





At Toronto five and ten car load lots of No. 2 red could be had around \$1,10, country farmers on the local market, however, realizing \$1.15 to \$1.17 for extra-anality deli-Thursday Evening, May 12,

According to reports from the far Western States the present indications are that the farms out there will give an increased harvest this year. In the Pacific Northwest the increase in the grain acreage is about 16 per cent, over last, year, and all the crops are in the best condition. Along the line of the "Ontario Rallway & Navigation" the estimate of the grain increase is 15 per cent, over last year's acreage, the increase being made up chiefly of spring sowing induced by the high prices recently existing for wheat. The Northern Pacific reports an increase of about 10 per cent, in the acreage of grain along its lines. In some regions, such as Willamette Valley, the acreage this year is as high as 75 per cent, in excess of last season, Rallway men are greatly pleased over the outlook, as they think it means larger traffic receipts for them the coming season.
