WATFORD HAS VENERABLE PIONEER

Mrs. Jane Stapleford is Great Grandmother at Ninety-Eight

Watford boasts a great, great-grandmother, still hale and hearty, and probably the only great, great-grandmother in Ontario. Mrs. Jane Stapleford of Watford, who numbers her years at 98 and her direct descendants at 117, claims what is likely a record. Representatives of five generations are living in Lambton county or in this vicinity. Mrs. Stapleford is the oldest living member of the clan, aged 98 years, Chas. Dougherty, Junior, 157 Front street, Sarnia, aged seventeen months, is the youngest. Mrs. Sarah Wise of Port Huron is great-grandmother of Charles, and George Wise of 115 Margaret street, Sarnia, is a grandfather. Mrs. Freda Dougherty, mother of Charles, Junior, completes the long chain. The combined ages of the five generations total 255 years and 7 months. Mrs. Stapleford's maiden name was Land. She was born in Hamilton in 1825. She lived in the Mountain City until she married, moving to Lambton county, where she has resided ever since, barring four years in which she resided in Port Huron. Direct descendants of Mrs. Stapleford number 117, including nine children, seven of whom are still living, 34 grandchildren, 61 great-grandchildren and 13 great-great-grandchildren.

DEATH OF DUNCAN CAMPBELL

The death of Duncan Campbell Friday removes another of Warwick's pioneers. Mr. Campbell was 70 years of age last April and was one of 10 sons, all of whom were living at the time of their parents' golden wedding. Four of the brothers survive, Malcolm of Brooke, Peter and George of Forest, and Alex. in Warwick.

Deceased lived in Warwick till last fall, when he moved to Forest. His wife, who was Catherine Trowbridge predeceased him 12 years ago. They had five children, Dr. Alex Campbell, of Elkton, Mich.; Archie, in London; Robert, a student at Woodstock College; Mrs. McEachren, of Elkton and Ella, at home. During his life Mr. Campbell took an active interest in township matters. He was councillor for one year and deputy reeve for two years, and an elected member of the Township Council for two terms. He was for many years a director of the Forest Agricultural Society.

The funeral service took place in the Baptist church, Forest, Saturday afternoon, Rev. Thos. Doolittle, the pastor, and Rev. J. S. Leckie, of Wallaceburg, officiating. Interment was made in Beechwood cemetery. A large number of relatives and friends were present from a distance.

STRATHROY CREAMERIES BURGLARIZED

Strathroy, Sept. 23.—Robbers broke into the Strathroy Creameries some time during the early hours of Sunday morning and made a clean get-away with 945 pounds of butter, valued at about \$400. The robbery was discovered this morning by Herbert Wade, the butter-maker, who at once notified Mr. Waddell, proprietor of the creamery.

Police Chief Wilson was called and immediately got in touch with the London police, who are working on the case.

Apparently the thieves were acquainted with the premises as entrance was gained through a window and a bar removed from the engine room door, through which the butter was carried to a truck which drove into the lane between the factory and the garage. The lock on the refrigerator door was pried off and the butter removed. Two boxes of solid, one of 56 pounds and the other of a 14-pound special were opened, but were passed up for 45-pound boxes of prints. Twenty-five boxes of prints were taken.

The door of the office, in which were a safe and cash register, was open, but neither apparently was touched.

A red truck came in town from the East on Metcalfe street during the evening and was seen parked north of the factory, on Head street, after midnight. Detective Down, of London who was out here early this morning on other business, passed a truck loaded with boxes about 5 o'clock. Arrests in the case are expected shortly.

Dunnville Board of Education has passed a resolution prohibiting agents from canvassing their teachers during school hours.

A Harrow township man gathered two bushels of mushrooms and sold them on the Windsor market for \$28.80. A good day's pay.

The widow of the late Owen Gallagher of Caradoc died last week in her 90th year. She had been a resident of the township for over 60 years. She leaves four sons and two daughters.

There is a sunflower growing in Matthew Cutting's garden on Wilson ave., Essex, which has ninety-six flowers on one stock. This is something that has never been seen or heard of before.

A Mersea tobacco grower picked a top leaf from one of his plants which measured 40 inches long and 19 inches wide at the broadest point. The leaf is of the Yellow Pryor variety.

October 22nd is the day set by the Provincial Government for the Provincial bye-election in Lennox, necessitated by the death of Dr. J. P. Vrooman. Liberal, who was returned at the last election.

