TENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
NOTRE - DAME HOSPITAL
MONTREAL.

Year 1889-90.

Notre-Dame Hospital was established for the cure and relief of the sick, without distinction of race or creed. The nursing of the patients is entrusted to the reverend Grey Nuns, nineteen of whom reside continually in the Hospital. In addition to these, two ladies of the same community come to the Hospital every evening, to watch the sick during the night.

The Hospital has a Catholic chaplain or almoner, who provides the help and consolation of religion to all who stand in need of it.

* * *

The Corporation of the Hospital is composed of Ordinary Members, Life Governors and Elected Governors.

The business of the Corporation is under the supervision of a board called the *Board of Governors*.

The medical service is entirely under the control of a board called the *Medical Board*.

Finally, the management and direction of the corporation are entrusted to a board called the *Board of Management*.

* * *

Any person having paid a yearly contribution of at least five dollars, becomes an ordinary member of the corporation and continues to be so as long as he pays such annual contribution. He has the right to attend, take part in the deliberations, and vote for the election of Governors at the annual general meeting of all the members of the corporation, which takes place on the first Wednesday of July.

Any person having paid the sum of one hundred dollars becomes a *Life Governor* as long as he pays a yearly contribution of ten dollars.

The *Life Governors* are *ipso facto*, members of the Board of Governors.

The *Elected Governors* are appointed at the general yearly meeting of the corporation. In no case can their number exceed twelve.

In order to be eligible as a Governor, one must have paid a sum of at least twenty-five dollars and must pay a yearly contribution of at least five dollars. The *Elected Governors* have the same rights and privileges as the *Life Governors*.

* * *

The *Board of Governors* is composed of all the *Life Governors*, and of not more than twelve *Elected Governors*.

The Board transacts the general business of the corporation and meets at least four times a year, on the last Wednesday of March, June, September and December.

The Officers of the Board of Governors are a President, two Vice-Presidents and a Secretary.

The Board of Governors must report at the annual general meeting of the corporation, on the state of general business, in accordance with a statement made by the Board of Management.

* * *

The *Medical Board* meets once a month, its officers being a President and a Secretary. This Board has the absolute control over the whole medical department of the Hospital. It watches over the sanitary arrangements, suggests the purchasing of surgical instruments, appoints the attending physicians, the house surgeons and assistants, and the physicians in charge of the out-door departments. It determines the hours for the attendance of physicians, the admission of patients and the consultation at the out-door departments.

The *Medical Board* makes regulations for the diet of patients and the behaviour of the medical students and nurses; it has

the right to visit and examine the pharmacy at any time and to suggest whatever it may deem advisable for the good of the Hospital.

In the interest of science, the attending physicians and surgeons, or in their absence, the house-surgeons, have the right of performing a *post mortem* examination on all patients dying in the public wards of the Hospital.

* * *

As it has been previously stated, the management, control and regulation of the corporation of the Notre-Dame Hospital are intrusted to the *Board of Management*.

This Board is composed of a priest of the Seminary of St. Sulpice, appointed annually by the said Seminary; of not more than six members elected annually by the Medical Board (three at least of whom shall be members of the said medical board), and of not more than six members of the Board of Governors, annually elected by that body.

The Board of Management report to the Board of Governors every third month, eight days at least before the quarterly meeting of the said Board.

The officers of the Board of Management are a President, a Treasurer and a Secretary.

The Treasurer has charge of all the moneys, debentures and titles of property belonging to the corporation; he receives all the subscriptions, donations, legacies and other sums paid to the institution.

Eight days before the July quarterly meeting of the Board of Governors, the Treasurer must give to the Secretary of the said Board, a faithful and minute statement of all the sums received and paid by him during the year.

The Board of Management meets once a week, every Thursday, at 4 P. M.

* * *

The hospital is open to all the needy sick, *without any distinction of race or creed*.

The admission of patients is left entirely to the Medical Board. *However, no patient recognized as incurable or suffering from any contagious disease or mental derangement, can be admitted.* The same may be said of any woman in advanced pregnancy, unless she have met with some accident endangering her life and necessitating immediate attendance.

Children under five years are not admitted, unless in certain cases requiring special treatment, and when the attending physicians and surgeons deem it necessary. No patient is admitted whose ailments do not absolutely require his stay in the Hospital.

