British Again Completely Repulse The German Troops In Flanders

Latest Official Statement Tells of Suc- EXTENSION OF cess—Canadians Accidentally Killed in England—Russians and Rumanians Fighting Vigorously in Moldavia and on Roumanian Front

London, Aug. 18-The German troops in Flanders were again completely repulsed by the British after sharp fighting, according to the British official statement issued early today.

London, Aug. 18-Six Canadians were killed and twenty-three injured in the accidental explosion of a mine during a mimic war at the manoeuvres camp at Hampshire Thursday, according to the Daily Mail.

Petrograd, Aug. 17-British admiralty per wireless press-Austro-German attacks in Southwestern Moldavia, especially in the region of Fokshani, have been repulsed by the Russians and Roumanians. Our ac--tivity commenced before dawn and continued uninterruptedly throughout the



There is needed only a leader in Germany today to give the widespread, dull, aching protest against further useless sacrifices a resistless momentum.



It is raised up at the same time as the soft palate. You should feel all these parts move at the same time through the close bond that joins them. To strengthen the Eustachian tube, the patient should also practice breathing in with a snorting noise, keeping his

nouth closed.

Oral gymnastics should be performed slowly, leaving between the various ex-cricses sufficient time to avoid the fatigue which haste would surely entail. It is advisable to perform between each series physical exercises of a different character, such as breathing exercises. You must not forget that to obtain a satisfactory result great patience, perseverance and an intelligent preliminary instruction are necessary.





Ordinarily it takes three months to prepare the lists in the unorganized districts of Ontario and have them printed. On a rush order this can be done within two months but indications are that the government intends to take the whole three months for the work. This
