part of a Lecture delivered before the Young Men's Christian Association, by H. D. Morpeth, Esq.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

The country was startled through its length and breadth by the telegraphic announcement of the death of General Havelock, who expired a few days after the relief of Lucknow, of dysentery, brought on by exposure and anxiety.

Such is the substance of the last telegram from the East. We are told, indeed, that "the contents of the present mail are only what might have been expected."

It is certainly not a very encouraging account of the state of things in the East, and we hope that the next accounts will revive the hopes which the present telegram has depressed.

Not the least gratifying self-off to the more cheerful portion of the news is the fact that reinforcements were daily arriving from this country in India.

A belief prevails on the continent—the source of its origin is Paris—that the King of Prussia will shortly abdicate in favor of Prince Frederick William, who is about to marry the Princess Royal of England.

medium of the electric telegraph. Sir Colin, considering his advanced years, has shown extraordinary energy throughout this campaign.

A later telegram has been received at the India House, but it only furnishes news from Bombay. Some additional fighting is recorded. The Rajah of Ajmer, and his minister had been tried and sentenced to death.

Money has now become so plentiful that there is great difficulty in disposing of it. In illustration of this statement, the London and Westminster Bank, without waiting for the result of yesterday's weekly court at the Bank of England, reduced their rate of allowance on deposits to 2 1/2 per cent.

On the 14th, the Bank of England reduced the rate of discount to 2 per cent, being the lowest rate reached in fifteen months.

Reform meetings were being extensively held in London and the Provinces. The Glasgow Convention has been held. The Egyptian Government by every measure in its power is facilitating the transit of English troops across the Isthmus.

The railway steps at twenty-five miles on the side of Suva, and upwards of eleven hundred men enable the troops to perform the remainder of the distance.

The Victoria of Egypt has gone further than this—has authorized the purchase of 1200 horses of the country for the cavalry of the Victoria of Egypt.

Col. Inglis has been promoted to the rank of Major General for his gallant defence of Lucknow.

A British secret of young ladies being required at Berlin, on the arrival of the Princess Royal, there were 50,000 applications, from whom a selection was made of 200, who are to be dressed in white muslin, and do the required honors on the auspicious occasion.

The Calcutta Gazette Extraordinary contains an interesting detail account of the defence of Lucknow, and the official report of Brigadier Inglis.

Letters from Vienna state that Mr. Foulanquer, the Austrian Consul-General at Belgrade, summoned to the Emperor's capital to report to Sir Henry Seymour on the subject of the military operations in the Turkish provinces.

The domestic news of the week is comparatively uninteresting. All fears about the Levianthian ultimately taking the water may now be said to have disappeared.

The success of the vessel herself as a commercial speculation has still to be tried, and if she should realize all the calculations of her projectors, ships of still more gigantic dimensions are certain to be built.

The Daily News of the 15th says: A report has reached us—we regret to add, from a reliable source—that as soon as Mason Singh's adhesion to the insurgent cause in Oude became known, all the small Talukdars, who had hitherto stood aloof, hastened to make the best terms they could for themselves with the rebels.

The steamship City of Sydney arrived at Suva on the 27th of December, with dates from Melbourne to Nov. 17, and 2,195,567 in gold.

The ship Catherine Adams was totally wrecked inside the North Head, and 21 lives lost.

The Daily News says that Lord Palmerston's forthcoming India bill will transfer the direct management of the political affairs of India to a Cabinet Minister, who, it is understood, shall be a Peer, and in whom all patronage, with one exception, is to be vested.

CIRCASSIA.—Accounts have been received that the Circassians have attacked and massacred 1200 of the Russian garrison of Adzkow.

DEATH OF RESCHID PACHA.—A telegram from Constantinople announces the death of Reschid Pacha, Grand Vizier of Turkey, after an illness of three days.
