THE ENEMY HAS ADVANCED INTO BELGIUM

THESE NATIONS MUST FIGHT ITALY, BULGARIA, GREECE, PORTUGAL AND ROUMANIA.

GREECE, ITALY AND PORTUGAL SOON INTO WAR

Bulgaria Also May Side With Allies Against Turks.
TURKEY'S ARMY PLANS Britain Must Raise More Men to Cope With the Situation.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 30.—The complications of the European war have been increased by the entrance of the Turkish empire into the conflict on the side of the Teutonic allies. Following the Emperor's exploit in bombarding Theodosia, Russia, Turkish destroyers have sunk the Russian gunboat, Demeter in Odessa harbor and damaged three Russian and one French merchantmen. No official declaration of war has been made, but Turkey's action seems to make it probable that the area of conflict may be greatly widened and the issues complicated. The Balkans, whose springs the present European conflict, present a network of hostile interests that Greece and the other Balkan nations may easily be drawn into the vortex. Greece it is believed will likely be the first state now neutral to throw her weight against the Ottoman army. Bulgaria holds a remarkable position. She is bound to Russia by racial ties and to Great Britain by obligations for financial support in the last war. But her interests and sentiments are violently hostile to Turkey and Greece. Turkey's Program. An attempt to invade the Caucasus on one side and Egypt on the other is the program military men think the Turkish army is likely to endeavor to carry out. Turkish forces have been gathering recently in Syria and Palestine, but a march across the Sinai peninsula will be a hard one. The country is virtually a desert. The English papers are confident that the protection of the Suez canal against a raid and of Egypt against invasion are well provided for. They recognize that the addition of Turkey to the belligerent forces probably will prolong the war and increase its horrors. They say that this means that Great Britain must raise more men. How long Italy can remain aloof is a question being asked by the newspapers. The Portuguese government describes the German invasion of Angola as a small affair, but it is thought here that it may result in bringing Portugal definitely into the general war on the side of the triple entente.

CATTARO FORTS ARE DEMOLISHED

Surrender of Port Cannot Long Be Delayed, Says Official Announcement From Cetinje.

CETINJE, Oct. 30.—That the fortifications of Cattaro, the Austrian naval base, have been practically demolished by the combined fire of French and Montenegrin artillery on Mount Lovchen and from French and British warships off shore is the official announcement made here today. Fort Warmat and Fort Lusstica are in ruins, and the surrender of the port cannot be long deferred, it is believed. Austrian aeroplanes have dropped nine bombs on Anjivari without loss of life and with but little damage to property. GENERAL ATTACK MADE ON FORTS OF TSINGTAU

British, Japanese and East Indian Troops Combine in Assault on German Position.

HUNDREDS LOST IN SINKING OF HOSPITAL SHIP

British Steamer Rohilla Wrecked on Northern Coast of England.

TWO HUNDRED ON BOARD Nurses Were Saved—Lifeboats Were Smashed by Terrific Seas.

Canadian Press Despatch. WIMBORNE, England, via London, Oct. 30.—(11:30 p.m.)—The loss of life on the British hospital ship Rohilla, which crashed on the rocks of the Yorkshire coast near here before dawn today, is a matter of doubt tonight. It is believed at least 100 perished. The vessel, however, is a total wreck, having broken in two, while lifesavers on shore were shooting lines and trying vainly to make one fast to the ill-fated ship. Bearing physicians, nurses and hospital supplies, the Rohilla was on her way to a Belgian or a French port to succor the wounded, when she was driven ashore. It is understood that all the women on board were saved, including one who was a survivor of the Titanic disaster. The fate of the physicians is uncertain, as is that of the captain and the crew. The total number of people on board is not definitely known, but some estimates place it at 200.

RUSSIAN SUBMARINES SUNK?

