LATEST HUN MOVE IS STIRRING UP THE SWEDES

Germans Take Aland Islands; Give Notice of Intent To Occupy Whole of Finland

Land Grab Under Guise of Purpose To Restore Order

Word Received in Washington—Petograd Announces Signing of the Peace Treaty With Germany—Huns Issue List of Captures Made in Russia

Christiana, Mar. 4.—(British Admiralty, per Wireless Press)—The Aland Islands were occupied at noon Saturday by the Germans, according to a telegram received here.

Washington, Mar. 4.—Germany's occupation of the Aland Islands is only a preliminary to the total occupation of Finland. Official despatches to the Swedish legation today say Germany has announced to the Stockholm foreign office her intention to occupy Finland and that Sweden has protested.

Germany advised Sweden, the despatches say, that it was necessary, temporarily, to occupy Finland to restore order, but gave assurances that she had no intention to take permanent possession of the territory. Sweden protested also against the Aland Islands being placed in the war zone.

The occupation of the Aland Islands, the despatches say, is to make them a base for supplying the German occupation of Finland. There are 500 Swedish troops on the islands for police purposes. Their commander was notified by the German commander of his intentions, and while so far there has been no clash reported, the Swedish troops have not been withdrawn, and the feeling is described here as being very tense.

GERMAN REPORT ON SUCCESSES

London, Mar. 4.—(British Admiralty, per Wireless Press)—Eastern theatre: "Operations initiated after the lapse of the armistice have led to great successes. Troops under Colonel General Count Kirchbach have hastened in their victorious march through Livonia and Estonia, to the support of the oppressed inhabitants. They were accompanied by detachments of troops from the Baltic islands, which were advancing across frozen Moon Sound, and also by Estonian regiments.

Reval and Dorpat have been captured. Our troops have arrived before Narva. The armies of Kirchbach and Eichhorn continued in their uninterrupted advance by way of Dyak and Mitka, and after hard fighting captured Pskov, Polotsk and Borisoff. At Bobruisk a junction with the Polish divisions was effected.

"Detachments of the army group of General Von Linington, with the approval of the Ukrainian government, have opened fighting on the railway line from Linnica via Horochitz, on the Dnieper, as far as Gomel, and have had several engagements. Other divisions under General Von Knoeven have cleared the roads leading from Kiev and the Kiev-Smerinka railway line of the enemy, after breaking his resistance. In cooperation with the Ukrainians, Kiev was captured. German and Austro-Hungarian troops have entered Shernik.

"The booty taken from the enemy cannot as yet be even approximately established. According to reports at hand there are in our possession 4,800 officers and 57,000 men. In booty we have taken 2,400 guns, more than 5,000 machine guns, thousands of vehicles, including 5,000 motor cars, eleven armored automobiles, 200,000 boxes of artillery ammunition, 12,800 rifles, 800 carriages and 8,000 railway trucks.

"The booty taken at Reval was 200 guns, twenty-two airplanes and a lot of rolling stock. Thirteen officers and 500 men were taken prisoners.

It is thought that with the result of the overseas soldiers' vote all in hand it may be possible within the next few days for the government to fix a date for the opening which would allow sufficient time for the completion of all the necessary preliminary formalities. Wednesday, March 20, is still the favorable date.

MORE MASSACRES BY THE TURKISH TROOPS IN ARMENIA

London, Mar. 2.—The Copenhagen correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company says information has been received there to the effect that Turkish soldiers have committed new massacres in the district of Armenia which has been deserted by the Russians. The despatch adds that Hjalmar Branting, editor of the Social Democrat, has telegraphed two German Socialist parties to make energetic representations to the German government.

USES KNIFE ON BOILER ROOM HAND

Woman Who Shot Husband, Kills Man Who, She Said, Insulted Her Stepmother

Moscow, Com. Mar. 3.—Alleging that he had made insulting remarks to her ten year old stepson, Mrs. Paul Luchet, aged thirty-five, today stabbed to death John McCarthy, forty years old, at a local woollen mill, where he was employed in the boiler room.

ITALIAN WAR LOAN PROVES A SUCCESS

Rome, Mar. 3.—The current Italian war loan now aggregates more than five billion lire. Finance Minister Nitti told the senate yesterday that when he decided to float the loan and asked for six billion lire, eminent financiers objected that on account of special circumstances it would not bring so much as previous issues, which had never exceeded three billion lire. The minister, however, decided to appeal to the public and contributions exceeded the five billion, and the success of the loan was secured. Minister Nitti said this demonstrated the country's resolution and power. The nation, he said, had risen to the occasion because it knew that the sum of six billion lire was required.

