THE EMPIRE IN DANGER

THE LATEST MEETING OF THE
COUNCIL IN TORONTO

Great gathering at Temperance Hall—
Speakers by Loyalties—Interpreters,
Resolutions and Petition.

One of the most enthusiastic meetings
held in Toronto took place last night
at Temperance Hall, where a large
gathering of loyalists met to discuss
the situation in Ireland. Almost
two hours before the meeting opened
the hall was packed with people,
and more than 5000 people had gathered
by the time the meeting opened.

There were also a number of dis-
sidents in the gathering, who made
themselves known by their conduct
and by their speeches. A police
sergeant was on the platform and
several officers were scattered
throughout the hall.

Chairman Waring Kennedy spoke
of the pleasure he gave him to preside
at a large meeting of loyalists in
Toronto. He said that he had
been asked to preside at a meeting
of loyalists in London, but he had
declined because he did not wish to
be misunderstood.

Prof. Goldwin Smith said that
Ireland was bound together, and
that the British Empire would
fall to pieces if Ireland was
separated from Great Britain.

That an attempt of the British Empire
to separate Ireland from Great
Britain would be a disaster to
both, and that the British Empire
would be a better off if Ireland
remained a part of it.

resolution, referred to Goldwin
Smith, who he said was a