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 30, via London, Oct. 30, 8:40 p.m.—The Berlin newspaper, Zeitung Am Mittag, publishes today what purports to be an official communication from Constantinople. It states: "Russian torpedo boats attempted to prevent the Turkish fleet leaving the Bosphorus and steaming into the Black Sea. The Turkish ships opened fire and sank two of the Russian vessels. More than thirty Russian sailors, saved by the Turks, were made prisoners. The Turkish fleet sustained no losses."

FIVE SUNK, SAYS BERLIN.

NICKEL CLASSED AS CONTRABAND

Government Prohibits Many Exports to Enemy's Country Directly or Indirectly.

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Enemy's Offensive on the Coast is Definitely Ended, and the Allies Are Advancing Slowly, But Steadily, North of Yser River—Germans Fortify Aix-La-Chapelle in Preparation for Retreat by Way of Namur and Liege—Fierce Fighting Has Re-started in Flanders—Indian Contingent Joins in Attack on Tsingtau—Turkey's Action Widens War Area and Complicates the Issues.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—All reports indicate that the Germans have lost their last foothold on the allied side of the Yser, and that the French-British-Belgian forces are pushing steadily forward into Belgium. It may be stated positively that the German offensive on the coast is definitely ended. However, no one believes for a moment that the enemy's commanders will relax their efforts to cut a way thru to the French coast. The next operation, it is thought, will be directed against Boulogne. For this purpose heavy reinforcements are arriving at a point not far from Ypres. North and northeast of that town allied forces won favorable positions today, emphasizing their successful advance of the last three days, which has resulted in pushing the German front backward a good distance from the town.

Dutch correspondents declare that the German base at Aix-la-Chapelle, across the river from Liege, is being heavily fortified, and that the invaders are preparing for a retreat by way of Namur and Liege in the event of complete disaster. Great stores of war material are arriving at Aix-la-Chapelle. Information from Holland also says that many German soldiers, disheartened by their losses and the ineffectual attempt to take Dunkirk, are striving to reach Holland and surrender to the Dutch.

ALL ROADS ARE WATCHED. In order to prevent these wholesale desertions, the Germans have organized a bicycle patrol that is watching all roads to Dutch territory. Many German stragglers found on both the Belgian and Dutch side of the border are crased from their terrible experiences on the fighting line.

The entire front from Nieuport eastward to a point beyond Ypres is covered with the corpses of German soldiers. At Dixmude the streets are choked with dead, and half mad stragglers hide in the few remaining buildings. Every village between Nieuport and Dixmude has been completely obliterated. The allies are taking such sanitary precautions as the exigencies of the situation will allow.

GERMANS ARE TROUBLED. The French advance in Alsace and Lorraine is seriously troubling the German plan of strategy. The armies of the republic are now menacing Strasbourg, where hurried preparations are under way to withstand a siege. All wounded Germans at St. Louis have been removed across the Rhine. Applications for safe conduct in Upper Alsace are denied.

Breastworks are being thrown up all along the Rhine, and both Metz and Cologne are in a state of excitement, as guards are doubled and the fortifications strengthened.

BRITISH REPEL VIOLENT ATTACKS. The following official communication was issued tonight by the French War Office: "In Belgium, according to the latest advices, there is nothing to report in the region of Nieuport or Dixmude. "On our left wing the enemy has directed violent attacks against the front of the British troops, and on the two banks of the La Bassée Canal without obtaining any success. "There has been a recrudescence of activity in the region of Rheims and along the heights of the Meuse at the south of Fresnes-en-Woevre."

ENEMY COMPELLED TO WITHDRAW. The French War Office issued the following statement this afternoon: "On the extreme left inundations brought about by the Belgian army in the lower valley of the River Yser have compelled the forces of the enemy which had passed the river to withdraw. They were subjected to a violent cannonade by the Belgian and French artillery during their movement of retreat. "The Germans endeavored yesterday to deliver very violent counter attacks on the French and British army corps which were progressing to the northeast and east of Ypres. "At the end of the day our troops had, notwithstanding, continued their forward movement in the direction which had been assigned them, and had also taken possession of various points of support.

