## RUSSIA RAISING ANOTHER ARMY.

### An Immense Force May Be Mobilized to Prosecute War to the End—Fears Gen. Linewitch Cannot Reach Harbin Without Enormous Losses.

Petersburg, March 18.—2.10 p. m.—Telegram communication with the retreating Russian army, has been cut for over twenty-four hours, but the authorities hope it is only temporary, declaring that they have no information that the Japanese have reached the railroad in General Linewitch's rear.

Nevertheless, with the curtain down, the war office, naturally is the prey of the direct, forcible, and the most word from the front was contained in a telegram from one of the Associated Press Russian correspondents, the only correspondent with the retreating army. It presaged an attack from the rear. The telegram, although dated Changtun, (forty miles north of Tie Pass) at four o'clock, Thursday afternoon, was sent from Kaiyuan, thirty miles north of Tie Pass, and reached St. Petersburg, only this morning. It was very brief, saying simply that the army was retreating in good order, and destroying the railroad as it went, but was constantly pressed by the Japanese, the rear guard actions, being continuous. There were ominous words in the concluding sentence, as follows:—

"We believe the Japanese are making a wide turning movement north and that they are ready to fall upon us, when we get out of the ring-like group of mountains, which surround the Tie Pass Gorge."

### Fear the Worst.

"In the long retreat to Harbin, the Russians only have the advantage of the Mandarin Pass, whence it bears eastward to Kharin, whence the railroad continues north to Harbin. According to the general staff, however, a good wagon road runs parallel to the railroad.

But for an army of a quarter of a million men encumbered with impedimenta, with an active enemy relentlessly pursuing and operating on its flank, and the constant threat of the enemy closing the line of retreat, it is admitted that the single railroad and wagon road afford poor prospects of Gen. Linewitch being able to bring off the remnants of the army confided to his care without tremendous sacrifice of life. If the Japanese actually succeed in throwing strong force across the line of re-

### J. H. SLATER IS DEAD.

#### Well Known Former St. John Man Dies at Sydney.

Sydney, N. S. W., Mar. 18.—(Special)—James H. Slater, formerly of St. John, and proprietor of the Royal hotel, this city, died in this morning. Though he has been ailing for some time past, his death was unexpected. He was out yesterday and on his usual health till he was struck last evening, when he complained of dizziness in the head.

Shortly afterwards he was taken with paralysis of the brain, and passed away at five o'clock this morning.

Deceased was 45 years of age and came to Sydney from St. John about five years ago. He leaves a wife, but no children.

The remains will be taken to St. John on Monday for interment. Deceased carried an insurance policy on his life of six thousand dollars.

### GENERAL HOWLEY DEAD.

Washington, Mar. 18.—General J. R. Hawley, who died here early this morning, practiced law, occupied the editorial chair, served as soldier and statesman and for many years was prominently identified with the Republican party. He was born at Stewartville, N. C., Oct. 31, 1826. He was admitted to the bar at Hartford, Conn., in 1850, where he resided. He entered the union army as a captain at the outbreak of the civil war and for distinguished conduct and meritorious service was advanced to the grade of brigadier-general and brevet major-general. He remained in the military service until January 1866 and three months later was elected governor of Connecticut. He received the degree of doctor of laws from Hamilton College, N. Y., from which he graduated and from Yale university and Trinity college. His congressional career began in 1872, when he was elected a representative in the 42nd congress. He took his seat in the U. S. Senate, Mar. 4, 1881 and was a member of that body until the close of last congress.

### STEAMERS DELAYED. JUDGE RYAN'S LIQUOR IN GREAT DREAM. DRUGSTORES. Two Express Wagon Loads Captured in a Maine Town Last Night.

Biddeford, Me., March 18.—A conference was held yesterday between County Attorney George A. Emery, Sheriff Athorne and the Deputy Sheriff of Biddeford, looking to the strict enforcement of the prohibition law in York county.

County Attorney Emery stated, after the conference, that today the mayors and chiefs of police in Biddeford and Saco, would be notified that they would be expected to assist the deputy sheriffs to the utmost of their power in enforcing the law, and if they failed to do so the enforcement commissioners would be appealed to. The county attorney said further that he had some surprises in store, but he would give no intimation as to their nature.

