STILL ANOTHER OFFER BY ALEXANDER & BUDD

Now They Say That They Are Willing to Rearrange
Prices of Power Every Five Years During
Contract

CITY POSTPONES CONSIDERATION UNTIL NEXT WEEK

Only one Candidate for President of Board of Trade

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A THOROUGH ENQUIRY SAY BUSINESS MEN

Manufacturers and Wholesalers Urge City Council to Get an Expert to Look Into Question of Cost of Power

EXAMPLES OF POWER DEVELOPED AT CHEAP RATE

Mr. Alexander Appeared at the Meeting and Makes a Statement. The Members Have Ideas of Their Own

The members of the manufacturers and wholesalers sections of the Board of Trade met yesterday afternoon to discuss the question of power.

The meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the details of the proposition made by Messrs. Alexander & Budd to the city council.

The joint meeting of these two sections was very well attended. R. J. Hutchings presided.

At the beginning Mr. Hutchings suggested that the meeting might well appoint three members to make a full and careful investigation of existing conditions. He thought that while the city had its present system of municipal administration that it would be unwise for it to undertake such a big proposition of any proposition of any magnitude.

"Now if the city would manage the business of the city," said Mr. Hutchings, "like Mr. Cushing manages the affairs of his department, along with his very competent deputy, I should be in favor of public ownership."

Mr. Alexander appeared at the meeting and repeated the offer that had been made to the city. He said that the proposition now was to drop the street railway part of the arrangement.

At the conclusion of the address, which was short, a number of questions were asked of him. He said that by building a large enough dam that the water could be in a position to generate 15,000 horse power. He also stated that the company was prepared to distribute power, as well as supply it to the city, and that the rate of 12 cent per k. w. would be about the right figure for the work of distribution of the city, desired that in addition to supplying the contract.

FIRE CAUSED DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT \$200,000

Warehouse in Winnipeg Was Destroyed

Winnipeg, Jan. 28.—A fire which broke out in the warehouse owned by Bright & Johnston, occupied principally by representatives of eastern wholesalers and manufacturers, caused a loss estimated at over \$200,000 and only the excellent fire fighting of the brigade saved the conflagration involving a loss of many times that amount.

The burned building was owned by Hattway & Cameron, a wholesale commission brokers; J. D. King & Co., boot and shoe manufacturers; Toronto; Finlay Bros., Ottawa; W. Patterson & Co., biscuits and confectionery; Brantford; Copeland-Chaterson & Co., Toronto; Leonard Pulford Drug Co. and H. J. Boyd, wholesale crockery merchants.

FACTORY LAWS OBSERVED IN MANITOBA

Only 15 Children Under Age at Work in Province

Winnipeg, Jan. 28.—According to departmental reports submitted to the legislature today the factory act is being well observed in this province. During the past year the inspector made 1205 inspections and during that time he found only 15 persons employed who were under age, seven boys and eight girls.

STEAD HOPEFUL OF DISARMAMENT

GET AN EXPERT

The Albertan endorses fully the decision of the Board of Trade, and the manufacturers and wholesalers of the Board of Trade, who suggested that an expert be secured by the city to enquire into the power possibilities in the vicinity of Calgary.

That is precisely what we want. The city of Calgary needs cheap power, and not only that but it needs the very cheapest power that can be secured. That is what we must have and that is what we are going to get.

The Albertan will go one step further than the members of the Board of Trade. Not only should an expert be secured to report upon these questions, but an expert should be retained in this city to manage the city light and power plant.

At the present time we are endeavoring by every possible way to discover how much we are actually paying for power. We do not know. We have no person from whom we can get any information. We are at a decided disadvantage in dealing with any applicant for special concessions.

Is this as it should be? The city should not only secure the services of an expert, electrician but it should keep the able electrician right here in this city.

DIFFERENT SYSTEM NEEDED

At the meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon at which the leading manufacturers and wholesalers of Calgary were present the only argument that was used in favor of the granting of a valuable franchise belonging to the city to a private company, was that the city administration was most unsatisfactory. No person reflected upon the members of the council, but every person who had an opportunity to state his views upon this particular phase of the case stated most emphatically that the present machinery was out of date and absolutely dangerous to the progress of the city. That was but one expression of opinion. There are others.