LOST GROUND REGAINED. The British troops, assailed at several points north of La Bassée by superior forces, resumed the offensive with energy and reconquered to a considerable extent the terrain yielded to the enemy. At several other points on their line of combat the British troops repulsed the attacks of the Germans, inflicting important losses. "On the remainder of the front there has been no general action.

THE fact that guinea, rubber, and even a vegetable milk comes from trees, is brought to mind in the announcement just reported that the wood of certain trees, upon which disease germs grow, can be made into a decoction which can be used as a vaccination in place of the particular bacterial and malignant molds which thrive upon the trees.



Next to the Tree of Life, says Genesis, the Tree of Knowledge grew first. Milton, in "Paradise Lost," added, "Knowledge of good, brought dear by knowing ill." The Tree of Life was in the midst of the garden of Eden, of which, if Adam had plucked and eaten, he would have lived forever and bequeathed eternal life and health to mankind.

Knowledge of the ways of civilization, morality, peace, sanitation and good will are all available for the warring nations. They all know how to prevent bloodshed and disease, but they have chosen not to make use of the Tree of Life.

The Alder Tree. If each soldier and sailor who has been ordained to take part in this war of all conflicts had been inoculated with the killed and boiled microbes of typhoid fever, dysentery, cholera, lockjaw and the other fevers which rage in war times, they would have been protected from these ailments as surely as they are by vaccination nowadays from smallpox.

Among the trees noted, for their many properties, which in some manner aid the health, strength and comfort of the human tribe, may be mentioned the alder. It is particularly objectionable to the insect upon whose backs and legs the plague bacillus rides.

In former days the alder tree was used for piles, foundation, wharves, docks, and even water pipes. When driven into the water they become black as jet and as impermeable. The foundations of many of the buildings on the canals of Venice, and the Rialto of Venice are built of these asplastic alder trees.

The Olive Tree. Wooden shoes, clogs, cogs of mill wheels, bean poles, garden props, chairs and wooden vessels for hospitals and sick rooms are preferably made of alder.

The sycamore tree is another common tree of great value to man's health and happiness. It is common in the West Indies and in some parts of the United States, and is particularly common in the West Indies.

Olives and olive oil are peculiar food and medicine to the human tribe. The trees on the Mount of Olives were still flourishing 500 years ago when the Turks took Jerusalem. Olive oil is one of the most valuable of all oils.

At the Toronto Hospital for incurables yesterday afternoon the board of management presented the 33rd annual report in the presence of an audience consisting of friends and officers of the hospital. The chairman, Sir Mortimer Clark, placed before his audience the requirements of the board, especially the urgent necessity of financial support, which, he said, must not be lost sight of, in spite of all the other equally worthy demands made on the Toronto public.

Owing to the almost absolute helplessness of so many of the patients, a large staff of nurses is required, more accordingly than for any other institution. The staff now consists of 3 graduate nurses, 17 in training, 5 orderlies and 23 domestics. There is an excellent medical staff of 50 in constant attendance, and the hospital is reported at present in the hospital by Miss Green, lady superintendent. The secretary-treasurer, Mr. N. W. C. O'Connell, reported an overdraft of \$3203, only a deficit of \$802, however, being chargeable to the year.

NINETEEN WOMEN KILLED BY BOMB

German Make Aerial Raid on Bethune, France, With Deadly Effect. Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 30.—Two German aeroplanes on Wednesday dropped a bomb on Bethune, France, according to the correspondent of The Daily Express in North France, who reported that the bomb, which fell among market women, killed 19 of them and injured 40 others. Two bombs were also dropped at Dunkirk on the same day from a Zeppelin machine, 9000 feet up in the air. A woman and child were killed and all the windows in the neighborhood were smashed. The women of the town are terrified.

NORTHERN WATERS RICH AS FISHERIES

Hudson and James Bays Afford Excellent Conditions for Prosperous Industry.

By a Staff Reporter.

