ASTRONOMICAL PHENOMENA FOR THE YEAR 1854.

ECLIPSES.

There will be Four Eclipses in 1854—two of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I.—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, Friday May 12; invisible in Newfoundland, Western Coast America, and England; visible in China, Australia, and Eastern Hemisphere generally.

Middle of Eclipse 14 min. past noon; 10

Duration of contact with shadow . . . 1 h. 46 min.

Magnitude—one fourth, on the Southern limb.

II.—Annular Eclipse of the Sun, Friday May 26, invisible at Greenwich; visible in Newfoundland, Continent North America, North Pacific Ocean. It will not be an annular, but a partial Eclipse in this Island, the line of Central and Annular Eclipse falling 12° South of St. John's. The Eclipse will terminate, on the East coast of Newfoundland, at sunset ($\frac{1}{2}$ past 7), and be noticeable to a common observer at a few minutes past 6 p.m. Extent of obscuration— $\frac{1}{3}$ rds of the Sun's disc, on the lower limb, as shown in the annexed diagram.



Apparent semi-diameter of Sun 15 min. 49 sec.

Ditto ditto of Moon 14 min. 53 sec.

Moon's Horizontal Parallax 54 min. 34 sec.

Moon Apogee 29 d. 12h.

III.—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, November 4, visible in Newfoundland.

First contact with shadow 5 h. 14 m. evening

Middle Eclipse 5 h. 41 m. evening

Last contact with shadow 6 h. 18 m. evening

Magnitude of the Eclipse Diameter=1 (0.054)

Owing to the position of the Moon in the Eastern horizon and the small amount of the obscuration, this Eclipse will be barely observed here.

IV.—A total Eclipse of the Sun, November 20, invisible in Newfoundland. It will be visible in the Southern Hemisphere.

Begins on the Earth generally, Nov. 20, 3h. 47m. (mean time St. John's) in Longitude $24^{\circ} 2' W.$, Latitude $0^{\circ} 49' S.$

Central Eclipse begins generally, Nov. 20, at 4h. 54m. in Longitude $44^{\circ} 5' W.$ and Latitude $11^{\circ} 51' S.$

Ends on the Earth generally, Nov. 20, at 9 a.m., in Longitude $93^{\circ} 24' E.$ Latitude $35^{\circ} 48' S.$

The above is given in St. John's mean time (civil).

Variation of the Compass.

From the Records of Her Majesty's Magnetic Observatory. The mean variation at Toronto, for the year 1847, was $1^{\circ} 36'$ West (nearly); it increases about $3'$ every year. The variation undergoes a daily change, being least from 7 to 8 A.M., and greatest from 1 to 2 P.M. The variation is least liable to fluctuations in the afternoon; it is near its mean value at 10 A.M., and 6 to 7 P.M.

Description of the Lights. — **Fort Amherst.** — This is a Stationary Light, on the Southern head of the entrance of St John's Harbour. **Cape Spear.** — This is a powerful Revolving Light burning at an elevation of 275 feet above the level of the sea, and showing a brilliant flash at intervals of one minute; in clear weather it may be seen from sea, in any direction, at the distance of 39 miles. **Harbor Grace.** — This is a powerful Fixed Light situated on Harbor Grace Island, in Conception Bay, extending Eastwardly or seaward

in a direction by Compass from North-east to South-west. Bonavista—This Light revolves every two minutes, shewing a red and white flash, alternately; and is elevated 150 feet above the level of the sea. St Peter's—A light house has been erected by the French Government on Gallantry Head, near Cape Noir; the light is a fixed one, it burns at an elevation of about 210 feet above the level of the sea; it may be seen (in passing by the S) from WNW to NNE, at the distance of 18 or 20 miles in clear weather; in passing by the N, it is shut in by high land from NNE to WNW. Cape Pine—The character of this Light is that of a Brilliant Revolving Light, of which the greatest intensity will be apparent in every direction seaward twice in a minute; it will burn at an elevation of 302 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible in clear weather at a distance of 30 miles; the erection is a Round Tower 50 feet high, painted with bands of Red and White (horizontal) alternately. Cape Race Beacon—The total height of this Beacon is 65 feet; it stands on the rising ground 140 feet high, immediately behind Cape Race Rock, so that the top of the Beacon is at an elevation of 205 feet above the sea level; it is of hexagonal shape, 22 feet in diameter at the base, and 11 feet on each face; it tapers upwards to a height of 56 feet, where its diameter is but 2 feet 9 inches, and is then surmounted by a Skeleton Ball 9 feet in diameter—making the total height 65 feet; it is constructed of timber framework with exterior clap-boarding, and its faces are painted alternately White and Red (vertical) and the Ball at the top Red, at sunset turns over in artificial ways to the north, east, south, and west. Population of Cities in Europe and America.

From Hunt's Merchants' Magazine.

Weza's *Volks-Kalender* (People's Almanac) for 1853, published annually at Leipzig, furnishes the following table of the population of the principal cities of Europe and North America. Of European cities, London stands first, Paris second, and Constantinople third. New York stands fourth on the list—no other city having so large a population except the above named cities of Europe; Philadelphia, ninth; Baltimore, twenty-first; and Boston the twenty-eighth. As a matter of curiosity and reference, the table may be worth preserving in the pages of the *Merchants' Magazine*.

We may remark that there are several cities in India, China, and Japan, which are reported to contain a larger population than that of Paris, but not being in Europe or North America, they are of course excluded from the above list, in which also is omitted the city of Mexico, (which should not have been omitted,) containing a population of about 200,000.