All the newspapers in Calgary are opposed to the present system of administration. The people themselves have expressed themselves upon this point and are opposed to this form of doing business. The people have never changed their opinion in this matter.

Why should a city be handicapped and encumbered by a form of administration which would not be tolerated for a single minute by a business enterprise?

Before the business men of Calgary have confidence in any municipal enterprise, there must be a change in the organization of municipal administration.

MAYOR SHOULD BE RECOMPENSED

Though it was not generally understood at the time, not even by the aldermen who voted for it, when the members of the city council last year decided to abolish the commission they at the same time cut off the salary of the mayor.

Whether the present city council eventually decides upon a business form of administration or upon the present method, the council should decide upon paying the mayor an honorarium of some kind. The salary last year was \$1,000 a year. It was not enough, but it is not expected that a mayor should be paid quite enough for his services. The office should never be attractive merely for the money that is in it. At the same time it is unfair, unwise and contrary to our methods of life, in this western country that any person should do as much as a mayor is called upon to do without receiving an honorarium of some kind.

The mayor should be paid at least \$1,000 a year.

CANADA, A MIGHTY NATION

The Washington Post, a paper which is, perhaps, the most carefully edited in all United States, has this to say of the future of Canada:

"The Canadian department of the interior computes that for the last fiscal year the number of new homesteaders in the Dominion North-west was 41,689, made up of 12,485 immigrants from the United States, 5,877 from England, 2,198 from Austria, 1,685 from Scotland, 1,024 from Germany and 543 from Ireland. The remainder are native Canadians.

"By the middle of this century Canada will be a mighty nation. There is desirable domain there to make homes for more inhabitants than are now in the American Union, and while we are getting from Europe more than a million immigrants annually, and the demand for labor was never so urgent in every part of the Union as now, we may expect to lose to Canada at the least 200,000 Americans yearly be-

fore the new century has fulfilled its fourth lustrum, and these the cream of our population, the farmers of the northwest, who better themselves by selling American land for \$100 an acre to acquire just as good land in Canada at one-fiftieth the price.

"Nor is the farming belt of Canada the only attraction. They are constructing railroads to the Hudson Bay region, rich in iron, coal and other minerals, and it is confidently expected that forty years in the future Canada will be second to the United States, and to the United States only, in the production of the real king of all metals.

"That Canada will be an independent nation by the middle of the century is quite likely. That she could have been an independent nation at its beginning, with England's hearty consent and blessing, is certain; but they are a canny set, the Canadians, and it is the part of wisdom to have the British navy as an asset.

"The world is going at a pretty lively clip in 1907, but it is a snail's pace compared to what it will be when Canada, South America and Africa are peopled with teeming millions, with all the energies and verve of the American of today."

EDITORIAL NOTES

There is many a slip between an enthusiastic nomination and the head of the pole.

Judging from the appearance of an evening contemporary, scariest mysteries are not confined to the theatres.

This effort may be a bit belated, but many people have the idea that the letter of Governor Swettenham had the flavor of the Jamaica ginger.

An eastern exchange surmises that if Governor Swettenham is in the habit of writing that kind of letter the cause of the earthquake is explained at once.

To any person who is keenly interested in this power question, these reposed editorials upon "Canada's Treaty with Japan" appearing daily in the Calgary Herald, must have a most peaceful effect.

The statement made by Mr. Crossley that the overlying eternal is not all fire and brimstone will come as refreshing news to a large number of Edmonton people.

The action of the Calgary Board of Trade in demanding that the city council should make a careful investigation of the entire power proposition is to be commended.

It is certainly up to Robert Green to keep up the bluff until the elections in British Columbia are over, and if the McBride administration is returned, no very great harm will be done to him.

The name of the new manager of the Calgary baseball club is Thyme, which is also the name of a flower, and this is our modest way of proclaiming to the baseball public that he is a daisy.

