BANK OF MONTREAL REPORT.

The satisfactory nature of the year's business of the Bank of Montreal will appear from a perusal of the annual report published elsewhere in this issue of The Commercial. The report shows the payment of the usual dividend of 10 per cent., and the addition of not less than a million dollars to the reserve fund, thus placing the bank in a stronger position than ever before. Thinterest in the meeting was largely in the remarks of the vice-president and the general manager bearing on the commercial situation. These were generally satisfactory. The increased resources of the bank were in their way evidence of the continued growth of trade throughout the country past year was referred to as a prosperous one, and the hand of the commercial barometer still points to "fair." The national revenues are large and so are the earnings of the great transportations concerns; farmers are doing well, the lumber trade sees an improving outlook, and an increasing inflow of immigration promises a rapid growth of trade in western Canada The natural resources of the country are being developed; and if there have been exceptions to the general rule they are to be traced to the faults of management or undue competition, two things that no general prosperity can give security against. Mr. Clouston referred in his remarks to the noteworthy stock exchange activity which en widely commented on. There was, he said, foundation for the advance in securities; but there is danger of speculation being carried beyoud legitimate bounds and he thought we had reached a point where investors and lenders would do well to look co closely into the intrinsic value of the securities they purchase or accept as collaterals.



THE BUSINESS SITUATION

Eriday June 14.

Fine, bright weather is stimulating trade throughout the entire There is disappointment in some places that more wheat was not sown, but this will soon disappear before the rapidly increasing prospects of a heavy yield from that which was sown. The weather is of such a character at present that growth is exceptionally rapid and if continued the wheat will soon be heading out. There is undoubtedly more rain than the country needs but this is compensated to some extent by bright suns between the storms The effect of these weather and crop conditions upon business is most stimulating. Summer lines in every branch of trade are in heavy de mand. Dry goods, furnishings, boots and shoes, etc., are all active. Outing goods are coming into request in large quantities. In the solider hardware, paints, etc., there is an insistent demand which absorbs goods as fast as they can be shipped. Groc eries and green fruits are also in good demand. Price changes have been few and of no great importance this week. In many lines it is not a question of prices, but of getting the goods. The most notable change is a general advance of 5 per cent in the price of stoves. The labor situation has not changed much this The Canadian Northern Railway Company still maintains its foolish attitude of non-recognition towards the machinists' union and they are consequently still on strike. The wipers employed by this road at Winnipeg are also out now, sympathy with the machinists. The Paulin-Chambers' Company also adheres to its policy of not recognizing the union of its candy-making girls and they are still out. There is a good demand for rough labor for railway and other outdoor work.

Warm summer weather is creating a demand for mid-summer lines and there has been a noticeable increase in the dry goods movement this week. Letter orders from the country are numerous, showing that stocks must be pretty well broken into, and immebe pretty well broken into, and immediate shipment is asked for in many cases. With a continuance of the present weather there should be a splendid trade in dry goods during the remaining half of this month. Then there will be a lull as most families go away for holldays after the public away for holldays after the public there will be a lull as most families go away for holidays after the public schools close. Travellers are out with full ranges of fall samples and the returns from their work have so far been very satisfactory. Values rule steady for most lines. Cottons are increasingly firm.
