



The Evening Chit-Chat

I read a little news item the other day tucked away on back page with only a 6 point headline that I'd like to have seen displayed double column on the first page and with a 40 point headline.

This was the substance of it. Mrs. O. H. Howard, of St. John's, wife of the President of the Commonwealth Steam Navigation Co., acted as general director at the wedding of her maid Martha Shitmeier and her gardener Daniel Fieart.

Please notice the last part of that paragraph. Mrs. Howard didn't just give her house and let her maid go to some other place until she was over. She gave herself as well as the home.

Nor did she think that just to have her wedding in such a place must be sufficiently dazzling to a girl who otherwise would be married from some humble apartment. She carried through the whole wedding in the style in which she would have had the girl been her cousin or personal friend. The ceremony took place, the bride informed us, "amid a profusion of yellow chrisanthemums in the magnificently appointed drawing room," and again "to the strains of Mendelssohn's wedding march, played by an ingeniously concealed mechanism on the grandfather's clock in the reception hall, the wedding party descended from the second floor by the grand staircase."

I wish I might thank Mrs. Howard personally for that wedding. I think she deserves a great praise as if she had written a wise and wonderful book on how to solve the servant problem. As a matter of fact that is what she has done, only, instead of writing her book, she has lived it.

In the course of an investigation of the maid's side of the servant problem I asked a great many girls to tell me their opinion as to the reason why its

harder to keep good help than it used to be. And one of the most common answers was the women are different than they used to be. Most of them seem to be trying all the time to show us how superior they are, and that we aren't anything but the dirt under their feet.

One of the women at the head of a big intelligence office put it this way: "The mistresses were more human and more sympathetic than the maids. Instead of as machines to get the most possible work out of, there wouldn't be any servant problem at all."

"Mary was really very disagreeable about changing her day this week," I heard a young matron say recently. "I heard she had an engagement. The idea! Suppose she did! Couldn't she put it off?"

Now Mary is a housemaid but at the same time she is a normal young girl and very much in love with a nice young man. This particular Thursday he was going to take her to the theatre. Naturally she resented having to work on that day.

The young matron is at bottom a very kind hearted person and I'm sure that if she had stopped to think of Mary as a young girl in love she would not have asked her to make this sacrifice. But she didn't. She just thought of her as an automaton machine guaranteed to deliver just so much service, and she didn't see why it should matter that she received that service one day instead of another.

Perhaps it's queer but whenever I see a class like that I always think of Shylock's speech in the Merchant of Venice.

You remember—"Hath not a Jew's eyes, hath not a Jew's hands, organs, dimensions, senses, affections, passions? Fed with the same food, hurt with the same weapons, subject to the same diseases, healed by the same means, warmed and cooled by the same summer and winter as the Christian is?"

Substitute "maid" and "mistress" for "Jew" and "Christian," and ashamed as I am to say it—I think you have a reminder that very modern mistress need.

Films on Tuberculosis.

The moving picture as an education-germ in combating the spread of tuberculosis will be pressed into service this month, when films showing how the disease is bred in the tenements, and how it is fought, will be exhibited simultaneously on screens seven thousand theatres throughout the United States. The pictures, which were arranged for by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, were shown experimentally recently and proved remarkably clear and distinct.

Counting England's Millions.

Forty Thousand Men Will Work at it for a Week.

Great Britain's census will be taken on April 2nd, 1911. A few days before that every household will receive a big schedule—ten million of them will be printed—to fill out, on the actual census day and for a week afterwards, 40,000 men will be employed getting in the returns, and then for two years 200 clerks and expert statisticians will work out the results. At the present time thirty-five clerks are at work perfecting the organization.

WABANA MINE.

The D. I. & S. Co. have ceased operations till the New Year, when they will again resume the regular routine of mining. The "close-down" period this year lasts three weeks, as is the usual custom, so as to allow the employees to go to their homes to spend the Christmas season.

The N. S. S. & C. Co. still continue their mining and shipping, though their force, no doubt, is greatly reduced by the crowd returning to their homesteads for the Christmas season.

Messrs. T. Burrows and J. B. Greene, manager and accountant respectively of the N. S. S. & C. Co., visited St. John's during the week.