The Hospital has five out-door departments: a general out-door department, under the control of the Medical Board; a department for the diseases of the eye and ear, nose and pharynx, under the direction of Dr. A. A. Foucher, surgeon oculist to the Hospital; an electric department under the direction of Dr. Aubry, a dispensary for the treatment of children's diseases, under the control of Dr. S. Lachapelle and a dispensary for the diseases of women conducted by Dr. T. Brennan.

The number of patients treated this year at the out-door departments was 20,968.

The daily visit of the wards is made regularly at 11 A. M. by the attending physicians and surgeons. As will be seen further on, the house-surgeons make an additional visit, morning and evening.

Besides the public wards where poor patients are admitted, there are in the Hospital, private wards for each of the patients as has the means of paying. In these private wards, paying patients enjoy all the comfort desirable and may be treated by their own doctor or any physician of their choice.

* * *

The house-surgeon and his assistants reside in the Hospital. They visit the wards at least twice a day, morning and evening. They examine all the patients suffering from serious or urgent diseases, and take charge of all cases brought in, until the attending physicians arrive.

The *house-surgeon alone*, or, in his absence, the assistant house-surgeon has charge of the admission of patients.

If any urgent case is brought to the Hospital, the house-surgeon must send for the attending physician or surgeon without delay.

The house-surgeon and his assistants must never be away from the Hospital when the attending physicians make their daily visit. If one of them is obliged to be absent at any other time, he must previously inform his colleagues of the fact, so that one of them may be always present at the Hospital.

The house-surgeon must enter, or cause to be entered, in books especially kept for that purpose, the names, age and sex of all the patients, the date of their admission and of their discharge, the treatment followed in each case, the state of the patient when discharged, the name of the disease he was

laboring under and other peculiarities. He must also see that the prescriptions of the attending physicians and surgeons are carefully prepared, and if necessary, must attend personally to the compounding of medicines.

The house-surgeon and his assistants are not allowed to take charge of patients outside the Hospital, nor even in the private wards of the Hospital; all their time and care must be devoted to the poor patients of the institution.

Those desirous of becoming candidates for the positions of House Surgeons must address a written request to that effect to the Superintendent or to the Secretary of the Medical Board; an application blank will then be furnished the applicant.

* * *

No medical student is allowed to attend the hospital unless he has previously taken his admission ticket.

Under no pretence whatever are medical students allowed to go into the wards in the absence of or without special permission from the attending physician.

During the daily visit, the medical students must follow the professor, as it were, *step by step*; that is to say, they must not examine or talk to any other patient than the one who is, at that moment, the subject of the clinical lecture.

Unless they are especially authorized to do so by the *chef de clinique*, students are forbidden to enter into conversation with patients.

The following positions are open to the students as non-resident assistants in each department: 1° Two in Surgery; 2° Two in Medecine; 3° One in Gynecology; 4° Two in Minor Surgery; 5° Two in the Eye and Ear department; 6° Two in the Histological, Pathological & Chemical laboratories; 7° One in the Electrical department; 8° One in the General Dispensary; 9° One in the Children's Dispensary. Those positions, so important practically, may be obtained by writing to the Chief House-Surgeon who will submit the applicant's name to the approval of the professor in each department. Each clerkship gives two month's service and a certificate of attendance is delivered at the end of the term.

* * *

The ambulance calls number 344 this year.
The call is made by telephone, directly to the Hospital, and in less than two minutes the vehicle, accompanied by a house-surgeon, is on its way to the scene of the accident.

On this subject there would be a suggestion to make: that the public would fully ascertain the necessity of asking for the ambulance before doing so, as it very often happens that the vehicle is called out by incompetent, irresponsible persons, for drunken people, or, for those who do not in the least require it; this is to be deplored as it occurs very often and is of no benefit to any one. The attention of the public is drawn to this point so that useless journeys may be avoided and that a competent and a responsible person may make the call by telephone.

* * *

The Hospital can receive at present 20 patients in the private rooms, and 94 patients in the public wards.

There has been this year, a daily average of 88 patients in the Hospital.

The average stay of each patient was 20 days and the total number of days, 33,792.

The death rate during the year rose to 92, or 5.6% of the total number of patients cared for; deducting the 4 who died prior to their admission, 10 whose deaths occurred within 1 day after admission and 8 within 3 days, the percentage falls to 4.3.