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.—With a view to developing the fisheries of Hudson and James Bays upon the completion of the Hudson Bay railway and the establishment of a line of steamers from Port Nelson to the inside world, the naval service department sent three expeditions last summer to report on the fisheries of these northern waters. The party which went to the east coast of James Bay found excellent conditions for establishing a white fish fishery.

Lake herring are also to be caught in great quantities by gill nets, and the establishment of a canning industry might be quite feasible. Specimens of trout of large size are also found, as many as 40 trout averaging 2-1/2 pounds having been caught with a small net. The Indians stated that large quantities of cod weighing as high as 20 to 25 pounds can be obtained in February and March. Sturgeon were found in nearly all the southern rivers, and information from the Indians leads to the belief that inland in the numerous lakes and rivers which will be tapped by the N.E.R. fisheries of the most valuable of all Canadian fish will be found to be most available.

THOUSAND PASTORS WOULD GO TO WAR

This Number Volunteers to Be Chaplains With Second Force.

NO DEARTH OF NURSES

Militia Department Will Allow Only Fully Qualified Ones to Go.

By a Staff Reporter.

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.—About 1000 Canadian clergymen have applied to the militia department to go to the front as chaplains with the next contingent. If the same proportion of chaplains to troops is maintained as was the case with the first contingent there will be one to every thousand men. Thirty-two chaplains went with the first contingent, and it is learned that over 20 were Anglicans, and the most of the remainder were Presbyterians, Anglicans and Presbyterians far outnumbered the members of other religious bodies in the first contingent.

Before the troops mobilized at Valcartier Gen. Hughes intimated that six Salvation Army officers would go with them as chaplains, but it was found that there were practically no members of the Salvation Army in the ranks, and it was decided to send clergymen whose ministrations would be more familiar to the troops.

As to the nurses to be chosen there is some doubt. Nothing definite will be done until information is received from the war office. It is stated that only qualified nurses will be chosen. Many girls and women have applied who have not had a thorough training, and while their offers of service are recognized as highly patriotic, it is certain that the militia authorities will not allow untrained nurses to be sent, and thereby bring about conditions which would result in wounded Canadian soldiers falling into hands of unskilled nurses. There is a scarcity of qualified officers in the militia at present as a result of so many being sent with the first contingent. The government, therefore, will not allow any more officers to serve as privates as was the case with the first contingent.

Specially good recruits are reported from Toronto and the west. Toronto is expected to have its full complement within fifteen days.

FISHER RELENTLESS IN NAVAL WARFARE

Britain's New First Sea Lord Believes in Summary Justice.

CAPITAL OF BUKOWINIA OCCUPIED BY RUSSIANS

Czernowitz is in Their Possession for the Second Time.

Canadian Press Despatch.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Fred T. Jane, naval author and journalist, whose intimate acquaintance with naval matters makes his statements authoritative, writing in The Evening Standard, says that under the Fisher naval administration "we may expect a rapid curtailment of the rights of neutrals to come and go as they please in our waters."

"Ruthless, remorseless, and relentless," the writer says, "was one of Lord Fisher's war maxims in the old days. We may look for short shrift from him for any German captured who has achieved results by using any flag except his own. It will probably be a case of being fired and inquired afterwards, and if public opinion or the cabinet object let them object."

Mr. Jane suggests that the humanitarian element in the British Cabinet has hitherto interfered in a question like that of mine-laying, and he says that Lord Fisher will not permit such interference.

MEN OF SECOND DIVISION PARADED AT ARMORIES

Canada's Second Force Looks Well — Kits Are on Way From Ottawa.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Nearly 500 men who are chosen to go with the second contingent to Europe paraded at the armories yesterday. The men look well and are a proof of the severity of the weeding-out process that accompanied the selection. When Colonel Elliott was asked to name the date of assembly at the Exhibition Park, he answered "any time now. As soon as we can get the place ready. They might move in Monday."

Kits are being made, and some are now on the way to Toronto. The task of equipping the troops is left with the department of militia and defence at Ottawa.

