No Woman is Called Upon to Make a Life-Saving Station of Herself for Any Man-Her Duty is to Make the Most of Her Own Life, Not Waste It Being the Understudy of a Reformatory.

A PRETTY girl, very young, and knowing little of the world, sat at the corner of my desk the other day and told me her story. It mainly concerned a young man. A young man who had been her friend since childhood, who belonged to a fine family and had been given every advantage of education. Who had, indeed, distinguished himself at college, but who was very wild and dissipated. Always he had had trouble with his eyes, and the life he is leading is aggravating his affliction. The oculist has told him that unless he stops drinking that within a year he will be totally blind.

"And, Miss Dix," the girl said with a tremor in her voice, "he says that the only thing that can stop him is me. That he will never touch another drop of liquor if I will marry him. I don't love him except in a sisterly way. But blindness! Think of the horror of being the care him if I blind! Isn't it my duty to save him if I

"Not at all, my dear," I replied, "no woman is called upon to make a life-saving station of herself for any man. duty is to make the most of your own life, not to waste it in being the understudy of a reformatory. "BELIEVE me when I tell you it is a useless thing to marry a man to

save him, and a tragic folly to marry one out of pity. Both end dis-"In the first place, no woman can save a man. All reformation has to come from within, and if a man has not strength and manhood enough to go straight of his own accord and for the sake of his own self-respect, he will not do it for any woman. Especially he will not do it for his wife.

OF COURSE, there is an occasional man who does stop drinking and gambling and running with wild women after marriage, but he would have braced up and turned from the error of his ways whether he had mar-"There are men who, in the folly of their youth, sow one wild oat crop and then stop, and go about the serious business of life. There are other men who are perpetual wild oats farmers, and all the their wives

do is to help them reap the harvest. They cannot prevent its being sowed. "All of this talk about the sacred influence of a wife is hokum. It flatters women's vanity for them to be told that they hold a man's fate in their hands and can do with him as they will. And it is a great alibi for men that they have worked ever since Adam laid the blame for his evil doing on Eve's influence, but in reality

there is nothing to it.

"The most that a woman can do for a man is to be an accelerator. She can speed him up on the way he is going and make him travel faster. She can make a bad man worse or a good man better, but she can't change a weak man into a strong man, or make a lazy man industrious, or turn a self-indulgent man into a self-controlled one.

"SO DON'T attempt the impossible task. Millions of other women before you have married drunkards to reform them and have been dragged down into the gutter by sots. God vouchsafed you no miraculous powers that will enable you to satisfy a man's craving for liquor, nor have you the ability to supply a spineless man with a backbone. If you marry a drunkard, he will be just as thirsty after marriage as he was before, and he will yield just as easily to his craving for drink.

"Consider, also, what a craven a man is who saks a young girl to devote her life to reforming him. It is the ultimate expression of selfish egotism. It is the rottenest deal that one human being ever puts up to another.

"NO MAN who has a spark of generosity or chivalry in his soul, or one thrill of real love for a woman in his heart, would ask such a sacrifice of her. He would not be willing for her to take such a risk. He would not be willing to save himself at the expense of an innocent and ignorant young woman. Whenever a drunkard or a roue appeals to a woman to have him he isn't thinking of her happiness and well-being. He is thinking exclusively of his own and she should have sense enough to refuse the bad

"And don't marry a man because you are sorry for him. It has been said that pity is akin to love, but the only love that it has any relation to is maternal love, and that isn't the sort of love that makes for happiness in matrimony.

"THE sick man and the weakling appeal to the mother instinct in a girl. She feels toward such a man as a mother does toward an afflicted child, but she never has for him a woman's love for a real man.

"And pity doesn't last. After a while a woman gets sick and tired of being sorry for a weakling and comes to have a contempt for him because he doesn't brace up and do a man's part in the world, and then whatever affection she had for him vanishes into thin air.

"So don't marry a man to reform him. You can't do it. And don't marry one because you are sorry for him. You will grow weary to death of him. Don't invest your life's happiness in damaged goods. Pick out for a husband a man who doesn't need to be reformed and of whom you will be proud, instead of ashamed."

Consortium Expected to Meet Competition With Britain and U.S.

producers of Western Europe today entered an agreement to form a great steel combine which Martin. will put an end to competition within their ranks. Beginning tomorrow the signatories of the combine-French, German, Belgian, Luxembourg and the Sarre Valley interests - will produce steel, not in the measure of their capacity to manufacture or to market, but in a fixed proportion agreed upon by the steel consortium formed today. What effect this regulation of con tinental production will have upon stee

prices remains to be seen. TO MEET COMPETITION

Since neither Britain nor the United States are parties to the agreement, the continental consortium will still the continental consortium will still have to meet the full force of competition from these two great producers. The only difference will be that they are now in a position to meet this competition collectively instead of singly and to some extent will be able to stabilize prices by their fixed production. The signatories of the consortium contend that today's agreement is merely to bring them out of the chaos of post-war competition into a surer status akin to that under which their industry was operated before the war. The agreement, they assert, will prevent over-production, will tend to guard against unemployment and will militate against either sporadic flood-militate either sporadic flood-mili militate against either sporadic flood-ing or tightening of the market.

The annual output of the combine will range from a minimum of 26,000,000 tons to a maxium of 30,000,000.

Belgium's maximum, however, is limited to 295,000 tons, a figure higher than that originally offered her, but accepted by the others on the condition that should the total production exceed 27,500,000 tons, the Belgian interests shall not share in the increase.