A gentleman signing himself "Montanion" writes the Albertan commenting upon Mr. Cassaday's secret societies. As the writer's name is not enclosed the letter will not be published.

It is unfortunate that R. A. Brocklebank was not a candidate in ward one. The electors in this city have a habit of overlooking things first and expressing regret later on.

It would be so much better and more satisfactory if Alexander & Budd instead of saying that they had titles, deposits, rights and powers, would actually produce them for the public to gaze upon.

Our respects to the town of "High River, which is making the most of a bit of hard luck, and is showing to the people of Alberta how a sturdy band of men can take things and come up smilingly. Its citizens are the gamest in Alberta.

The Albertan has not investigated the claims of the postal employees, but it is convinced that they are right. Civil servants in this part of the country are paid outrageously inadequate salaries. And the postal department is the worst of them all. The wages should be increased very considerably.

To a peaceful man, the comforting part about this election in ward I is the fact that neither candidate had the courage to say what he thought on the burning question of the hour—the power question—and for all practical purposes it makes very little difference which one is elected.

The trouble in dealing with these corporations is not so much that a municipality cannot get an agreement wide enough to bind them but that the corporation merely declines to abide by the agreement, and by using force and lawyers can put such a stop that the city has to yield in self defence.

Gypsy Evangelist

(Chicago Tribune)
The climax of the old-fashioned religious fervor which is sweeping Chicago as a result of the Torrey and "Gypsy" Smith evangelist services came at the auditorium yesterday afternoon when five thousand men gathered to hear the gypsy evangelist preach.

After every seat in the great theatre, from boxes to topmost galleries had been filled by men a scene of "soul-saving" which for dramatic setting and enthusiasm has not been equaled in Chicago for years was witnessed. The result was that hundreds of men either professed Christianity for the first time or renewed their covenant with God. Many individual scenes pathetic in the extreme. It resembled a night at the Pacific Garden mission.

When the doors were opened the immense crowd which had been growing every minute, swept down the aisles in rivers of struggling human beings, were of little use. In ten minutes every seat was taken and the police were turning men away.

Gypsy Smith sat in the centre of the big platform which had been erected for the ministers and singers. Stretched out before him the men's faces reached up and up until they were hardly distinguishable in the galleries under the roof. Hardly were they seated, when the chairman, Prof. Shailer Matthews, of the University of Chicago, started a song, and the volume of "I Need Thee, Oh I Need Thee" seemed to shake the golden arches with its fervor.

The evangelist rose, his figure looming big and virile among those on the platform. He read a request from a wife whose husband had left her.

"O God thou knowest where this husband is," he prayed. "Save him and bring him to this brokenhearted woman. O Jesus Christ of Nazareth, thou art here today. Let the spirit of thy presence go out today all over Chicago, and may this audience go away with the mark of the crimson cross upon its forehead."

"It is a manly thing to be a Christian," he said. "There are a multitude who think it is a sign of weakness, a sentimental thing. Do not despise the string that keeps a man pure and tethers him to his mother's God. It is a golden cable that circles eternally. You are hanging to a thread that will break and let you fall to an infinity of horrors."

"Mother's apron string! Blessed string if it keeps a young man sober, clean, honest and true. There are many before me who would give their right arm to be back with that string. It takes a man with moral force to stem the tide of the world. Is there a man here who dares to stand up and say he is a Christian?"

"Here's one!" said a voice in one of the boxes. "Here's another" said a man in the balcony.

"I'm not ashamed," said a man near the front.

A young man, his face convulsed with emotion, wandered down the middle aisle and dropped on his knees in the centre of the house under the evangelist's pulpit.

"This my son, was dead, but he is alive! I just found," quoted the preacher. "What we want is Jesus, Jesus."

POSTAL CLERKS ARE POORLY PAID

The following is a statement sent in by the postal clerks. Any one reading it is bound to sympathize with those preparing it.

On the 28th of Nov. last the clerks in the local post office sent in a petition to the post master general to have the wages of all west of the great lakes increased by \$10, to meet the higher cost of living in the western provinces.