The preparations at the park are nearly completed, and the 6th Mississauga Horse will leave today. The canteen has been left in the hands of the Y.M.C.A. and will be "dry." No orders for extra troops are yet at hand.

A meeting will be held at 8 o'clock on Tuesday evening at the Clearing House, corner Yonge and Wellington streets, for the purpose of organizing a Bank Messenger Company as a unit of the Toronto Home Guard Association. S. N. Francis of the Metropolitan Bank will inform anyone who is interested.

FARM BUILDINGS BURN WITH HEAVY LOSSES

Special to The Toronto World. CORNWALL, Ont., Oct. 30.—A barn on the Carton farm, owned by the Longue Sault Development Company, of which Charles Cornell is tenant, caught fire from some unknown cause and was completely destroyed, together with two horses, two pigs, all his hay, grain and fodder, and most of the farming machinery. Sparks were blown to the Sutton farm, occupied by William Raymond, and set fire to the barn, but was extinguished. The fire then spread to the McLellan farm, and the barn, house and several small buildings were completely destroyed, as well as three pigs, several hens and all the farming tools except a wagon and carriage. Curtis Wells is the occupant of the McLellan farm. The loss in each case is heavy.

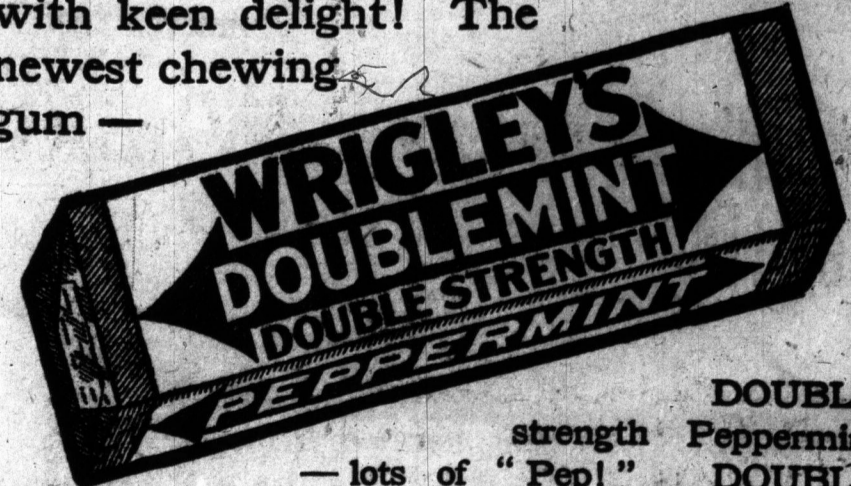
URGES STUDENTS TO DRILL

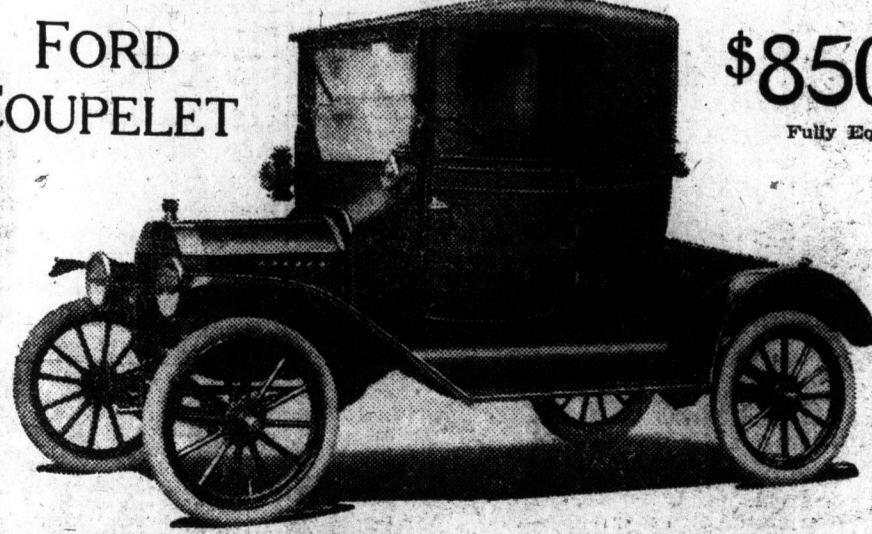

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JUDGE INCENSED AT CAR SERVICE

Instructs Grand Jury to Hear Crown's Indictment Against T. S. R.

