It began last Monday, and continued daily with Knowsley, the seat of Lord Derby, as the centre. Everywhere the Sovereigns went they were met with enthusiasm. They reached Buckingham Palace last night. In a letter to Lord Derby the King reviewed the tour, and warmly expressed his appreciation of everything that occurred.

#### Manutacture of Pulp Wood Now Rapidly Growing

Ottawa, July 9.—The home manufacture of wood pulp, in place of exporting it, is gradually developing in Canada, according to a report just issued by the Forestry Branch. Forty-eight pulp mills reporting in 1912 consumed 866,042 cords of raw material, valued at \$5,215,582. In the quantity consumed this is an increase of 28.8 per cent. over 1911. The increased value of the output is over 20 per cent., despite a decrease of 43 cents per cord in the average price of the raw material.

The pulpwood cut totalled 1,846,910 cords, valued at \$11,911,415 more than 50 per cent. of this, unmanufactured, was exported to the United States is estimated that if the material had been manufactured in Canada, the value would have been \$13,220,864. The amount actually received was \$6,695,833.

Enough pulp was exported last year to supply 54 average mills. However, the situation is improving every province except Ontario, having increased its home consumption. Quebec did so by 43 per cent., New Brunswick by 14 per cent., and Nova Scotia by 18. The decrease in Ontario was 18.6 per cent.

#### It Keeps Radium Safe.

Perhaps the most interesting safe in the world is one which has lately been built in London for holding that priceless metal, radium.

Even the thickest and toughest of steel would be as useless for the storage of radium as a safe of plate glass would be for the storage of light. The valuable rays would easily pass out. Lead is the only metal impervious to the rays of radium, so the inside lining of the safe, which on the outside looks much like any other safe, is composed of a thick leaden box.

The valuable rays keep accumulating inside as the particles of radium throw them off, and in the ordinary way the opening of the safe door would allow them to escape. But by an ingenious arrangement the escaping emanations are caught by a couple of valves and pass into tubes filled with mercury, which keeps them safe.

This radium safe has been built to store a million pounds' worth of radium, though so large a quantity has never yet been got together. A million pounds' worth would take less room than a football.

# Ship's Engineer Battered to Death.

Battered beyond recognition, Bert Varney, sixth engineer on the C.P.R. liner 'Montreal,' was killed at sea on July 2nd last, the accident being reported when the ship berthed here. No one saw the man meet his death, but it is supposed that he was reaching across the big shaft of the ship, which makes eighty revolutions per minute, when he missed his footing or his hand slipped and he fell upon it. It hurled him into the shaft pit crushing his body in a most horrible manner. He was making his first voyage at sea in the 'Montreal' when he was killed.

Suddenly there was a shriek from Varney, and he was seen to shoot from the shaft into the pit beneath it. The crank hit him a terrific blow, probably killing him instantly, and before his body was so horribly mangled.

The engines were stopped, and the shattered body of the engineer gathered up, and the signs of the tragedy removed. The next day Capt. McNeill read the simple burial service, and Mr. Varney's remains were committed to the deep. Then the ship sailed on its way again.
