heir Award Handed Down On One of the Main Questions in the Dispute Between the Deminion and Ontario and Quebec - Simple Interest Only Allowed. OTTAWA, Nov. 2.—The Dominion has

won its first and most important round in its legal fight with the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec and the old Province of Canada, as to the adjustment of the debt as it stood on July 1, 1867, and as it has been since affected by awards and acts of Parlia-

since affected by awards and acts of Parliament and legislatures.

The arbitrators, Chancellor Boyd, Judge Burbidge and Judge Casault today handed down their decision on the question of interest and some minor points argued before them some time ago. The provinces contended that compound interest should be allowed on the amount claimed to be due.

Simple Interest Only Allowed.

The award orders that simple interest be allowed on the balance, if any, found to be due each province by the Dominion and leaves in abeyance the question whether the Dominion is or is not to be allowed interest on any balance found to be due it. Wipes Out \$3,000,000 of the Claim.

This is very important and wipes out at once about \$3,000,000 of the so-called "claim of the provinces," which was in reality only an accumulation of compound interest on the interest claimed to be due on a supposed balance.

Albert Horton, Toronto, a member of the Ottawa Hansard staff, and secretary of the Commission during its trip through the Western States, told an interesting story of his experiences when traveling with the commission in Kansas, Iowa, Minnesota and Illinois, to the Royal Commission yes-

and Illinois, to the Royal Commission yesterday.

Mr. Horton witnessed some gross violations of the acts. He saw liquor sold from bars in the back of shops which bore the resemblance on their face of tailor shops. Drug stores plied; a thriving trade and had printed forms with blanks for the customers to note down the disease which they wished to get the liquor to oure. But even bolder infringements were noticed. Houses with the name "saloon" printed in the well-known glaring signs had within their walls bars over which liquor was openly sold to everyone who had the money to pay for what he ordered.

This so-called prohibition State wasn't behind its wicked neighbors in works of iniquity. Gambling was prevalent. Sharks fleeced the innocent at dice, roulette, faro and crap shooting.