* * *

The electric light has been placed in the building and promises to be a great economy.

* * *

Three new life-governors were elected during the year; MM. Benjamin Dawson, R. Préfontaine and N. Quintal. It is to be hoped that this example will be largely followed by parties who will deem it an honor to take an active part in the progress and success of a good work that is gaining in importance from day to day.

* * *

It is worthy of public notice that in all countries, and especially in England, hospitals dependent on public charity, are in a great measure endowed with bequests and extraordinary donations. This species of assistance increases their revenue and settles their existence beyond peradventure, by the creation of fixed and permanent funds. REPORT OF THE SECRETARY
OF THE
LADY PATRONESSES' ASSOCIATION
FOR THE YEAR 1889-90.

LADIES,

The modest report I have the honor to submit to you must open with a tone of sorrow since in it are recalled all the events of our association for the passed year. Our first meeting after the vacations (September 1889) was given in great part to the regrets caused by the demise of our worthy director, abbe Rousselot, which had occurred a few days previously. Although ill for a long time, this venerable priest so zealous, had sufficed to fulfil the numerous positions he had imposed on himself and his death could not therefore, but leave a void exceedingly difficult to fill. At our request, the reverend Superior of St. Sulpice on the 5th of October said a Requiem Mass at the Hospital for this generous benefactor of the Institution and recalled to our memory in a few heartfelt words the virtues and benevolence of the regretted deceased. May God acquit towards this generous worker in charity the debt of gratitude which the Hospital owes to him whose memory the poor, the sick and the afflicted of Montreal will ever bless.

Let us render, Ladies, a just tribute of regret and of gratitude to our associates to whom Death has estranged us this year: Mrs. John Ostell, Wilfrid Prévost, H. C. Cadieux & John Cassidy, whose generous souls are gone to receive the reward of their good works and of their devotion to the poor of Christ.

The annual dinner was given to the patients in the 9th. of January. His Grace the Archbishop of Montreal, did us the honor of being present and of blessing this feast of charity, given at the Hospital for the eighth time. It was in 1882 that our association, then at its birth, realized that happy suggestion of its first president with such success as the report of our first secretary has made known.

I shall name no one, Ladies, but is it not soothing to recall the first days of our association? It is still in its infancy but its annals are already rich; our elders have given us beauti-

ful examples to imitate. Our task has been easier than theirs was, since our members have doubled within eight years, and again this year new members have associated themselves with us. Let not our zeal relax. There is a field of labor that I would suggest, although more eloquent voices than mine have already spoken; a few figures will be my plea. The Hospital has grown even as the mustard seed, marvellously.

Founded in 1880 with a few beds, soon amounting to fifty, thanks to the liberality of a few zealous citizens, it now counts about one hundred and fifteen. Alas! those beds are nearly continually occupied, so numerous are the miseries which assail our poor humanity.

The expenses naturally increase with the number of patients; thus the amount paid for bread in 1882 amounted to six hundred dollars, and now attains one thousand; unhappily, the number of subscribers is not what would be desired, as in six months the Hospital had to fill a deficit of two hundred dollars. This alms is so easy and so small: one loaf a month, Ladies: twenty-five cents! Let us knock anew at all doors; success comes only to perseverance.

This bread subscription is very important and exceedingly useful to the Hospital, and as you know, Ladies, it is about all the devoted Governors have left us to see to. It seems suitable to here recall the brilliant result of their zeal, the Albani concerts, which gave to the dilettanti of Montreal such rare artistic enjoyment and to the Hospital such a round sum. And, all without any exertion on our part.

Another, and not the least important event, Ladies, was the visit of the Rev. Father Babonneau, the eloquent preacher of the lenten season at Notre-Dame. It was most intimate and due to the zeal and initiative of our devoted Lady President. I crave pardon if I spare not her modesty, but as secretary, to me, the remembrance of her wise benevolence on this occasion is inseparable from that of the eloquent words of our illustrious Dominican visitor.

In concluding, Ladies, let us forget neither the kindness received, nor the increasing wants of our Hospital nor the part which is ours in the work necessary to secure its prosperity. Let us be devoted; let us be zealous. Let us make known our work and draw hearts towards it.
