





Can Hardly Be Resumed Before November, in the Opinion of a Correspondent.

MERICAN ARMY CAN DO NOTHING

Than Hold What Has Been Gained Until the Rainy Season is Over.

Aug. 4.-The Tribune's special ent at Manila sends his paper owing: "The next campaign can begin sooner than November, aih the country may dry up enough tords the middle of October to permit the wards the middle of October to permit the American troops to take the field then. "The American army during the rainy bearon can hardly be expected to do anything more than hold what it has gained and prepare for the next campaign. Northward the farthest point in the control of the Americans is San Fernando, 41 miles from Manila on the railroad. The railroad is 149 miles in length, but the insurgents control all the track between San Fernando and Dagupan, the northwestern terminal of the road.

The insurrectionists are in possession of three-fourths of the rolling stock. They

of the road.

The insurrectionists are in possession of three-fourths of the rolling stock. They have 27 of the road's locomotives, while the Americans have only four. The rest of the rolling stock is also distributed between the two parties in a like ratio.

"The Americans hold Candiba, cast of San Fernando 10 miles. They hold all the towns along the railroad, of course, to San Fernando and Balluag, seven miles east of Pullian.

Reports continually come from Balluag that the town is entirely surrounded by the enemy, and is about to be carried by assault. But Colonel Page and the 3rd Infantry have so far driven the rebels back with disastrous results every time they assaulted the town, and he declares he can hold it for an indefinite time. Supplies and mail can only be carried over to Balluag from the Tallroad under an escort of not less than 150 men, who are invariably attacked somewhere along the road both going and-coming.

"The insurgents have their intrenchments drawn well around both San Fernando and Balluag, and their outposts are in sight of the American outposts.

"An officer down from San Fernando told me to day that the insurgents seemed never to relax their vigilance. Their sharpshooters and skirmishers are always alert, and framently the showing of a head by a careless American picket will draw four or five shots from the enemy in a twinkiling, and start a general fusilade.

"The insurgents are continually receiving fresh supplies and arms. At Paranaque a week ago they astonished the Americans by bringing out some modern field pieces they had obtained somewhere. Heavy shipments of arms are said to be constantly arriving from Japan and Australia, and, it is said, even from our own country. Cartridges picked up in the insurgent trenches bear the trade mark of a large manufacturing from in the United States. The insurgents have three factories where they manufacture cartridges and other munitions of war. They are learning things in every encounter with the Americans, and are fighting with a determination. The papers in Manila have continually referred to the fact that the reliefs were proper to shoot too high, and they seemed finally to nave learned the lesson and now they are getting their shots well down and showing a great improvement in marksmanship. rgents Getting Fresh Supplies