Just at dark last night, three deputy sheriffs started out to visit the drug stores in this city, and from four of them they secured enough liquor of all descriptions to fill two express wagons. The liquors were seized and stored in a warehouse on Elm street, and the druggists were summoned to appear in court tomorrow to answer the charge of illegally keeping liquor for sale.

The raids created considerable excitement and last night it was quite impossible to obtain liquor for any purpose in the city.

### RAPID PROMOTION.

Sydney, March 18.—(Special)—D. H. McDougall, until recently field engineer of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, has been appointed manager of the company's mines at Wabana, N. B. Mr. McDougall, entered the employ of the company five years ago as a chainman, and has since risen to the position of survey staff. He belongs to Glace Bay.

### THE QUEEN'S VOYAGE.

London, Mar. 18.—The Royal yacht Victoria and Albert, which sailed from Portsmouth, yesterday with Queen Alexandra and party on board, bound for Lisbon, and was compelled, owing to rough seas, to put into Portland harbor last night, resumed her voyage today.

### EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS FELT.

New York, March 18.—A Naples despatch to the Herald says: Repeated shocks of earthquake were felt here today (Friday), and at Avellino, and Benevento. In several places, the inhabitants fell into a panic, but no serious damage resulted.

## UNTRUE STORY ABOUT ST. JOHN.

### Portland Paper Tells a Fake Yarn About St. John Harbor Being Frozen Up and Credits the Statement to Captain of Vessel From This Port.

(Portland Express, Mar. 16.) St. John, N. B., "the port which never freezes", is having about all the trouble it cares to have with ice this winter, and its declaration that it had one great advantage over Portland, that its harbor was always free of ice while Portland's was not, has been proven false. This winter the whole thing has been turned around and Portland has been practically free from ice while St. John has had all kinds of troubles with it.

Vessels have been frozen in and damaged and now the steamer Hilda, which arrived from St. John with coal, which she took from two barges which had frozen in, is there notwithstanding that spring is at hand.

The Hilda arrived at 6 o'clock last night with over 1,538 tons of coal consigned to William M. Bradley, Captain Chambers reports that the ice conditions at Parrabro, N. S., and in Nova Scotia have never been worse.

Early in February barges 6 and 7, both of which are so well known here, put into St. John, N. B. There they caught in the big freeze and have not been able to get free since that time. The Hilda this week was sent over to St. John to get the cargoes of the ice, and she finally got free after six weeks on the road, they finally have reached the wharf, which shows what kind of weather is being experienced in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

The above story was shown to a number of shipping men at this port today, who laughed over it, saying at the same time, that the person who penned that story must be of his base. Who ever heard of the harbor of St. John, N. B., freezing over in winter? Not even the oldest Portland papers, stating that the freeze, because of the great fall and rise of the tide, and the temperature of water, which Captain Thompson has described in an article he wrote recently, and published in one of the Portland papers, stating that the day of Fuddy contained very little ice, as contradicted by the New England ports along the New England coast.

As to the steamer Hilda, Captain Chambers, which vessel arrived here on March 2nd, from Portland, Maine and was chartered to load coal at Parrabro, on Wednesday the 1st of March, the steamer arrived at Spencer's Island, near Parrabro harbor, at 10 a. m. She could get no further on account of the ice, and was headed for St. John, to await order of the charter parties. The steamer was docked at the corporation pier and was loaded with coal from barges No. 6 and 7, which were towed alongside from the west side of the harbor. All the barges, six or seven of them, come from Parrabro to go into winter quarters. All loaded with coal, and when the Hilda got orders to load here, the barges above mentioned were put alongside her. No sign of ice could be seen near or around the coal barges. If Captain Chambers made the above statement to the Portland Express, it is up to him to contradict it. Neither his vessel nor any other was ever frozen in here. It would be an impossibility.

### GERMANY'S LITTLE BILL.

#### Wants Great Britain and Uncle Sam to Pay Up.

Berlin, March 18.—The settlement of the Samoan claims, has become a rather touchy point with the foreign office, as it is not understood why so small a sum as \$120,000 should cause the United States and Great Britain to hesitate in the payment.

