Some time ago a conference of mine operators and the President and other representatives of the miners union was called to meet at Washington. An attempt was made to effect a compromise; but all efforts in that direction seemed for a time to fail. The miners expressed through their representatives, their willingness to refer the matter to arbitration; but the operators at first appeared unwilling to agree to this. Finally President Roosevelt succeeded in bringing about an arrangement to which all gave their adhesion. The naming of the arbitration commission was left to the President of the United States, and this done President Mitchell of the miners issued call for a convention of the mine workers. This convention met on Monday of this week and latest accounts are to the effect that in parliament, and can be counted those in attendance have agreed to leave the matter in dispute of the arbitrators, and to resume work in the mines. Tomorrow. Thursday, has been agreed upon as the date for commencing work. Thus ends a strike that threatened a veritable coal famine.




