BRIBERY CHARGED

Nine Detroit Aldermen Are Now to Face Trial

BILLS WERE MARKED

Prosecution Says There is That Evidence Against Them in Allegation That They Took Sums in Return for Municipal Favours to Railway—Nine Other Cases

(Canadian Press) Detroit, Mich., Aug. 20.—When the desks were cleared in the police court today for the arraignment of eighteen Detroit aldermen charged with having accepted or having announced their willingness to accept bribes in return for alleged municipal favours to the Wabash Railway, it was expected that the prosecuting attorney will commence the examination of nine aldermen arrested on warrants alleging the receipt of bribes. These nine aldermen were the first arrested. The prosecution says they accepted various sums in marked bills from an operative of a national detective agency, paying it is asserted, as an official of the Wabash road. It was understood that the nine other cases will probably be passed temporarily.

FUNERAL TROLLEY

CAR ON PHILADELPHIA STREET RAILWAY

Philadelphia, Aug. 20.—The Rapid Transit Company of Philadelphia has installed on its lines a funeral trolley car. It is painted a deep green, with a few decorations in gold. Within the decorations are a few elaborate patterns. There are heavy black velvet draperies and seats upholstered in black leather. There are two compartments, one for the mourners and one for the pall bearers, and in one corner of the car is the receptacle for the casket. At no time during the journey is the coffin in view of those within the car. A large mahogany case around which extends a brass rail is provided for formal occasions, which are kept from writing by contrivances similar to those used by florists.

WANTS TO LIVE IN CANADA AND WANTS A HUSBAND ALSO

Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 20.—Mrs. Elizabeth McPherson, of Charlton, Wash., who describes herself as a lonely widow of thirty-eight years, comely and unincumbered, desires a husband. She also wants to make her home in Canada, but says, with emphasis in a letter to George S. Armstrong, mayor of Edmonton, that no married man need apply for the reason, as she puts it, "a middle-aged man who is working for someone else is a failure." The letter follows: "I hear there are many well-to-do men in your country who want wives. I am a widow, thirty-eight, no family ties, who cannot work, but I can think I could dressmaking and get a little money ahead and some property, but living expenses have grown steadily higher and times harder, so that I cannot earn more than my expenses, and I am breaking down my health sitting idle year in and year out, so I feel that to save my strength and health I must get to a cooler climate. INQUIRY INTO STEAMSHIP LINES IN THE STATES

Washington, Aug. 20.—A comprehensive inquiry into the inter-relationship of steamship lines has been instituted by the house committee on merchant marine and fisheries. To nearly 500 water carriers, embracing practically every company and firm of any importance in this country, the committee has mailed a schedule of forty-two inquiries to secure data regarding ownership, agreements, conferences or the many other methods of control or alliance, the relation of the steamship lines to railroads and other transportation agencies and the prevailing practices with reference to fixing rates and treatment of shippers. The inquiries are based upon a resolution recently passed by the house directing the investigation.

Daily Hints For the Cook

RAISIN CAKE.
Two eggs, one cup sugar, half cup butter, one cup raisins, half cup milk, one teaspoon cream of tartar, half teaspoon soda, not quite half teaspoon all kinds of spice, a little salt, two cups flour.

GOOSEBERRY JELLY.
Use no water, beat berries through and press to extract all juice. Strain and measure, allowing pound for pint of sugar and juice. Boil ten minutes and place in glass.

Three-quarters cup of lard, one saucer of flour (just dip an ordinary saucer into flour and take up all that it holds heaping), quarter teaspoon salt, half cup ice water or less. Cut the lard into the flour with a silver knife, leaving it lumpy. Stir the water in a little here and there and mix it just rough. Put in jobow until needed. Twenty-four hours improves it.

Trouble in Bavarian House of Lords Over Suspension of Law Against Jesuits - The "Kid" McCoy Case

The House of Lords at Munich was the scene, the other day, of a particularly violent quarrel between the regent's grandson, Prince George of Bavaria, and his kinsman Count Hans Toerring, who as chief of a mediated house (one formerly exercising petty sovereign powers) was able to marry Duchess Sophie, of Bavaria, on a footing of equality.

The dispute was in connection with the action of the new premier in issuing, with the sanction of the regent and of his own fellow members of the cabinet, a circular to all national, provincial and municipal officials, directing them to refrain from any further application of the federal law of the German Empire against the Jesuits.

This law was enacted by the Reichstag at Berlin forty years ago, at the instance of Bismarck, in the early stages of his "Cultur-Kampf" against the Catholic Church. It provides for the expulsion of the Jesuit Order from the empire, and in spite of much popular opposition in Bavaria, was finally proclaimed in that state by the pro-Bismarck administration then in office.

The "Cultur-Kampf" however, has long been ended by the defeat of the iron Chancellor. He himself is now in his grave, and the federal law against the order has to such an extent fallen into desuetude that individual Jesuits go about their business even in Prussia, utterly unmolested.

The new administration at Munich decided some weeks ago to suspend the expulsion law, so far as it concerns Bavaria (which is the most Catholic state of the empire, more than three-quarters of the population belonging to that faith), and in place of much popular opposition in Bavaria, was finally proclaimed in that state by the pro-Bismarck administration then in office.

