BIG LUMBER TRANSACTION

McLAUGHLIN BROS. OF ARRIPPOUR TO SELL THEIR MILL AND LIMITS.

Although the C.P.R. did not get the full East Coast contract, the transaction which has ever taken place in the trade is about complete. The sale of the McLaughlin Bros. large mill at Arripour, and extensive limits on the Upper Ottawa, to Hon. J. C. Ross of Quebec and E. J. G. Ross of Montreal, is now a fact.

The consideration is \$2,000,000. The cause of selling is the ill-health of the managing partner, who has been advised by his physician to seek rest. In the event of the purchase being completed it is said Messrs. Ross and Eddy contemplate building a short line railway from Arripour through the Township of Fitzroy, Huntley, March and Saint to Ottawa.

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THE C.P.R. ACCIDENT AT GALE

All the Injured Doing Well—Notes and Incidents of the Disaster.

The catastrophe which befell the Canadian Pacific Railway train near Gale, Tuesday evening, was the chief topic of conversation amongst railroad officials and people generally.

The cause of the wreck being left open is believed to be due to a misunderstanding between the switchman and a conductor of a freight which passed down some time ahead of the ill-fated passenger train. The collapse of the line was due to the weight of the train.

At 12 o'clock today booming could be heard, but whether it was an explosion or an attempt to blow up the other portion of the building cannot be ascertained, as all approaches is cut off by the intense heat and flames. The fire spread over two or three hundred yards.
