NORTH SHORE BONSPIEL WON BY BATHURST

Newcastle Second, Losing by Only Thirty-Six Points--Some Close Matches.

BANQUET FOR VISITORS

Bathurst Wins For the Fourth Successive Year.

The North Shore curling bonspiel started at 9 o'clock Thursday morning, the competing rinks being Chatham, Bathurst, Campbellton, Newcastle and Dalhousie.

The first of the series of North Shore bonspiels was held in Chatham in 1914, when Campbellton, Newcastle and Chatham competed, Campbellton carrying off the honors. The second was won also by Campbellton in 1915 and in 1916 at Newcastle. Campbellton also carried off the honors. It was decided that the victories of 1914 and 1915 would not count for the possession of the trophy but in 1917 at Dalhousie Campbellton won again. Three successive wins gave the victorious team possession of the cup but the 1918 bonspiel was won by Bathurst who were victorious in 1919 and 1920, winning the cup. A new cup has been put up by the North Shore Curling Clubs to be won under the same conditions as the trophy in the possession of Bathurst.

Serious Fire At Blackville

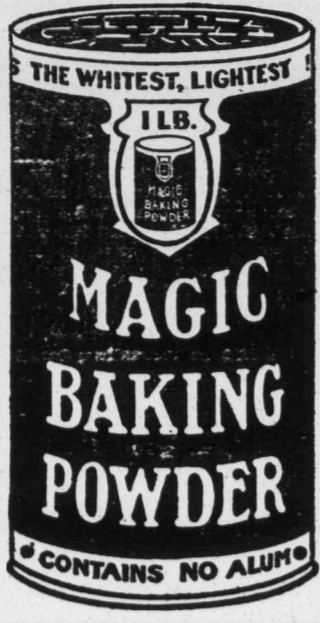

The Farmer of The Future

The farmer of the future must be a mechanic rather than a day laborer, remarks D.D. Gray, Superintendent of the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa in the December number of the Agricultural Gazette of Canada. This of course must not be taken in a literal sense, but rather as suggesting that the future agriculturist must combine with a multitude of other things he requires to know a greater knowledge of mechanics than he has formerly had. Accepting this suggestion as his text, Mr. Gray tells of records that have been kept at the Central Farm on the cost of operating three makes of tractors. The cost of operating the smaller tractor is shown to be greater



than the cost of operating the larger, that is in regard to horse power. The cost of discing, with the smaller is shown to be less due to greater speed possible than with the greater. The cost of ploughing with the smaller is more than with the larger. The lighter machine burned gasoline at a cost of 45 cents per gallon and the heavier machine, kerosene 28 1-2 cents per gallon. Cylinder oil cost 85 cents per gallon.

Dominion Department of Agriculture

The report of the Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa, from the year ending March 31st, 1920, makes reference to a conference of representatives of Federal and Provincial Departments at which an agreement was reached which will, to a large extent, eliminate overlapping and allow for close co-operation in the varieties of work carried on. Production, it was agreed, is to be carried on through provincial activities, while marketing and experimental work are to be cared for by the Dominion Department, except where special arrangements to the contrary are deemed wise. The report of the Minister covers, in addition to the work of the Department carried on through the year by the various Branches—Dairy and Cold Storage, Seed, Live Stock, Health of Animals, Fruit, Entomological Publications, International Institute, and Experimental Farms. Among the new activities reported are the record of performance for poultry and special relief policy of the Live Stock Branch, with relation to the supplying of feed to unfortunate districts in the Prairie Provinces. The Report is distributed by the Publications Branch, which is shown to have sent out, during the year, two and a half million copies of publications.

Weekly Political Letter

Politically, the capital is as dull as ditch water. Ministers are busy in their offices and in Council preparing for the work of the session. There is a feverish haste in and around the Parliament buildings, getting everything ready for the opening on the 14th. The Hon. Mr. McCurdy has announced that they are practically completed, everything but the entrance hall and the Court of Honour. The Senate Cham-

ber, which is a thing of beauty and will remain a joy forever to the occupants of the second chamber, is ready. So also is the new restaurant and the entrance to the Library. Much has been done also to improve the members' rooms, so that Parliament may really begin to feel itself at home this session. Last session the accommodation was largely temporary, with a good deal of quiet kicking. Members of Parliament are not always reasonable, even in things outside of politics.

It has been recognized the world over that the capital buildings should be representative of the people in art and cultural development. They must be dignified and imposing. They are built to last and usually constitute a monument to which the citizens look to with pride. It has been the creed of Socialists that art, in architecture, sculpture, painting and even music, should be nation possession and not private, and in that respect the Ottawa building cannot be objected to by the most radical. It will be conceded by everyone qualified to judge that externally and internally the new buildings fulfill all their requirements of good taste, as well as of usefulness and, barring earthquakes or bombardment, they will stand as good as today four or five hundred years from now and be venerated as the ancient structures of Great Britain are venerated.

