Chicago, Aug. 5.—(A. P. by Mail)—
Twenty per cent. of the tenants in American skyscrapers are lawyers, according to a survey made for the National Association of Building Owners and Managers by W. R. Ballard of Boston, Mass.

The survey covers typical tenantry of 72 skyscrapers, and is said to be the first one of its kind ever made. Of the total of 3,733 tenants canvassed, 833 were found to be lawyers. After lawyers come investment houses with 370, and real estate is a close third with 352 tenants. The survey will be used in aiding prospective builders to determine the proper way to lay out floor space.

Took Bank's \$78,500, Lost It In Stocks

Two Employes of a Bethlehen (Pa.) Trust Company Confess and Go to Jail.

Bethlehem, Pa., Aug. 7—After they had played the stock market on margin and lost \$78,500, Elmer E. Renner, teller, and Howard R. Rehrlg, assistant treasurer and bookkeeper of the Bethlehem Trust Company, were arrested last week. They confessed and were sent to jail in default of \$25,000 bond each.

The bank stands to lose but little, as it will recover \$59,000 from a bonding company and \$25,000 from the personal property and real estate of the two men, which has been seized. The bank directors will make up the remaining \$3,500.

The shortage was discovered by George W. Brown, senior State Bank Examiner, who on a visit to the bank Tuesday found several hundred doblars missing from the cash drawer. Further investigation, in which the two men aided, unearthed total speculations of \$78,500. Both men did not appear to be much broken up at any time during their ordeal, although at noon today Renner remarked:

"This is an awful mess to get into. I don't care so much for myself, but for my family."

Renner is married and has a child. He has been living with his father-inlaw, W. H. Judd. He admitted that he had been buying stocks on margin with West & Co., Philadelphia. He has turned over to the credit of the bank certain sums in his bank account and to his credit with the stock brokers, as well as an automobile.

Renner told the examiner that he had been the one that caried on the operations in the stock market, mostly on margin. He said that on some days he had to have as much as \$5,000 to meet his obligations with the philadelphia House. It is also known that Rehrig had not much to do with the operations for several months, but simply co-operate with Henner in the trust company office in manipulating the books.

When patrons of the bank made a deposit, the deposit slip would be filled out by Renner in sight of the depositor, but later would be destroyed and the money put into his own pockets. Certain accounts in the trust company, along with his personal account would be fixed up by false entiries.
