Trade. Victoria: DEAR SIR,-A copy has been sent to me of the letter addressed to you on the 13th March last by Mr. R. H. Hall, concurred in by Capt. John Irving, having reference to the best freight route into the Yukon country. I observe that Mr. Hall says that the information at his disposal has not enabled him to arrive at the same conclusions as Dr. Dawson and Mr. Ogilvie in regard to the Stickeen river and Teslin lake route, and yet I fail to find any facts set out in his memgoes without saying that freight cannot be landed at Forty Mile Creek by the route mentioned more expeditiously than or as cheaply as by way of St. Michael's. 

Goods of all descriptions, either for the outfit of individual miners, or for the trader, no matter how large his order may be, can be supplied in Victoria cheaper than at any other point on the coast, and as goods are destined for Canadian territory, it is a direct advantage to buy here and thereby save the duties.

If you decide on going in, I shall be glad to see you, and will fill your orders promptly and satisfactorily.

Stickeen river to Teslin lake, the source of the Hootalingua river, by trail, is about one hundred and fifty miles. The government of British Columbia have spent several thousands of dollars on this trail this summer, and are now considering spending a large sum in making a thoroughly good road through a comparatively level country. A company has received a charter to build a railway over this portion of the route, and it is expected that next season steamers will be plying on the Teslin lake, thence down the Hootalingua and Lewis rivers to Klondyke. Several of my friends are going in this way this month, and the best informed persons say they will reach their destination a long way shead of those who have gone via Dyea.

One must at present take pack animals in to pack supplies over the 150 miles of trail between the Stickeen river and Teslin lake; there boats are built, and a clear passage made down Teslin lake, Hootalingua and Stewart rivers. The distances are:
