RENEW FIGHT FOR EQUAL PRIVILEGE FOR BRAMPTON TRAVELERS COMMUTERS' RATES

Chairman Mabey of Dominion Railway Commission Rather Inclined to Protest at Hearing Arrangement.

G.T.R. TRAFFIC AGENT QUIZZED BY MR. DRAYTON

Brampton's application for an order to compel the Grand Trunk Railway to provide commutation rates to daily passengers and from Toronto was not received with very good grace by Chairman Mabey of the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners yesterday afternoon. His lordship jumped on F. W. Wegmann, who represents the town, right off the bat, with the suggestion that the case has "virtually been disposed of" by the former application charging discrimination against Brampton as compared with Oakville.

Mr. Drayton explained that the city was acting at the request of a large number of suburban villages as to the comparative rights of a district radiating from Toronto on one hand and a similar district around Brampton on the other. There were stations within a 45-mile radius of Toronto and of these 47 were within a 25-mile radius of Brampton. There were 15 stations enjoying commutation privileges and of course the balance had no special rates.

King's Message To the Empire

Promises to Safeguard Liberties of Colonies and Devote Himself to the Well-Being of the Indian People.

LONDON, May 23.—On the occasion of the anniversary of Empire Day, King George has issued two gracious messages to the colonies and India, somewhat similar in style to the message which he addressed yesterday to the nation.

AN INFERNAL LIE

So W. T. Stead Characterizes a Certain Report Concerning King George.

In a London cable to the New York American of yesterday, W. T. Stead says: "I am not a courtier, and am so far from being a persona grata with the new King in the last time that he expressed an opinion about me and my activities it was with the bluntness of the sailor man, and with epithets which are more familiar on a quarter-deck than in the palaces of kings. I have, therefore, no personal reason to defend the King against those who speak ill of him, but in the interest of truth and of justice it is necessary to characterize as they deserve the abominable lies which are being freely repeated from mouth to mouth by the King's own subjects.

I. C. R. HAS SURPLUS

Excess of Receipts Over Expenditures is \$23,164.

OTTAWA, May 23.—(Special.)—Under Hon. George P. Graham's administration the Intercolonial Railway has made a betterment of about \$1,200,000. That is, while last year there was a net deficit on the undertaking of about \$70,000, this year there is a surplus of over \$23,000.

According to the financial statement for the revenue for the fiscal year ending March 31, was \$9,288,234, and the total operating expenditure \$8,845,070, leaving a surplus of \$443,164. Of this, two-thirds was from freight earnings and one-third from mail, express and passenger receipts.

COUNCIL IS SOLID FOR REPORT ON TUBES

On Mr. Drayton's Advice, Ontario Railway Board's Order is Accepted by City—Government by Commission Not Very Popular.

Without a dissenting voice or even a word of discussion, the city council yesterday voted to accept the order of the Ontario Railway Board, granting the street railway's application for the right to build lines, and also to engage the engineering firm of Jacobs & Davies, New York, at a cost of \$8000, to report on a system of tube railways for Toronto. Ald. McMurrich, who it was expected would oppose proceeding with the tube plans, was absent.

So far as matters of fact are concerned, and so far as the policy to be adopted by the board is concerned, in remedying street railway grievances, the matter is entirely for them without the right of appeal at all, reported Corporation Counsel Drayton, adding that the Ontario Railway Board's recent judgment on the large question was entirely in the city's favor, adopting as it did in full the principles of the Williams report.

There was a difficulty in connection with the construction of tracks along Anderson-street, which would have to be widened, and, in Drayton's opinion, the board had no power to compel this. The city would have to get the consent of the university for the widening of that portion wanting on University-avenue. If this could not be done, the city engineer thought it might be necessary to use Elm-street.

Government by Commission. Ald. Heyd's motion for the appointment of a special committee to consider civic government by commission resulted, on the close vote of 11 to 9, in a reference to the legislation committee.

The alderman in advocating this plan as previously outlined in The World, asserted that the ward system now prevailed, aldermen devoting selfish attention to their own constituencies. He proposed the ward system be abolished directly to the people, the changing personnel of the council prevented continuity of policy. Aldermen harassed the ward committee by pestering them with requests for the appointment of friends.

It is public opinion that the alderman improperly introduced, declared Ald. Heyd, who referred to the great success of commission government in United States cities. In Quebec, all public works were handled by commissions, and the tax rate was the lowest in Canada.

Controller Church termed commission a "yank" and insisted that in cities where the worst form of graft and Tammanyism had existed, he charged The News with trying to introduce party bossism into Toronto's civic affairs.

Ald. Maguire said he thought Ald. Heyd had used "many misleading and untrue statements." He pointed out that a commission would be only an "aggravated form of board of control." Controller Spence added that he didn't think the ward of council would be improved by wiping out the aldermen.

Ald. Heyd drew attention to an evening paper statement that the council had received anonymous letters urging that Dr. Amoy be appointed medical health officer before Mayor Geary returned, and demanded to know who the recipients were. Controller Church admitted he was one, and Ald. Phelan remarked that if the latter's complaint by Dr. Amoy's friends, it was an indiscreet move, and if by enemies, a disreputable one.

Controller Church's suggestion that a public meeting be held to consider a permanent memorial to the late King was referred to the board of control. Controller Church complained that his colleagues were exhibiting masterly inactivity regarding harbor affairs, and moved for a special committee to study a waterfront policy and reorganize the harbor commission, but council voted to let the board manage things.

Will Get Full Pay. City hall employees who belong to the Queen's Own Rifles can go on Sir Henry Pellatt's personally conducted trip to England for six weeks on full pay allowance. There are about a dozen of these lucky ones, whose cause was pleaded by Col. Mason, Col. Gunther and Capt. K. K. Patrick. Only Controllers Foster and Spence, Ald. Phelan, Heyd and Baird voted against Ald. Elliott's motion to substitute full pay for the half pay recommended by the board.

BRITAIN ASKED BREAD AND WAS GIVEN A STONE

Orange Grand Master Fires Hot Shot Into the Canadian "Tin-Pot" Navy.

BRANTFORD, May 23.—(Special.)—The Black Chapter of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America assembled here to-night.

Grand Master Theo. Gilday of Montreal made a spirited attack on the Canadian naval policy, declaring that when Canada had been asked for bread she had offered a stone. While other colonies were rushing to Britain's aid, Canada "hesitates and procrastinates and finally decides to bring a tin pot navy, that would not be strong enough to fight nor swift enough to run away, and which could only participate in the part of the empire after the debating school at Ottawa had decided."

He concluded, "It is exceedingly regrettable that when the naval question first came up in parliament, our representatives allowed themselves to be cajoled into compliance with this naval farce, instead of offering a liberal contribution in 'Dreadnoughts' or their equivalent."

The appointment of special detectives to enforce the factory act, as is done in the city of Montreal, was advocated by Rev. W. F. Gilroy of this city in an address before the labor gathering here to-night. The Ontario Educational Labor Convention is to take place to-morrow.

REFUSED TO BUY A LICENSE

L. A. Skinner Had Badly Equipped Moving Picture Machine.

L. A. Skinner, Welland, was fined \$50 and costs for operating a moving picture machine without a license. This is the sequel to a refusal, on the part of Mr. Skinner, to provide himself with a properly equipped machine to display pictures in public places. The report of the Provincial Inspector Miller was sent over to examine the outfit. His report was adverse, and Skinner ignored the warning of the provincial police department with the exclamation, "To hell with those fellows." The license would have cost Skinner only \$25. "Other fines will follow," say the police.

DEADLOCK THREATENED IN QUEBEC PARLIAMENT

War Between Legislature and Legislative Council Over Montreal Underground.

MONTREAL, May 23.—(Special.)—There threatens to be a deadlock at Quebec, in the matter of the voting of the legislature's subsidies, as there was in England, before the house of lords in connection with the voting of the budget.

Hon. Dr. Landolt, one of the most influential members of the legislative council, gave this information to-day. If the subsidies are blocked it will be over a question of the underground railway question. Explaining matters, Dr. Landolt said: "For some time past organs of the provincial legislature have been breathing bitter denunciations against the legislative council. They have stated, in the most emphatic manner, that if the council does not drop the Montreal Street Railway Co., and permit outside companies to come into the city and build underground lines, it (the legislative council) will be abolished."

"I cannot believe that the legislature at Quebec would be so foolish as to be behind these threats. How would the legislature feel if the legislative council should retaliate and refuse to vote the subsidies? Such a thing is not impossible."

EMPIRE CLUB OFFICERS

J. Castell, Hopkins Elected President—Address by Senator Ross.

"The Relation of the Monarchy to the Empire" was the subject of an elucidating address made at the annual meeting of the Empire Club last night by Senator G. W. Ross. The report of the nominating committee was read, and the following officers elected therefrom for the ensuing year: J. Castell Hopkins, president; F. B. Fetherstonhaugh, first vice-president; G. F. Beard, second vice-president; J. M. Foster, third vice-president; executive committee, J. R. Ross, G. H. Munz, Dr. E. K. Richardson, R. S. Yelle, P. F. Wilde, man, W. O. McFarland, G. H. Smith, M. B. Logan, H. H. Shearer and Canon MacNab. The office of secretary-treasurer was left to the executive committee to fill.

TORONTO RURAL DEANERY

Annual Meeting Shows Progress in Church Extension.

The annual meeting of the Toronto Rural-deanery Conference was held last evening in St. Simon's schoolhouse. Rev. E. C. Cayley, rural dean, presiding. The secretary's report showed that \$2900 had been collected in Toronto in the past year for church extension; that four missions in the southern and northwest suburbs had been founded and five others assisted. NO KING'S BIRTHDAY.

OTTAWA, May 23.—The colonial office in London have called the secretary of state, Ottawa, that his Majesty the King has decided that his birthday shall not be celebrated in British or within the empire.

IMPOSSIBLE FOR CONNAUGHT TO COME.

LONDON, May 23.—The Chronicle says that in consequence of King Edward's death, it is quite out of the question for the Duke of Connaught to go to Canada.

BOND PURCHASERS WERE GETTING IMPATIENT

Got After Morgans to Give Them Something for Their Money.

EDMONTON, May 23.—Attorney-General Cross was before the waterways commission to-day. He contradicted the premier's evidence, that he had given no indication to the attorney-general that he wanted more money in Winnipeg. His desire to see money to hasten the construction of the railway, which had been delayed more than the government had been led to expect.

Bennett brought out the interesting fact of the day just before the commission arose. Cross told him that in the bonds for the A. & E. N. Co. were not signed four days ago, and that the Morgan people are getting impatient to get them. It appears that the money was originally realized from Morgans on a single bond for \$7,000,000 made 80 in order to facilitate matters. This bond was to be replaced with regular 80 bonds, 7400 in number, and then the Morgan people would be able to distribute to bond purchasers bonds equivalent to the amount of the cash invested.

Apparently bond purchasers are getting impatient, and are getting after the Morgans to give them something for the money put in, and Morgans in turn are getting after the province.

U. S. PERSUASIOUS

Canadians in Boston Will Have Benefits of Naturalization Urged.

BOSTON, May 23.—To permit an exchange of views on the wood pulp question and the importance of Canadiana who have made their homes in the United States becoming naturalized citizens, a dinner is to be held at the Hotel Somerset in Boston within the next thirty days at which presenters will be invited to members of the press and Canadiana residing in the United States.

It is estimated that there are more than one million Canadians in Massachusetts and at least fifty thousand voters. Such men as H. M. Whitney, Eugene Noble Foss and Charles S. Hamlin will be invited to speak.

H. W. Patterson, treasurer of the Smith Patterson Company, wholesale and retail jewellers of Boston, and president of Smith Patterson Limited, of Toronto, who was one of the presidents of the Canadian Club of Boston, said to-day that he is a naturalized American citizen and enjoys all the privileges of citizenship. He advises naturalization most strongly to all who intend to make the United States their permanent homes.

HOTELS CROWDED.

All downtown hotels were crowded to the limit last night with guests in Toronto for the races. At the King Edward, Prince George and Queen's it was stated that it was impossible to find accommodation for all who desired it.

J. E. McCall, M.P. Cobourg, whose strong stand against the original Miller bill made him famous, is at the Prince George.

SHOWERS RESEMBLING SULPHUR AND FINE ASHES

Peculiar Phenomenon in Newfoundland—Similar One Last Time. Halley's Comet Was Seen.

HALIFAX, May 23.—(Special.)—Captains of vessels arriving at North Sydney from the southern regions of Newfoundland report an atmospheric phenomenon there. At Harbourville Col. there was a shower of a substance closely resembling sulphur, which covered the entire neighborhood to a depth of about a quarter of an inch. The sky became blood red at the same time and many of the inhabitants became greatly alarmed.

Capt. Mouton of the schooner Victoria, which arrived to-day from Burn's Village about 200 miles east of Harbourville Col. reports that at that place there was a heavy snow-squall, followed by a shower of fine ashes or similar substance. At both places the showers lasted 15 minutes.

A similar occurrence is said to have taken place at Burn's three-quarters of a century ago, when Halley's comet made its last trip through the heavens.

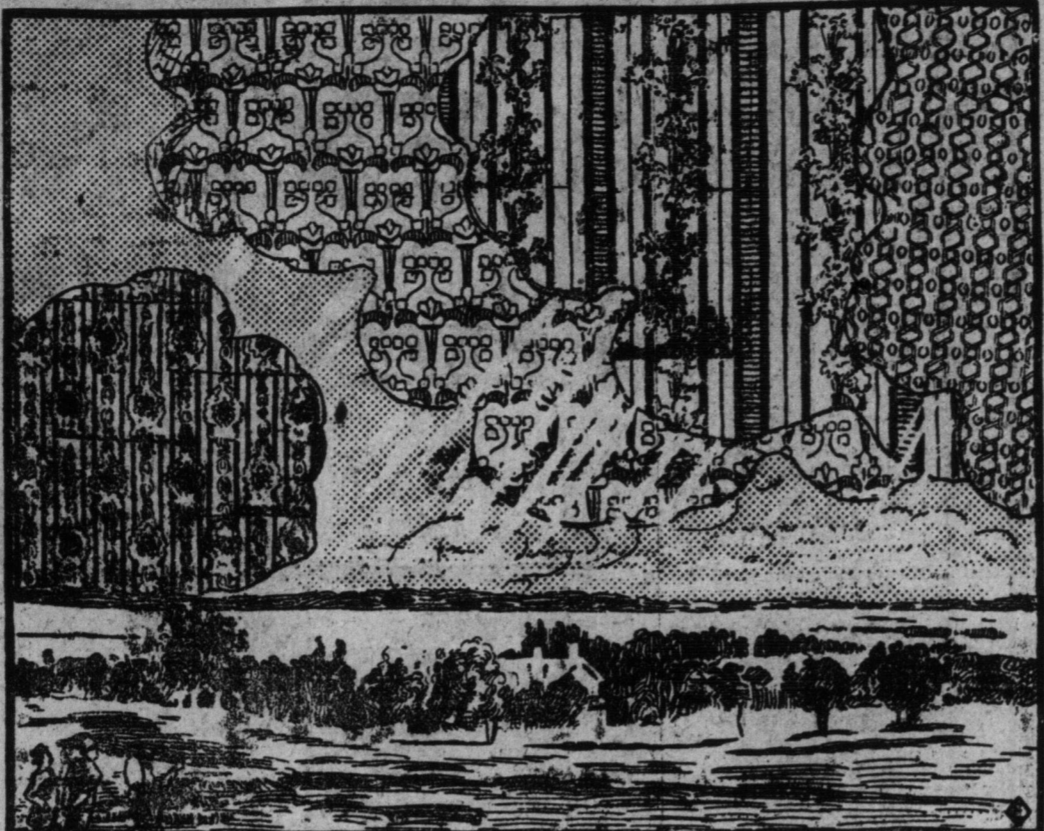

MAJORITY AGAINST AMYOT

Sixteen Council Members Opposed--Censure a Warm One.

"There are 16 of the 25 members of the city council who have committed themselves against the appointment of Dr. Amyot as city medical health officer."

This is the statement made by one who is in touch with the situation. Whether the assertion is well based or not, will not be determined until the return of Mayor Geary, who is not expected to be in Toronto for several weeks. No action is to be taken in the meantime.

It is said that the canvass for the position is being conducted in a parallel in history. Letters by the score in behalf of Dr. Amyot, Dr. Acheson, Dr. Goodchild, Dr. Noble and Dr. McCullough are being circulated by friends for several weeks. An elaborate booklet setting forth Dr. Goodchild's qualifications is another evidence of the strenuousness of the struggle, in which lodge influence is prominent.

An anonymous circular letter urging that Dr. Amyot be made M. H. O. before the mayor's return caused a flutter at yesterday's council meeting, when Ald. Pheasant called attention to a newspaper reference to it. Whether the mysterious communication was inspired by friend or foe is unknown.

The letter, which encloses a memo of arguments for and against Dr. Amyot, "which should be of the greatest assistance to you in coming to a right conclusion," is a masterpiece of argument, and is well qualified to place you in a position to take advantage of the opportunity presented, and bring forward his name, you will place yourself right with all sections of the community whose influence you wish to retain. You will make a reputation for yourself as a far-sighted and keen politician. There are one or two matters by requiring immediate attention of one well qualified if the public generally become aware of the conditions, there will be an outburst which no member can withstand. Neither the public nor the press will tolerate the appointment of an inferior man to the position of health officer, and the other course and fall to take advantage of the chance of making yourself solid, you will be slated to almost certain defeat by the elements who have now pronounced themselves in favor of Dr. Amyot. The writer is aware that this course has been determined on by not only the Keltis of Columbus, but also by the medical profession and the university people generally, and most of whom, by the way, are Conservatives. You will also remember that if you do not make the move before Mayor Geary returns, that he will find a way to try and switch you into a position which will make your vote then come too late. The statement has already been whispered to almost every Catholic in the city that he has committed himself to some Orange Lodge. It is to be hoped you will see the advantage there is for yourself in taking a reasonable course.

ROYALTIES AT LARGE

Half-a-Dozen Kings Took Informal Stroll in the Park.

LONDON, May 23.--Defying anarchists and disregarding their advisors' protests, the Kaiser and half a dozen other royalties, including King Frederick of Denmark and King George of Greece, to-day strolled like private citizens in the park at Buckingham. The group of rulers walking leisurely thru the crowded paths, doing their share of gazing at places of interest, attracted the passers-by, who, however, were compelled by etiquette to pretend to take no special notice.

DANISH MINISTRY TO RESIGN.

COPENHAGEN, May 23.--At a meeting of the cabinet to-day the ministers authorized Premier Zahle to hand their collective resignations to King Frederick immediately upon his return from London.

La Rose and Nipissing Higher Other Stocks Little Changed

Bull Movement Started in Higher-Priced Stocks, But General Market Continues To Drop.

World Office, Monday Evening, May 23. At the mining exchanges today business was carried on within an extremely narrow range of prices. General speaking fractional losses were sustained in most of the active stocks, due apparently to the operations of professional sellers, who are under the belief that the holiday period may cause selling from holders.

Among the higher priced shares Crown Reserve was the weakest issue with sales again below the \$3 mark. The week's shipments from the camp were below those of the previous week, but included shipments from ten properties and were generally regarded as evidencing a continuance of good conditions in the camp.

Late in the day there was a bull movement inaugurated in Nipissing and followed to some extent by a rise in La Rose. No one was expected to account for the unexpected buying of these shares and viewed broadly the operations were regarded as nothing more than market manipulation as no new information was given out in regard to either of the properties and to a buyers did not include the public.

The rise in these issues had very little influence on the rest of the market, and the spasm of operations in the two stocks mentioned included no new bullish sentiment. Nipissing sold as high as \$11.25, but it might be well to note the closing quotations of the stock offered at \$11.00, while the best bid was only \$10.87 on the Toronto Exchange.

"FROM MISSOURI."
Cobalt, Elk Lake and Gowanda mines were never in better shape than they are at present. With the deadness in the mining market, all energies for months have been bent on developing properties in these mining districts. As never before real mining has been going on.

It is questionable if ever again the public will go into the mining market and with eyes shut put their money on stocks without investigation. Henceforth the mining proposition that will have any hope of popular attention will be one in which the capitalization is small, the directors known and competent and the stock in the treasury for development purposes, bearing some reasonable proportion to the stock given for the property or to the promoters. Over and above this, there will have to be the expert opinion of a reputable mining engineer that the property has good chances of being worked into a mine. Wild-cattling in Ontario has ceased for all time.

True Canadians will look askance at men who capitalize a 40-acre Gowanda claim, showing specks of silver on the surface, at \$1,000,000. There are too many chances against the investor. A 40-acre Gowanda claim capitalized at \$1,000,000 will have to show at least \$100,000 of development work and a reasonable chance of being made into a shipper within a short time, before the public will invest.

Some people believe they can capitalize a Cobalt hole in the ground for \$1,000,000 and succeed. But it is no longer so. People in Ontario are now "from Missouri."