BRITISHER TO AID OF AMERICAN IN DISTRESS

An Atlantic Port, Mar. 4.—Calls for assistance from an American tank steamer, which reported that she was disabled by machinery trouble, were received here today. Later, however, British freighter reported that she had proceeded to the tanker's aid, and that it would not be necessary to dispatch a government vessel.

GIRL KILLED IN AN AUTOMOBILE RACE

Stockton, Calif., Mar. 3.—Nina Vitagliana of Los Angeles, was killed here today when a fire flew off her car during a woman's automobile race. Five others were injured. One of these, her mechanic, R. N. Curry, sustained a fractured skull.

NEW ACTING CHIEF OF THE U. S. GENERAL STAFF

Washington, Mar. 4.—Major-General Peyton C. March today formally took over his new duties as acting chief of the United States general staff, relieving Major-General Bliss, assistant chief, who has been directing staff affairs since the chief of staff was assigned to the supreme war council in Europe.

TRAIN AND TROLLEY IN CLASH; TWO KILLED

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Mar. 4.—Telephone advices from Kingston, N. Y., indicate that two persons were killed and a dozen others seriously injured when a train on the West Shore Railway crashed into a loaded trolley car.

Sherbrooke, Que., Mar. 4.—S. Hackett, deputy prothonotary of the supreme court, died yesterday while praying in St. Patrick's church.

French Tribute To The British Army

London, Mar. 4.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—A special correspondent of the Paris Temps at the front pays a high tribute to the British army. "Those who have come in contact with its various contingents, note the extraordinary morale of their troops from all parts of the world, the solidarity of their defence, their confidence in their leaders, the comparative comfort of their quarters. The abundance and variety of food are equally important factors in this happy state of mind."

AMERICANS WIN HONOR FOR WORK ON WESTERN FRONT

Paris, Mar. 3.—(By the Associated Press)—Premier Clemenceau visited the American troops today and reviewed the soldiers who repulse the German attack on Friday. The premier left Paris on Saturday evening and returned this evening, when a semi-official war was issued, congratulating the American troops in the sector where they have just repelled "brilliantly a strong enemy attack."

ANOTHER DISPUTE OVER NO. 5 SHED

City Engineer Says Contractors Should Install More Braces; Contractors Disclaim Responsibility

There is every prospect that there will be another dispute between the city and the contractors regarding the work of reconstructing No. 5 warehouse in West St. John. The shed has been in use since last December, but the city engineer asserts that the work is not complete and that, in its present condition, the proper margin of safety has not been provided.

Norway's Losses Heavy in Ships And 39 Men Gone

Washington, Mar. 4.—Norway continues to suffer heavily from German submarine operations and other war losses. Twelve vessels, aggregating 16,228 tons, and valued at about \$4,000,000, were sunk during February, and nineteen seamen lost their lives, while twenty men are missing, according to a cablegram to the Norwegian legation today.

INDIA HEART AND SOUL IN THE WAR

Remarkable Recruiting Figures And Some Princely Gifts For War Work

London, Mar. 4.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—A despatch from Delhi says that in the last few months India's keen interest in the war has been growing remarkably. All her strength has been brought in to assist the empire and the Allies. Slight inconveniences of war are being cheerfully counteracted by the women of India, who are ever playing a more useful part in all war work.

The latest recruiting figures make a remarkable showing and the enthusiasm of the fighting classes and the generous flow of contributions from Indian princes and rajahs continues unabated. The latest gifts include the offer of Rao Catch to continue until the end of the war an annual payment of £26,000 for expenses of an Indian infantry regiment and Gekwar of Baroda has given £28,000.

OTTAWA MAN NEW BARONET

Descendent of Hon. Joseph Howe Succeeds to Title in England

Ottawa, Mar. 4.—The cable brings word that Vice-Admiral Sir Charles George Frederick Knowles, baronet, died on Sunday at 3 Merton road, Oxford, England.

SONG WRITER TO JAIL FOR LONG TERM ON ABDUCTION CHARGE

Petrie, Who Wrote "Asleep in The Deep", Goes to Jail

Chicago, Mar. 4.—Henry W. Petrie, sixty years of age, composer of "Asleep in The Deep", was sentenced to an indeterminate term of from one to four years in the Joliet penitentiary on Saturday upon his plea of guilty to the charge of abducting Laura Hanson, sixteen years of age.

