



The German Minister has presented to the Norwegian Government a note, protesting against Norway's embargo on submarines of belligerent coun-tries. The cabinet held a meeting and discussed the note, but a decision in the matter has not yet been made public. The press unanimously sup-ports the Government in its right to issue such ordinance, which Sweden has already done. The Norwegian or-dinance with respect to submarines of belligerent powers, forbids such ves-sels from traversing Norwegian wa-ters, except in cases of emergency, when they must remain upon the sur-face and fly the national flag. Mer-cantile subs are to be allowed the Norwegian waters only in surface po-

Norwegian waters only in surface po-sitions, in full daylight, and flying the national colors. Any submarine viola-ting the ordinance will, according to its provisions, be attacked by armed forces.