HERDED LIKE CATTLE

Make it Expensive for Companies to Abuse Public, Says Latchford.

Judge Latchford does not like riding on crowded street cars. He has instructed the grand jury to take the indictment which the crown has prepared against the Toronto Street Railway Company and report on it to the court.

"On leaving the court house shortly before 6 o'clock last night, I boarded a street car and in a short time 14 or 25 or 26 people were crowded on the back platform of the car. Among these was a child, three or four women and some girls. Two girls were on the steps when the conductor was not being able to see as plainly as I could, started the car. Fortunately nothing happened, but the lives of those girls were in danger and the comfort of all the passengers was in danger.

"I have seen similar cases, but were not so herded into cars where they would be overcrowded, there would be an outcry and doubtless some one would be punished. But we, as citizens, must be herded into cars with impunity. The responsibility is not with the Toronto Railway Co., but with you and me to put a stop to it by making it too expensive for companies to carry on their business in such a manner."

The George A. Fuller Company and the Dominion Bridge Company were each fined \$5000 for impairing the safety of pedestrians at the corner of King and Yonge streets when building the Royal Bank building. The jury returned a verdict of guilty in the easiest of the cases to the benefit of the Crown. Judge Latchford listened to the argument of I. F. Hellmuth, K.C., for the defence: "It seems to me that both sides who have played reckless disregard for the rights of the public, and there is no hope that the proper effect can be imposed by a small fine."

Then he imposed the above fine, which is one of the largest that have ever been handed down by a court.

Adolph Meyers was fined \$100 and costs or three months for endangering the safety of the public with a shunt at the corner of Toronto and Adelaide streets. He was given ten days in which to pay. The accused was pulling down the building that corner and bricks which were being put into the chute would sometimes fall thru the carelessness of the man who was pushing the wagons. On one occasion the trap of the chute was left open and bricks tumbled down with no wagon to receive them.

FURTHER ENLISTMENT AT ST. THOMAS ORDERED

ST. THOMAS, Ont., Oct. 30.—Lieut-Col. Green of the 26th Regiment, St. Thomas, received orders from military headquarters, Ottawa, for further enlistment in addition to the quota of 25 men already recruited for the second contingent of this regiment. The new recruits numbering 25, left for London today following the 40 that preceded the first of the week to this point. Seventy-eight men have passed the medical examination and a further detachment will go to London by the end of next week. Among the volunteers from St. Thomas there were no less than five sets of brothers on this contingent.

HERE'S REAL NEWS FROM OLD BERLIN

Londoners, in Terror of Zepelins, Flee to Scottish Heather.

DUNKIRK IS PANICKY

Japan's Aim to Free Asia of American and European Influence.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 30, 9:30 p.m.—The following despatch from Berlin was received here tonight by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Co.: "Dunkirk is preparing for a state of siege. In the event of a German advance the whole neighborhood will be flooded. Panic exists in the town of Dunkirk, upon which several German aviators have dropped bombs."

The rebellion in South Africa has increased. Gen. De Wet is at the head of the insurrection in the Orange Free State and Gen. Beyers in the Western Transvaal. The Boers have imprisoned many Englishmen.

The banks in Cairo, Egypt, have suspended business. The Anglo-French fleet has been recalled from the Dardanelles.

Ruins Destroyed. Vienna official advices say there has been no new developments in Galicia where both armies are well entrenched. Several Russian batteries have been destroyed by the heavy Austrian guns. A strongly fortified position has been captured after gallant resistance.