Last year Petrie and the girl, who was his pupil, toured the United States in his automobile.

GERMANS GET EVEN SILKS BY ROUTE THROUGH SWITZERLAND

Rome, Mar. 3.—Not only cotton and silk, but foodstuffs as well, have been exported to Germany by way of Switzerland in the last two years, according to the latest charges involving Italian deputies and merchants acting as agents for former German firms. It is pointed out that exports to Switzerland in 1917 amounted to 407,000,000 lire as against 886,000,000 in 1916 and 814,000,000 in 1915.

One half the exports last year are said to have been such goods as silk and cotton needed in Italy for war supplies.

THE \$100,000 FOR ST. JAMES' CHURCH IN SIGHT

Montreal, Mar. 4.—Because Sir John Eaton has contributed \$10,000 and Mrs. Timothy Eaton and Major W. P. Eaton \$2,000, only \$8,887 is required to complete the total of \$100,000 wanted for clearing off the debt on St. James' Methodist church and thoroughly renovating the church, so Major the Rev. C. A. Williams, pastor of the church, announced at the service, and intimated that by next Sunday Major Williams would probably have good news to announce with reference to the \$100,000 fund.

AMERICANS ON THE LINE

General Pershing's Troops Take Over a Sector North-west of Toul—"Momentum of Battle Increasing, Says Washington"

London, Mar. 4.—Successful raids were carried out by us last night on different parts of the front," says today's war office report.

"Australian troops entered German trenches near Warstein and, after killing at least fifty of the enemy and destroying several dugouts, brought back eleven prisoners and a machine gun.

"Other successful raids were carried out by Australian troops in the neighborhood of Gapaard, east of Messines and south of Helebeke. Prisoners were taken by us in each case and another machine gun was captured.

SENSATION ATTACHES TO ARREST OF ACTRESS

Another Case of Maintaining Relations With Enemy Comes Up in France

Paris, Mar. 4.—The arrest of an actress named Sany Despey, who has played a minor role at Sarah Bernhardt's theatre, on charges of maintaining relations with the enemy, has caused a sensation because of the importance in the connections of her alleged accomplices. One of them, an Austrian named Rosenberg, who was prominent on the Paris Bourse and whose Paris bank, under sequestration, fled to Switzerland at the opening of hostilities. He organized a bank there, according to the Matin.

The Matin also says that another of the accused, Louis Bordier, of Paris, formerly director of the Casino at Lago, was followed into Switzerland by French detectives to the doors of Rosenberg's establishment in Zurich.

EMILE GUILLER, husband of Sany Despey, and former manager of Sam MeVey, a pugilist, had been employed during the war by a manufacturer of artificial limbs to take orders from maimed soldiers.

Maurice Tremblay, a bank employee, and a representative of Rosenberg before the war, also was traced to Zurich, according to the Petit Parisien, and is said to have made mysterious trips along the French coast in an automobile.

GERMAN IS SENT TO JAIL IN MONCTON

Moncton, Mar. 4.—In the police court here this morning K. Muhl, a German suspect, who was taken into custody recently at Shediac and handed over to the local authorities, was sentenced to three months in jail and \$100 fine. In default of payment of the fine he must spend six months in jail. He was prosecuted under the enemy aliens act.

RESOLUTIONS OF CANADIAN WOMEN'S WAR CONFERENCE

Ottawa, Mar. 4.—Resolutions adopted by the war conference of Canadian women, which will be considered by the government, read with:

1.—The expression of appreciation of the place given women in Canada by the war cabinet's invitation to confer with it in Ottawa.

2.—The opinion of the conference that all milling should be done in Canada so as to prevent foodstuffs being used for spirituous liquors in Britain.

3.—Approval of the appointment of a woman to the region board.

4.—Approval of prohibition in Canada. Other resolutions call for the provision of ways and means for mobilizing women so that unemployment difficulties may be obviated, and consideration of the employment and pay of women generally. The section on public health suggested that women should get the same wages as men in certain lines. Greetings were sent to Sir Arthur Currie and the Canadian troops.

"No Party Government Would Have Dared"
(Toronto Star)

The Union Government is busy organizing, and in expectant silence the press and the public are waiting.

The decisive action taken by order-in-council against the trade in liquor evidenced vigorous purpose. A correspondent who strongly resented the action taken, wrote us a letter expressing his indignation, and in the course of his denunciation of the Union government exclaimed that "no party government would have dared take such action."