Messrs. Costigan, Jackman, Bastin, Dwyer and Carbage, students of St. Bonaventure's College, and Messrs. O'Donnell, Jackman, Murphy and Carbage, pupils of Littlefield Academy, returned lately to spend their vacation at home.

It is currently reported that the N. S. S. & C. Co. have discovered one at the face of their submarine slope which is said to be of a high grade. They have been some time in search of this.

Mr. J. M. Greene, of the D. I. & S. Co.'s office, left Monday to spend his vacation with relatives in St. John's.

The event of the holiday season here promises to be the masquerade ball on January 3rd, under the auspices of the Bell Island Amusement Club.

Mr. Joseph Burke, so it is reported, has withdrawn from the business carried on by Burke Bros. at the Mines and now occupies a position with the Dominion Coal Co. at Glace Bay. Joe was very popular here and will be greatly missed.

With the energy and zeal that characterized them in the establish-

ing of their plant at Wabana Mine the D. I. & S. Co. have taken grant on the peninsula of Port au Port where, it is said, limestone is to be found in abundance. Not alone have they taken out these grants, but they mean to develop them, and during the past two months prospecting has been done there under the supervision of Messrs. A. House, captain of the surface mines at Wabana, and an unlimited amount of this stone has been found. As limestone is essential to this company's development, it will immediately begin, and soon the quiet, unpopulated village of the West Coast—Port au Port—will be transformed into a mining settlement and will be recognized as such by the tooting of the whistles, the familiar sound of miners at work, and the mine cars in use. May we predict that ere many years roll by Wabana Mine will be rivalled by the limestone quarry of Port au Port.

The departure of Mr. Arthur House from Wabana is greatly regretted here. Mr. House being one of the few old hands remaining who came here soon after the mines began. But while regretting his loss his friends are pleased to know that in leaving Wabana he is going to promotion, having been appointed manager of the limestone quarry to be developed at Port au Port. Though their paths in future may be different and their work in different spheres, Mr. House will always be remembered by his activity in social and athletic circles on the island. Especially will he be missed by the Dominion boys, to whose success the last summer he no mean way contributed.

The s.s. Heathcote arrived Monday with coal to the Dominion Company and sailed Tuesday with a cargo of ore, taking the last shipment for this company this season. She will likely return again to do some dredging.

Mrs. F. Jarvis is returned from St. John's Monday, and Mr. P. O'Brien and Const. Green Tuesday.

Latest Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, France, Dec. 22. A tempestuous day in the Correctional Court where the trial of "Count" Daubly de Graigny and his American wife is being held on the charge of swindling, reached a climax this afternoon in the introduction of love letters alleged to have been written to Daubly by the Duchess of Choiseul Frain, the plot in the case, while she was the wife of Charles Hamilton Palmé. During the reading of the letters which the Duchess refused to acknowledge as hers, the two women, the Duchess and the "Countess" Daubly, sat side by side exchanging furious glances, while the court, jammed to suffocation with fashionable women, was filled with sighs, murmurs and exclamations as all strained to catch the words "I love so hard," read M. Bernard, counsel for Daubly, "that it makes me ill" given yourself to me, all I ask is that you love me always, that is God's best gift; the day passes, fire dies, but my love goes on forever; in an incandescent, sunburning flame that dulls me sitting at your knees, cradled in your heart." Signed "Lucy." The Duchess underwent a pitiless cross-examination as to her relations with Daubly, but she refused to answer many of the questions and begged the court to interfere to spare her. She charged that Daubly had demanded \$200 for the return of letters which she had written him and that his entire conduct had been that of a blackmailer since the discovery that she had arranged for the purchase of pictures as proof of her love for him or that she said "This shows that I am your guardian Angel." Daubly had insisted, his witness said, "That all the pictures were original but they had not been authenticated, only one exception, a painting, recalled, admitted having received \$3,200 for wine which it did not furnish. He said he kept the money because the Palmé's owed \$40,000. A Parisian physician, a friend of the late Mr. Palmé, testified that Palmé had always considered the picture "Alopec" a copy not an original. M. L. Labour, the business agent of the Duchess, whom M. Bernard attacked yesterday, declaring that his presence at the Bar with counsel for the prosecution was an insult to the legal profession of France, to-night sent a challenge to Bernard to a duel, but the seconds decided that M. Bernard had not exceeded his rights and that a duel was not justified.