The only thing of real interest politically is the bye-election in West Peterboro. The contest is in full swing and the electors there have had a feast of good speaking practically on all sides. As to the result, it would not be safe to bet a shilling. With five candidates in the field, and the electorate in an uncertain state of mind and many divers influences at work anything may happen. One thing is certain the Government has not lost an inch, but is steadily gaining ground. With five candidates in the field, if each polled its full complement of votes to which he might reasonably be entitled considering the various elements to which appeals are made, it would be difficult to venture a prediction. It is a curious feature of the campaign that four out of the five candidates are strong for protection. The farmer candidate has thrown aside the A. F. O. banner and is marching under the National Progressive Party flag, something very significant in itself, and he alone with Crerar as his leader, is sounding the free trade note.

What is very sure is that whoever shall be elected, the result will be meaningless as to reflecting the public opinion of the constituency as a whole, with this exception, the return of the Government would be a substantial victory inasmuch as it is a fight of four to one, and would mean that the Government's pronouncement on the tariff is the real issue and that its policy on that question is alone to be taken seriously. But with, so far as the city is concerned, a practical unanimity as to protection and the interjection of the religious issue, nothing will be decisive when it is all over. It means at the most that one of the five candidates will draw the sessional indemnity.

It is not known definitely here whether Mr. Crerar will go into the riding. Mackenzie King is going back again this week, although it is said that the net result of his last visit was a boost for Mr. Burnham, inasmuch as he gave that gentleman credit for making the issue and declared that had it not been for the out and out Conservatism of the ex-member, the Liberals would have supported him as a protest against the Government.

Sir Henry Drayton made a

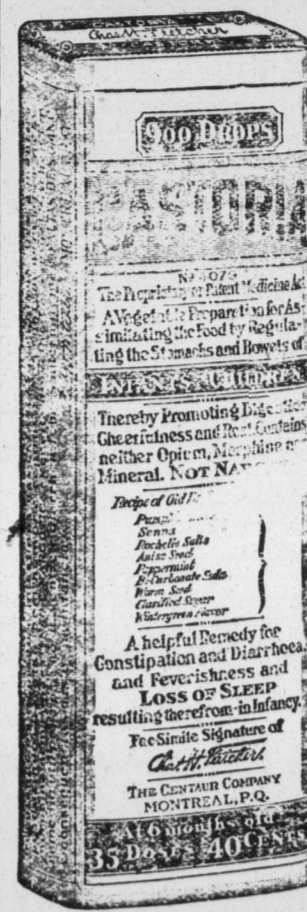
splendid impression. His frank discussion of the issues, and clear, business-like way of presenting his case was greatly admired. He is sure to make friends of his audience, even if he should not make converts.

Mr. H. H. Stevens, of Vancouver, has been doing great work. His definite challenge to the opponents of the government to come forward with proofs of their vague charges and innuendoes met with no response. He is one of the most incisive and clear cut speakers on the hustings and he has been driving home blow after blow which silence, if they do not convince opposition.

Three Million Dollar Action Against Ford

Chicago, Feb. 1—The complaint in a \$3,000,000 damage suit against Henry Ford and his paper, the Dearborn Independent, was filed in circuit court today by Morris Gest, theatrical producer, who alleged that an article in the Independent on January 21, 1921, contained "libellous, slanderous and false statements" concerning Mr. Gest and certain stage productions he has handled. The article mentioned in suit was said to have attacked "Aphrodite" and "Mecca," in particular, terming them "the most saucious spectacles ever shown in America."

Other Suit Coming
Gest's attorney here announced it had been planned to file similar suits in Detroit today. The article which was alleged to have been libellous was quoted in the complaint. It asserted that the American stage was "under the influence of a group of former boot-blacks, newsboys, ticket speculators, prize ring habitués and

