

Killing Weeds by Spraying

The Experiment Station at North Dakota has issued a bulletin on Weed Control by means of Chemical

Experiments in spraying to eradicate weeds in grain fields have been conducted at that station from season to season for the past ten years. The results obtained show that the general use of this method of com bating certain weeds will save the farmers of the country millions of dollars annually. It is not expected that spraying will supplant other methods of keeping weeds in check, but that it will supplement these methods and prove available in fighting many of the most pernicious weeds which come up in fields of grain. The possibility of success in

killing weeds in a grain field by the use of a chemical spray, which does not injure the grain, will not surprise those who are familiar with the use of spraying compounds to demuch—say two or three hours—the fever or diphtheria bleaks out in the are plants of a low order. Only by experiment is it possible to learn what weeds can be killed by a spray are growing.

The best time which develop slowly under dry conditions are much harder to kill.

Mustard or charlock can be readily killed by spraying with solutions of phate. It requires about 52 gallons of spraying liquid per acre. To make the liquid, use from 75 to 100 pounds of iron sulphate for each 52 gallons of water, or 12 to 15 pounds of coper sulphate.