Is, as we understand it, is precisely the people of this country elected a non-partisan war government. It was in order that we should, in meeting the exceptional needs which the war creates, have a government which will take action which no party government would dare take. If we have not, in the Union government, such an administration as that, then the country arose in vain at the polls on the 17th of December.

The country expects the new government to be new and expects the new parliament to live up to the specifications on which it was projected.

Matters are moving more slowly than the best friends of Union government throughout the country could have wished, and the government would do well not to mistake the attitude of expectant silence in which the press and the public awaits what is to come as being an attitude of content with what has been accomplished. The setting up of a Union government is not an end in itself. The result looked for is the giving of that efficient and effective administration which the abolition of partisanship during the war was meant to bring about.

Prohibition, civil service reform, and the nationalization of the C. N. R. and the G. T. R. with their subsidiary companies, are achievements with which the government will be credited. These are measures of great importance.

But the war is the main concern, and will be until peace comes. What progress has been made, since the new gov-

BEST VARIETIES OF VEGETABLES

(Experimental Farms Note.)
Owing to the scarcity of seed of many varieties of vegetables this year, it will not always be possible to get those which are desired, hence the importance of getting early in order to secure the best sorts. In the following list, based on tests made at the experimental farms and stations in Canada, several varieties of almost equal merit of some kinds of vegetables are suggested so that if it is not possible to get one it may be possible to get the other.

Beans—Round Pod Wax (Round Pod Kidney Wax, Pencil Pod and Brittle Wax) (Flat Pod Wax), Wardwell Kidney Wax, early, and Hodge Wax, late (Green Pod), Stringless Green Pod, and Early Red Valentine, early, and Refugee or 1200 to 1, late. Lima and Pigeon beans are not very satisfactory except where the season is long and warm. The bush varieties of Lima are the most satisfactory. Scarlet Runner is the most reliable Pole bean, but Kentucky Wonder is one of the best in quality.

Beets—Crosby Egyptian, Detroit Dark Red and Early (medium), Detroit Red Borecole or Kale—Dwarf Green Curled Scotch.

Brussels Sprouts—Improved Dwarf. The Dwarf varieties have been found more satisfactory than the tall ones.

Cabbages—Early Jersey Wax, Copenhagen Market, early; Succession, medium, and Danish Ballhead and Drum-head Savoy, late, and Red Dutch, red.

Cauliflower—Early Snowball and Early Dwarf Dwarf.

Carrot—Chastney, Danvers Half Long, Early Scarlet Horn for extra early, Colby—Golden Self Blanching (Paris Golden Yellow) early, Winter Queen, Evans Triumph, and Perfection Heart-leaf, late; White Flamingo for coolest parts; Corn—(Extra, early), Early Malcom, Malakoff, and Peep O'Day; (early), Golden Bantam, Hibernian, and Montreal Market; (yellow) Emerald Gem, Hoodoo and Paul Rose.

Melons, Water—Early, Ice Cream, and Phinney Early.

Onions—Yellow Globe Danvers and Early Red Wethers are good, especially for transplanting. Early Flat Red and Australian Brown are good where the season is short. The latter is sure a crop in a short season when, if grown from seed, the onions may not mature.

Parsley—Double Curled.

Parsnip—Hollow Crown of a good strain is the best. Intermediate is also good.

Pepper—Early Neopolitan of the large varieties and Cayenne, Chill and Cardinal of the small ones.

Peas—(Extra early) Gregory Surprise; (early) The Laxton, Gradus, Nott Excelsior, American Wonder, and Sutton Early Giant; (second early) Sutton Excelsior and Fremont Gems; (medium to late) Melan Advance, Heroine and Strangers; (late sorts) Telephone, Champion of England and Quite Content.

Radish—Scarlet White Tipped Turnip, Rosy Gem, and White Icicle.

Salsify—Long White, Sandwich Island.

Spinach—Victoria Thickleaved, Viroly.

Squash—Long White Bush, Summer Crookneck; late, Delicious, Hubbard.

Tomatoes—(Extra early) Alacrité, Sparks Earlian; (early and main crop) Bonny Best, Chalks Early Jewel, Later good sorts are Matchless and Trophy (scarlet), and Lexington Globe (plentiful) (purplish pink) Ignomus for canning.

Sweet Turnips—Champion Purple Top.

Potatoes—(Early) Irish Cobbler or Sereka Extra Early; (main crop) Green Mountain, Gold Coin, Wee MacGregor, Carman No. 1, Early Ohio is a good extra early pink sort, but is not very productive.