The enemy lost four guns, eight machine guns and five officers and 500 men, in addition to a great deal of war material.

The stock of copper in Germany is ample to provide war material even if the war should be of long duration. The stocks are large enough to satisfy the requirements of private industries.

TURKISH INFANTRY STRONGEST BRANCH

Three Hundred Thousand Trained Men Are Available for Struggle.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The full strength of Turkey's army is 300,000 trained men, according to statistics here, but in addition it is believed that there are about 400,000 irregulars, some of whom actually joined the army, while the rest are ready to do so.

The regular army is composed of 18 army corps, most of which are in Turkey in Asia. The infantry is said now to be the strongest branch. The artillery lost many of its guns during the recent Balkan war.

Turkey's naval strength consists of three battle ships, four cruisers, three torpedo gunboats, 10 destroyers, 10 torpedo boats, 25 small gunboats, a coast defence ship and some auxiliary craft. The battleships are old and none has guns larger than 11-inch.

TO EXCHANGE SUBJECTS NOT LIABLE FOR SERVICE

France to Send Back Quarter of a Million Austrians and Germans.

PARIS, Oct. 30.—The French government is arranging through the American embassy here to send to Germany and Austria all subjects of those countries now detained in France, who are convicts of those countries, many of whom probably will leave for Switzerland next week.

DROP COSTLY PLAN OF REORGANIZATION

Committee on Water Rates Will Not Spend Millions on Meters.

A DIVISION OF DUTIES

Board of Control Outlines Work of Projected Financial Expert.

The special committee investigating the water rates of Toronto yesterday requested Commissioner Harris and the city treasurer to report on how matters stand at present and for suggestions as to possible changes for the better. Commissioner Harris stated it would cost about \$5,000,000 to install meters, and the committee forthwith dropped the plan of reorganization.

The committee agreed that public services should be separate from private services, and it was suggested that consumers in the high pressure district should pay a special tax. When the committee gets the reports it will meet again, probably next week.

The following are the duties apportioned to the commissioner: Bonded debt, maturing debentures, interest coupons authorized debt, sinking fund and maintenance of all investments, bond sales of every description, loans arranged for, financial adviser of board of control and council, compilation and supervision of estimates, introduction of uniformity of accounting, confer with heads of departments with regard to financing projects works.

MAY USE NAMED CODES IN CABLES TO EUROPE

Cablegrams Will Be Decoded for Censor - Private Codes Not Accepted.

The C.P.R. Company's telegraph, connecting with the Commercial Cable Company, makes the following announcements re code in cablegrams: On and after Nov. 1 cablegrams in A, B, C code, fifth edition, Scott's code, tenth edition, Liebers' code or Western Union code, will be permitted by the British administration to and from Great Britain and Ireland. Messages in private code or any other unrecognized code will be stopped.

The use of the codes prescribed applies to countries outside of the European telegraph system, provided, of course, that these countries have no prohibition of their own in force. The name of the code used must appear on the face of all cables when filed. This indication will not be counted or charged for.

Plans were approved by the property committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon for the public school building to be erected at the corner of Colbeck avenue and Rynmunde road.

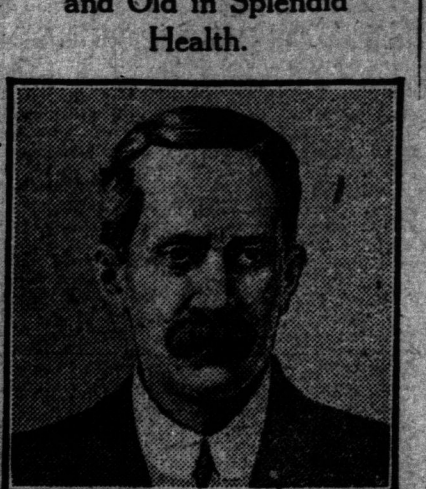
TWO DAMAGE ACTIONS LOST BY THE CITY
