IN THE COURTS

Hearing in an important case was had yesterday afternoon before Mr. Justice McLeod in the chancery division, when the trial of the case of the Repisignit Real Estate & Fishing Co., Ltd., vs. the Canadian Iron Company was commenced. This is a suit brought by the plaintiff for an injunction to restrain the defendants from polluting the Nepisignit river with waste from their mines at Bathurst, where the defendants operate; and to recover damages for the alleged pollution of the waters in the past. It is alleged that the waste from the Iron mines is very injurious to the salmon in the river, and has already caused considerable damage in this way. Luke Bouchey, Hon. Chas. E. Dak, and Wm. Heughey were examined yesterday, and the hearing was adjourned until II o'clock this morning.

These are Lowell, Omaha, Spokane, Memphis, Oakland and Birmingham. Commission government exists in sixteen cities of from 50,000 to 100,000 population and in thirty-one cities of between 25,000 and 50,000 population.