The delay of years has, it is pointed out, been out of proportion to the amount of the claims, and as the damages are owing, according to the arbitrator, to a lot of indigent persons, the impression here, is that Great Britain and the United States have shown delay, amounting to indifference.

It is admitted unofficially, however, that the claims for \$120,000, which were prepared by an American lawyer, are in excess of the actual loss. Germany has not made any proposition to the United States, or Great Britain, but would probably accept one-half the amount of the claims if it was offered. The sum of \$25,000 mentioned in an American despatch, as being all the claims are worth, is looked on here as a sort of bartering offer, not becoming the subject of controversy.

The German government has informed the United States and Great Britain, as a result of negotiations, that were begun, March 1st, that she is about to make a joint offer.

### JOINED THE DOWIEITES.

#### And Went From Fredericton to Zion City to Die.

Fredricton, Mar. 18.—(Special)—Mrs. Janet H. Tait, widow of the late James Tait, died at Lower St. Mary's this morning at the advanced age of eighty-five years.

Mrs. John Donovan, who with her husband joined the Dowieite church and removed to Zion City last year, died there on Tuesday from consumption. She was formerly Miss Cowell, and aged about thirty.

### VENEZUELAN CASE.

Willemstadt, Island of Curacao, March 18.—Advice received here from Caracas, says that the Venezuelan appeal court decided on appeal, March 11, that the New York and Burmahese asphalt company aided the Matienzo revolution. The high court will fix the damages. The final judgment may not be rendered for many months. This case is separate from the action of the government to rescind the company's concession.

### A NEW DINING ROOM.

This not only adds to the size of the apartment, but makes it very light and cheerful.

The walls and ceiling have been covered with stamped metal sheathing, of an artistic design, having a deep and richly-ornamented cornice. The metal has been laid on, so nicely, that it is impossible to detect the joints. The design has been chosen with excellent taste. The painting and decorating are also in harmony with the general surroundings.

To the left of the entrance, is a small alcove in which the sideboard will be placed, and at the top of this recess, a dainty grill of quartered oak, has been fitted. The room is also fitted with a neat electric chandelier.

CITY COUNCIL DECIDES TO CALL FOR TENDERS.

Loch Lomond Water Works Extension Will Be Pushed to a Completion—To Guard Against Foreign Labor—The Mayor and the Grand Jury.

The specifications, plans and forms of tender for the Loch Lomond water extension were passed by the council yesterday and an order made to advertise for bids. Some amendments to the water bill were adopted and the bill ordered to be sent to the legislature. Shanklin Thompson was appointed building inspector. The mayor occupied the chair. The absent aldermen were Ald. Robinson, McCordick and Frink. The recorder, Engineer Harbour, the director of public works, Superintendent Murdoch, Engineer Peters and the common clerk were in attendance. The council having resolved itself into a committee, the mayor said it was necessary the tenders for the water extension be awarded as soon as possible so that the work might be completed before next winter. If this were not done the contractors and the city would lose heavily by delay. The call for tenders would be extensively advertised in the States and Canada so that the most skilled workmen might compete, but every St. John contractor had an equal chance if the standard of efficiency was reached. Engineer Harbour then went into the tenders in detail. There are four contracts for sections of the work, but one contractor may secure the whole. The work is to be completed by Nov. 1. No penalty is attached to the contracts, but after two

months' work the engineer in charge must be satisfied that progress is being made according to schedule, and has power to suspend the contractor, or increase the number of workmen as the council may direct. The bidding, specification, and contract are all blended together, a condition of things unusual in this city, but found most suitable in the States for this class of work. The consulting engineer will be on the ground one week before the date for closing the tenders to give any assistance necessary to intending competitors. Tenders will be received up to April 12. It is expected an award can be made by April 20, and the work should be started by June 1. Advertisements will be inserted in the Canadian Contract Record, the New York Engineering News, and the New York Engineering Record, besides local papers. Eighty-five per cent will be paid the contractor as the work progresses, ten per cent on completion, and the remaining five per cent six months after the final estimate is received.