The Petrolia fair was favored with excellent weather and had a big attendance. The buildings were filled with entries and the secretary states that the fair was the best in years. The horse races furnished plenty of entertainment.

At an industrial committee meeting of the Strathroy town council it was decided that the question of holding the municipal elections on the first Monday in December, instead of on the first Monday in January, as heretofore, should be submitted to the vote of the electors at the coming election.

Bears are attacking sheep in broad daylight at Apsley, 35 miles north of Peterboro. Howard Harris, a resident of the district, found a bear devouring the carcass of a sheep it had killed, and Albert Wilson shot another bear and two cubs. Several have been seen in the vicinity of the village recently.

Mrs. John Woodley, Petrolia, aged 86, is the oldest member of a family of five generations and has four great great grandchildren. Prior to the death of Mrs. Elijah Loxton, Petrolia could boast of a family with both great great grandparents living.

Mrs. E. Loxton died a week ago, but she is survived by her husband, who is 82 years old and a great great grandfather.

Peter Lampman, Wyoming, had a narrow escape from injury the other night when driving along the London road in his car, when he struck and killed a horse which ran out of an open gate onto the highway. The radiator and one fender of the auto were badly damaged, but none of the occupants were injured. The accident occurred near the Leitch road.

A very serious accident occurred at the home of Harry Walton, Jr., Sarnia, on Thursday afternoon when Maizie, the little daughter of Mr. Walton, while playing in the yard fell over some cement blocks, striking the back of her head on the blocks. One of the blocks fell on her face, causing a fracture to the base of the brain. Although at first slight hopes were held for her recovery she is not unconscious, but is gradually improving and her condition was very encouraging.

A particularly sad death occurred in the village of Wheatley on Tuesday afternoon when Mrs. Eric Mills succumbed to the effects of blood poisoning. On Thursday or last week a cold sore on her face became infected and although prompt medical attention was given, and later the services of four doctors and a graduate nurse employed, nothing could prevent the rapid march of the messenger of death, and she passed away about one o'clock on Tuesday afternoon.

WATFORD FAIR CALLED OFF

What Would Have Been a Most Successful Fair Spoiled By Two Days' Rain, Trials of Speed Will be Held Next Month.

The Directors of the East Lambton Fall Fair were particularly unfortunate in the matter of weather this year, a continuous rain or drizzle on both days making it necessary to call off all proceedings.

On Thursday a large number of entries were made and the goods to be shown in the buildings brought in and judged. At evening, as there were no prospects of the weather clearing, the Directors decided to cancel the fair and other attractions billed for Friday, and it is well that they did so, for that day was even more disagreeable than the previous one.

With such wet weather few people came to town and the exhibitors in the building were allowed to remove their exhibits early in the afternoon. Less than \$20 was taken at the gate.

The dance in the Armory in the evening was much enjoyed by the young people and the Lyceum seating capacity was filled to see the Ford picnic pictures and the other reels.





INJUNCTION AGAINST LONDON MOTORS

Prohibited From Cashing Bond Secured from Warwick Man

Toronto, Sept. 20.—The story revealing how Robert Wilkinson, aged 95 years, was induced to invest a \$5000 Victory Bond in shares in a way that is described as "grossly foolish and imprudent" is told in a judgment written by Justice Fisher. His lordship directs that the papers

in the case be laid before the crown attorney for Lambton for that officer to take what action he deems proper.

Robert Wilkinson lives in the Township of Warwick, Lambton County. He was a shareholder in London Motors, Limited. On July 23 last M. Lewis and a man calling himself Conley called upon him and induced him to take further shares. He decided to invest an additional \$1,000 in shares, the judgment states and went to his bedroom to get his check book. Conley followed him and

on the drawer being pulled out a \$5,000 Victory Bond was exposed. The old man gave checks aggregating \$1,000 and his visitors departed.

Two days later Lewis appeared again and with him was W. R. Stansell, president of the company. "They were after the \$5,000 Victory Bond," says Justice Fisher. They asked the old man to let them have the bond and they would not only return it to him in 30 days, but would pay over to him \$2,500, the judgment continues. Lewis took the

Shortly afterwards a bank manager at Forest, the judgment says, telephoned the old man's son that an effort was being made to cash his father's bond. The son at once took action and secured an interim injunction restraining the holders negotiating the bond.

Justice Fisher continues the injunction to the trial.

"If this company," he says, is not able to exist without the aid of money secured as the bond and checks were alleged to have been secured in this transaction and not denied, it then seems to me the shareholders would be considering their best interests by holding an investigation of the methods adopted in selling its shares."