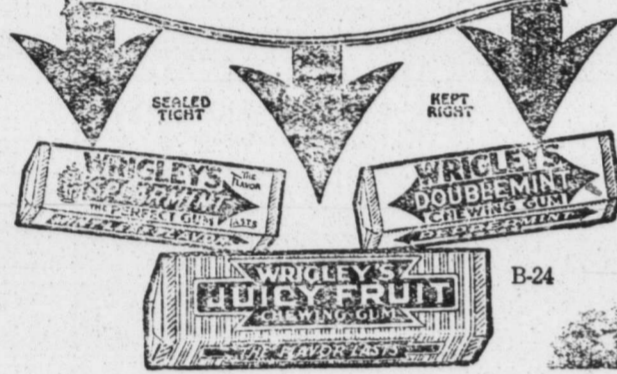

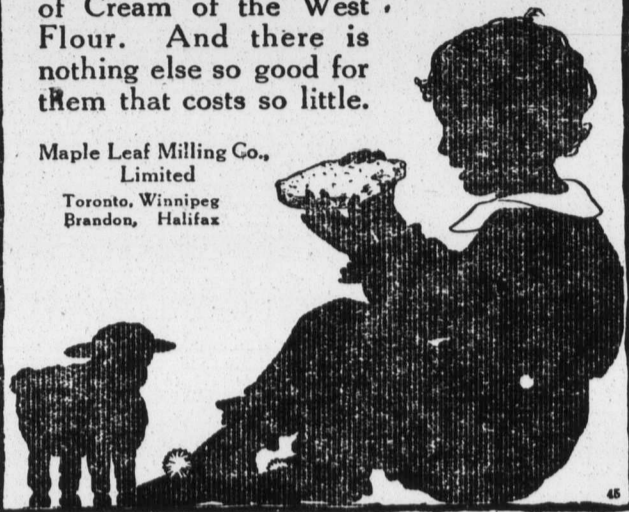

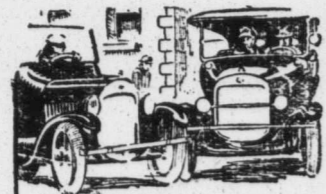

Germans Fear Europe's Ruin Through Terms

Berlin, Feb. 7.—Dr. Walter Simons, the foreign minister, declared in the Reichstag today that the German Government would refuse to negotiate on the basis of the Entente decisions regarding reparations and would formulate counter-propositions. His position was supported by all the party leaders except the Communists, who heckled and jeered him when he concluded speaking.

Dr. Simons said the German Government was unable either to refuse or agree to participate in the forthcoming London conference because it had not yet been invited to send representatives.

See Ruin of Europe

The Berlin newspapers today are as one in voicing the opinion that the reparations conditions laid down by the Allied Supreme Council in Paris sound the economic ruin of Central Europe, including France, Belgium and Italy. The papers however, do not presume to advise the cabinet as to its course in this crisis, reaching the conclusion, as one of the newspapers expressed it, that Germany is powerless to oppose this "victory madness."

Some of the conservative organs, discussing the probable effects of the reparations conditions suggest that they would leave Germany a plaything to the ex-remits.

Against the Tax

Some newspapers in their comment display particular animosity against the provision for a twelve per cent tax upon German exports. This provision, Borwaerts declares "will in five years' time force the world to discontinue free trade." As to the plan as a whole the Vossische Zeitung declares it means perpetual slavery for Germany. It casts a cloud over the European situation and engenders new hatreds.

Western Canada's Corn Substitute



(1) Cutting sunflowers with corn binder at Strathmore, Alta.

Anybody who has travelled through Western Canada this summer cannot have failed to notice fields of sunflowers growing tall and strong on many of the farms. The newest product will never become the greatest. But it may and probably will add much to the wealth of Saskatchewan. Side by side with the golden wheat the golden sunflower will blossom on every farm, in days to come. Side by side with the granary silos will loom up on every farm, and the ensilage they will hold will be sunflowers, stalk, leaves and all, chopped up fine.

Take a plug of chewing tobacco, steam it until the leaves come loose—and you will, by looking at the tobacco, be able to form an accurate idea of what sunflower ensilage looks like. Moreover, it smells like that too. But the cattle, figuratively and literally, eat it up! Cattle coming into the barnyard, fresh from eating luscious green grass, will make a bee-line on the run for sunflower ensilage. They will eat it in preference to the most expensive prepared winter foods—bran and all that sort of thing—and give more milk, with a higher butter-fat content, on sunflower ensilage.

Mr. E. C. Thomas, of Lloydminster, cow testing supervisor for Saskatchewan for the Dairy and Cold Storage branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, writes: The growing of sunflowers for ensilage has been adopted by a great number of Saskatchewan farmers during the past summer. There has been an abundant yield and the number of silos in the province has doubled since a year ago. At Lloydminster, Asquith, Guernsey, North Battleford, and many other points they are in use. At Meota there are two or more pit silos. In Rosthern district they are common among the dairymen supplying milk in Saskatoon city.

"The feed produced is used with great success for the winter feeding of both dairy beef and cattle. A writer in the Saskatoon Star has collected the following interesting data in the course of investigations in the province.

"Russian Mammoth was the seed generally used. It should be sown in rows thirty inches apart, as early in May as possible. Owing to the late spring this year, sowing was delayed in most cases until the end of May, but by harvest time many fields were to be seen yellow with sunflowers standing ten to twelve feet high.

"The yield of sunflowers on the ten or twelve farms visited varied from eight to twenty per acre.

"Experience indicates that for the purpose of harvesting the sunflower crop, it is advantageous to have the patch sown compact, that is as nearly square as possible. Much proportion of two loads of sunflower to one load of straw, the straw will absorb the water. If the mixture is kept until winter it will make almost as good feed as the original sunflowers.

"In starting to feed the ensilage, care should be taken to start with a small quantity without any bran, as the ensilage is relaxing and for a few days will have a souring effect. This will soon disappear and the cows will take from twenty-five to thirty pounds a day.

"A few figures may be quoted as the value of the crop as a feed: During the last few months of 1919 a practical farmer fed fourteen cows a mixture of ½ sunflower and green oat ensilage, twenty-five pounds per day. Late in February, 1920, the ensilage gave out. He then fed a mixture of two parts commercial oatmeal, one part gluten meal, and one part bran, fifteen pounds per day per cow. The change lost him one hundred and twenty pounds of milk, or in cash \$5.10 per day. In addition he was out of pocket in the cost of meal."