ADVANCEMENT OF AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION

The promotion of welfare of the agricultural community as a basis for the industrial and commercial prosperity of the country was the object aimed at by the parliament of Canada when, in 1914, at the instance of the then minister of agriculture, the Hon. Martin Burrell, it adopted the measure known as the agricultural instruction act. By means of this act the sum of \$10,000,000 was set apart for distribution among the provinces and territories of the Dominion to provide for a greater extension of instruction and education for those engaged in farming.

An investigation made prior to the introduction of the measure has revealed the teachings of colleges of agriculture and experimental farms was too slow to effect an immediate and noteworthy improvement in the conditions surrounding farm life. The second weakness was found in the fact that little or no attention was being made to adapt the country's educational system to the specific requirements of country boys and girls. In the schools themselves an attempt is being made to develop a system of instruction which will utilize the objects associated with rural life as a medium through which to educate the child. In the higher departments of education, the efficiency of the

provincial colleges of agriculture has been promoted, and, in several provinces, at least, schools of an intermediate grade, between the public school and the agricultural college, have been established. The object of these special schools is to provide vocational training in agriculture and household science. As time goes on and their usefulness is demonstrated, it is certain that, owing to the financial assistance given by the act, their influence will be greatly extended. How wide a field is being covered by agricultural instruction work is indicated in a pamphlet just issued by the Dominion Commissioner of agricultural instruction, W. J. Black. It is entitled "Agricultural Instruction in Canada," and a copy may be had on application to the publications branch of the department of agriculture at Ottawa.

CARE OF SWINE

At a time when every person who can is being urged to raise a pig, a pamphlet is being issued by the live stock branch of the department of agriculture at Ottawa.

the department of agriculture at Ottawa entitled "Feeding and Housing of Swine," comes most opportunely. The pamphlet, which can be had free from the publications branch at the federal capital, contains sections by three of the leading authorities on the subject in Canada. The first of these is Professor G. E. Day, formerly of the Ontario Agricultural College, who writes on the management of both of the young pigs. The second is E. S. Archibald, Dominion animal husbandman, who deals with the farmer's cheap piggy, supplying diagrams of appropriate buildings with dimensions and other useful particulars. The third is G. B. Rothwell, assistant Dominion animal husbandman, who deals with the same subject, but from a different standpoint. He describes a cheap, portable hog cabin that can be built and utilized by practically anybody who is willing to take the trouble. Illustrations of the cabin and diagrams with specifications are also given.

Mack said last night that Boston wanted him to take Del Gainer, but, as this player is now in the service, Mack insisted on Cady. As Mack sold Schang and McInnis, he had to have another catcher and third baseman. Schang, it is stated, is slated to play third base for the Red Sox. McInnis will play at second if Huggins does not get his commission in the army.

Just what the Yankees will give to Mack for Walker is not known, but as the Athletics are badly in need of pitchers it is possible that Huggins will turn over one of his fingers.



LIEUT. LOUIS RITCHIE, YOUNG SAINT JOHN AVIATOR, WOUNDED

Cable From Himself Received This Morning By His Father, Joseph H. Ritchie

Joseph H. Ritchie of the post office staff, received a cablegram this morning informing him that his son, Lieut. Louis McC. Ritchie, had been wounded. It was signed by his son. There were no details, nor any information as to his whereabouts. Lieutenant Ritchie soon after his arrival in England was sent to France, where he was attached to the 187th battalion. Some time later he was transferred to the famous 20th New Brunswick battalion. In December, 1917, he joined the flying corps and two months ago he took up his new duties in France.

Prior to going overseas he was with the 286th kiltie battalion as a sergeant, although he held the rank of a lieutenant. His parents have called Colonel Murray MacLaren, M. D., asking if he can locate their son and learn if his injuries are serious. A host of friends will also anxiously await further particulars regarding his injuries.

THE FINES THIS MORNING CLIMB TO \$624 TOTAL

Long List of Offenders in Police Court—The Wool Case Continued

On the police court sheet this morning was a large number of names and no less an amount than \$624 in fines was struck by Magistrate Ritchie.

Police Constable Quinn arrested a man for drunkenness in Union street on Saturday night. He was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

Mr. Desiring, manager of the Colonial Hide Company, was recalled and identified the bag as one of the company's. The three witnesses at this morning's session arranged to appear at the next hearing, and William R. Ryan, solicitor for the Colonial Hide Company, asked for an adjournment. This was granted. J. A. Barry appeared for the defendants.