They were due to have a reply before Christmas, but the petition was returned with the cost in general of the necessities of life be furnished.

This, too, was sent to the department, with the information that no reply had been received as yet.

On the 1st of Feb. next the cost of living in the Calgary boarding houses and hotels is to be advanced five dollars per week for board only.

In the meantime the customs clerks who, the postal clerks maintain, do not work nearly as hard as the post office officials, will receive an increase of fifty per cent. on their salaries.

The customs officials also are to receive an additional \$15 a month, west of the great lakes.

Mail clerks on trains received \$10 a month on the above basis.

The clerk in the local post office official at the large sum of \$45 a month. After three months hard work, should they prove efficient they receive an increase of \$8.33 per month. They have to look ahead to the prospect of receiving an increase of \$50 a year up to the salary of \$900.

This basis of salary is inadequate to the present cost of living in Calgary, which, for board and room reaches the sum even of the poorest kind of \$30 to \$35 per month leaving a very small margin, in fact too small, for the common necessities of life.

Since applying for the increase of \$10 per month, the clerks of the local office with the public in general find the cost of living to have increased considerably, and find that an increase of \$15 at least would cover the necessary expenditure connected with western life.

In the Christmas rush of 1905 the clerks received a bonus of from \$5 to \$10 for the extra work, but last Christmas failed to receive even the slightest token of thanks from the government.

The extra rush last Christmas lasted for about one month. The fact that the post office clerks work on Sundays and every holiday and receive nothing extra for the same, is a very hard fact, and again if on account of illness, plenty of it in the local post office through poor heating and worse ventilation, they are docked for the time off duty, though working on a monthly salary.

THE TELEPHONES ANSWERING CALL

Great Improvement has Been Noted During Last Few Days

The Albertan waited upon Mr. Bull of the telephone company to enquire about the telephone improvements made in Calgary. He maintained that there is a very perceptible improvement in the telephone service this week now that matters are getting back to their normal conditions.

The operating room is now in charge of Mr. C. E. Getz of Montreal, who arrived here on Sunday last from that place, together with Mr. Bull. Mr. Getz is one of the oldest and most expert telephone service men in the business and expressed himself being amazed at the exceedingly large amount of calls passing through the Calgary switchboard, the average number of calls per day being 10,000.

He is now assisted by a Montreal chief operator and other operators skilled in the use of the present type of switchboard as well as the new central energy one who arrived Saturday.

Mr. Griffith, the local manager, attributes the abnormal calling rate from some city telephones to the fact that these are used largely by the public, especially during severe or disagreeable weather and asks subscribers that, for the sake of their own lines being kept available for use and so they will not be pronounced busy when called for, they ask their neighbors to confine free calls to emergency use only, say, for sickness or in case of fire.

BUILDING MATERIAL NOTHING ELSE

Such is Message of Jamaica to Canada

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—The Dominion government received a cablegram from the governor of Jamaica thanking Canada for contributions, and stating that no aid is required except for re-building. The government is replying that the balance of the money voted will be sent for in building material instead.

THE KILLING WAS JUSTIFIABLE
Such is decision of Coroner's Jury in Horneback Case

Edmonton, Jan. 28.—The coroner's jury tonight brought in a verdict of justifiable homicide in the case of Horneback, the crazy rancher from the bid eddy of the Macleod. The verdict, which was arrived at after a careful and thorough examination, completely exonerates Mergard and Morron, the partner and employee who did the shooting.

HIGH RIVER DOING VERY NICELY

The Trouble There is Being Attended to Very Nicely
Lethbridge, Jan. 28.—Chas. Mair, who was instructed by the commissioner of immigration to investigate the small pox outbreak at High River, has just returned. His report, of which the substance is given below, is of a reassuring character.

A party of five Americans all from the state of Iowa, crossed into Canada at Snowflake, and began canvassing for enlargement of photographs, travelling from town to town in Southern Manitoba and going from house to house in the country parts. About Nov. 1 they arrived in Indian Head, where, it is believed, they contracted the disease, and where they stayed for two weeks taking orders.

