A MOST spectacular fire shortly after eleven o'clock this morning completely destroyed the plant of the American Dye Works at 27 Elm street, and did men, who quickly responded to the first alarm. It was thought at first that the fire would spread rapidly and assume the proportions of a conflagration, but it burnt itself out so rapidly that this danger was soon over, and the fire was under control about half an hour after the sounding of the first alarm. The loss is estimated at more than \$10,000. Fire Chief Vaughan was soon on the scene and caused a second alarm to be sounded as well as a third, which

THE Supreme Court of New Brunswick decided this morning, at Fredericton, that the City of Saint John was a law unto itself in so far as the making of rates for water supplied by it was concerned, and that the Board of Public Utilities had no jurisdiction over it as it was not a public utility under the meaning of the act.