Then they went direct to Macleod stopping only a few hours at Medicine Hat en route. In less than two weeks they left Macleod and went to Claresholm, the disease declaring itself on one of the party at that point on Dec. 3 and on another on Dec. 15.

They were both ill when they came to High River, but went about the farm houses as usual taking orders, the disease, it would appear, having been previously, but mistakenly, diagnosed as chicken pox. There have been six cases in High River so far, the patients being now convalescent. The Alberta hotel is the only public house quarantined, but the schools are closed and all public meetings or entertainments, are forbidden. Every care is being taken otherwise in a general vaccination, for one of the most significant features of the outbreak is that all the cases are in unacquainted persons.

The disease is under control in the town of High River, and all that is now feared is an outbreak in the farm houses visited by the diseased photographs, and it is a circular is to be sent to each of the farmers concerned describing symptoms, with suggestions as to immediate treatment, and the manner, pending information on that head, is issuing in the meantime a printed notice to the like effect to be billed in the post offices, business houses and hotels in town and country. There is thus no time lost by the High River authorities in dealing with the outbreak, and little fear may be felt as to its spreading to the Lethbridge district.

To the attention of those exceptional persons who object in toto to vaccination is commended the suggestive fact that all the cases occurred in unvaccinated persons with the reminder that communities have rights and duties which should have right of way over the prejudices of individuals.

MADE IN CANADA A GOOD SIGN

Suggested that Dominion Have Distinct Trade Mark

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—Borford, Canadian agent at St. Kitts, says considerable apprehension is being felt among sugar producers at the proposed increase in duty on raw sugar of seven and a third cents per hundred lbs. which, it is feared, will entirely neutralize the advantage of preferential trade.

Agent Jackson at Leeds strongly advises a distinctive Canadian trade mark to go on all products sent abroad. He suggests a maple leaf with words "Made in Canada." Denmark has a distinctive make, and Ireland has just adopted one.

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HOSPITAL FAR TOO SMALL

Must be Greatly Enlarged if it is to Keep up to Time

ANNUAL MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT

During the Year 921 Patients Were Treated by Hospital

The annual meeting of the Calgary General Hospital was held last evening in the board of trade offices and a large number were present, including President Cross, Messrs. H. J. Stuart, I. S. G. VanWart, Wm. Toole, John Cardell, F. Macbeth, T. Bone, A. Allan, Adams, Smith, H. A. Farley, Jas. Hornby and others. The chair was occupied by the president, who, after opening the meeting, read his report for the past season.

I herewith present you report for the year ending Dec. 31, 1906, being the 10th annual one. Work in every department has increased, in the maternity department, nearly doubled; in the isolated department a large increase, and in general beyond its capacity, and constantly obliged to turn away patients for want of room, and more are treated there than should be under proper conditions.

The directors consider the hospital must be enlarged and recommend the following general plan: A new surgical wing with a capacity of about fifty beds, with operating room and all other necessities to complete this department.

The main general building would have to be changed to allow of more room for offices for lady superintendent, secretary, etc.

The isolated hospital would have to be doubled to allow of four contagious diseases being treated at the same time, as considerable complaint has been made for lack of this accommodation.

A new boiler and power house to heat all the buildings, and if found necessary run the machinery.

The nurses' home would have to be enlarged or a new one built, and if so the present one might be remodelled for a children's ward or some special prevalent disease.

The laundry would have to be made larger, steam and hot water (and power if installed) supplied from the new boiler house.

Numerous efforts have been made to raise funds for these necessary additions but with small success, and the directors consider that the only way is to submit a by-law to the ratepayers of Calgary for sufficient funds, and deem it just and necessary to care for the sick and helpless as it is to put in water and sewers, so that we urge the people of Calgary to provide not only adequate accommodation but an institution that every citizen of Calgary will be justly proud of.

The medical men have increased in numbers much more rapidly than the hospital has in size, so that it was found too cumbersome to have so many doctors on the staff, and a rule was made that no more be admitted, which has already proved a benefit, as the natural course of events will reduce the number if no more are added, and I would recommend that this rule be adhered to until the hospital is made larger and more doctors can be accommodated.

On behalf of the directors, I beg to thank the matron and staff for the efficient work they have done and are doing, and the agreeable way in which they have treated the patients, the public, the medical staff and hospital board, and we extend a hearty vote of thanks to the medical board for their valuable attention and assistance in making the institution a success.

The women's hospital aid has been, as usual, of the greatest possible assistance to the institution, and we cannot thank them enough for their great efforts in accomplishing so much. On behalf of the directors I wish to extend them our most grateful thanks and ask them to continue their good work in the future.

Donations have fallen off very materially, accounted for by the donations given for the new surgical wing amounting to \$5,194.20 in the bank.

auditor on the proposition of Messrs. Toole and Macbeth. Votes of thanks were passed to the president and directors for their work, the medical staff, ladies aid society, the board of trade for use of rooms, auditors, medical examiners and lecturers.

R. J. Stuart asked why there was only \$500 credited to the city on its subscription, when some time ago it was raised to \$1000. He was sure it was raised to \$1000, as it was carried unanimously on the proposition of Ald. Hall and himself. The secretary replied that he had only received \$500.

It was decided on the proposition of Messrs. Toole and T. Bone that the new board take the first opportunity to see the city council and ask them to pay all deficits, if any, at the end of the year. Carried.

The meeting then adjourned on the proposition of Messrs. Macbeth and Cardell.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

Homestead Regulations.

Any even number section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, except section 22, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-agent.

An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be wired to the local Agent, by the Sub-agent, the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "persecution" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.

An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one applicant for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of a father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, in filing declaration of abandonment.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled, or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applications for inspection must in default, and if subsequently the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry, should the land become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may be summarily cancelled.

Duties.—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for such homesteader the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his residence upon farming, and owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement as to residence upon such land.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Mining Regulations.

Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,900 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz.—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$25 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may upon having a survey made and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2½ per cent on the sales.

PLACER mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of two years renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental, \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2½ per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

BOB GREEN WILL HAVE TO SHOW THE VANCOUVER WORLD

Preparations are Now All Ready for the Elections in British Columbia Which Take Place on Saturday.

Vancouver, Jan. 28.—A mistake occurred in Saturday night's telegram which said that Neil McKay succeeded Robert Green as minister of lands and works. McKay became deputy minister of lands, succeeding W. S. Gore.

Ex-Minister Green spoke at Kaslo tonight and repeated his denial that he received the shares.

The World refuses to retract, especially after Green acknowledges being offered shares by Caron, although he suggested they be turned over to McKay. The World defies Green to do his worst.

McKay says: "Green's statement as to how Caron was asked to issue stock in transcontinental exploration syndicate is absolutely correct. At the same time I was not then, nor was I until months afterwards, connected with the lands and works department. I emphatically deny that this stock was held in trust for Green or that he was to be in any way interested therein. I may add, that whether issued or not, no such stock has ever been received by me."

Nelson, Jan. 28.—Mr. Macdonald, leader of the opposition, while here stated that there was every indication that the Liberals would win in Vancouver and Kamloops. In Van-

couver the Conservatives admitted that there were divisions in the ranks and that they are not well organized.

Such seats as Comox and Esquimalt are freely conceded to the Liberals, making a gain of two where the Liberals already hold seven out of 12, the McBride government only having three, the other two being held by Socialists.

In the city of New Westminster, Howay is making a winning fight. Good old John Oliver has an easy thing of it in Delta and is now stumping in the Okanagan, Yale and Lillooet districts.

Charlie Munro is perfectly safe in Chilliwack and Weart will win in

Richmond, where Carter-Cotton is being driven from pillar to post by the vigor and effectiveness of Mr. Weart's canvass and platform addresses.

Macdonald was unable to speak in Yale, Lillooet and Cariboo districts, but his reports from these ridings are entirely satisfactory. Ex-Attorney General Wilson is having a bad time of it in Cariboo.

It was in Kamloops that Mr. Macdonald encountered the most emphatic evidence of Liberal determination to sweep the McBride government from office. Attorney General Fulton is a beaten man now.