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The expelled intense indignation not only of the chamber, but of the entire kingdom. Even those who had disapproved of the circular at first, were displeased for the Bavarians of the fort had done so, and are extraordinarily jealous of their independence, and keenly resent everything that can possibly be construed as an encroachment thereon from Berlin. Jealousy of Prussia, in fact, is the keynote of the national character. The idea of a regent that Count Hans Toerring should appeal to Berlin to prevent the application of a measure of the Reichstag, was in the eyes of the regent, had had much the same effect upon his fellow-countrymen as a red rag to a bull.

Hardly had Count Toerring resumed his seat, when Prince George, who as one of the reigning houses of the German Empire, Chamber of Peers, arose and denounced his threat, not only as wholly without precedent, but as little short of treason to the Bavarian nation and its venerable regent, intimating at the same time that he would not be deterred from his course by the Jesuit expulsion law, which had been devised by Bismarck only as a weapon against their church—the national church of Bavaria—and as an instrument of warfare that had long since ceased.

Count Toerring is exceedingly wealthy, and his estates in the grand old fortress-castle of Seefeld, overlooking the Pfaffen Lake. The Toerings belong to the Bavaria "Ur-Adel," that is to say, they were already accounted noble at the dawn of German history and they can trace their descent by documentary evidence in an unbroken male line back to Henry Lord of Toerring and of Castle Teulingen, in the Tachen Lake in Upper Bavaria in 1109 A. D.

The present Countess Toerring, who retains her title of Duchess of Bavaria, is a sister of Queen Elizabeth of Belgium and of Princess Maria, consort of Prince Rupert, her presumptive to the Bavarian throne. Like them, she is daughter of the late Duke Charles-Theodore of Bavaria, a famous oculist, and brother of the murdered Empress of Austria.

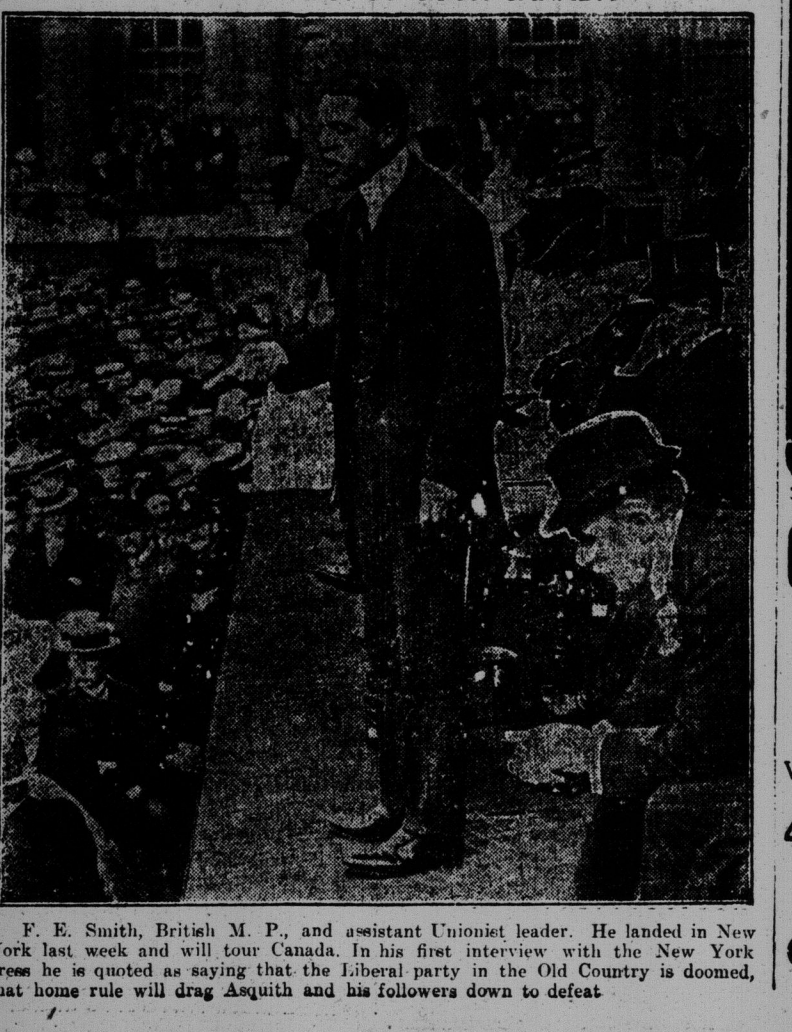

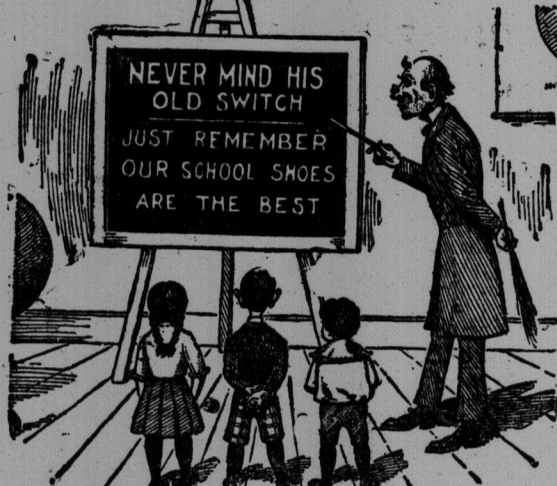

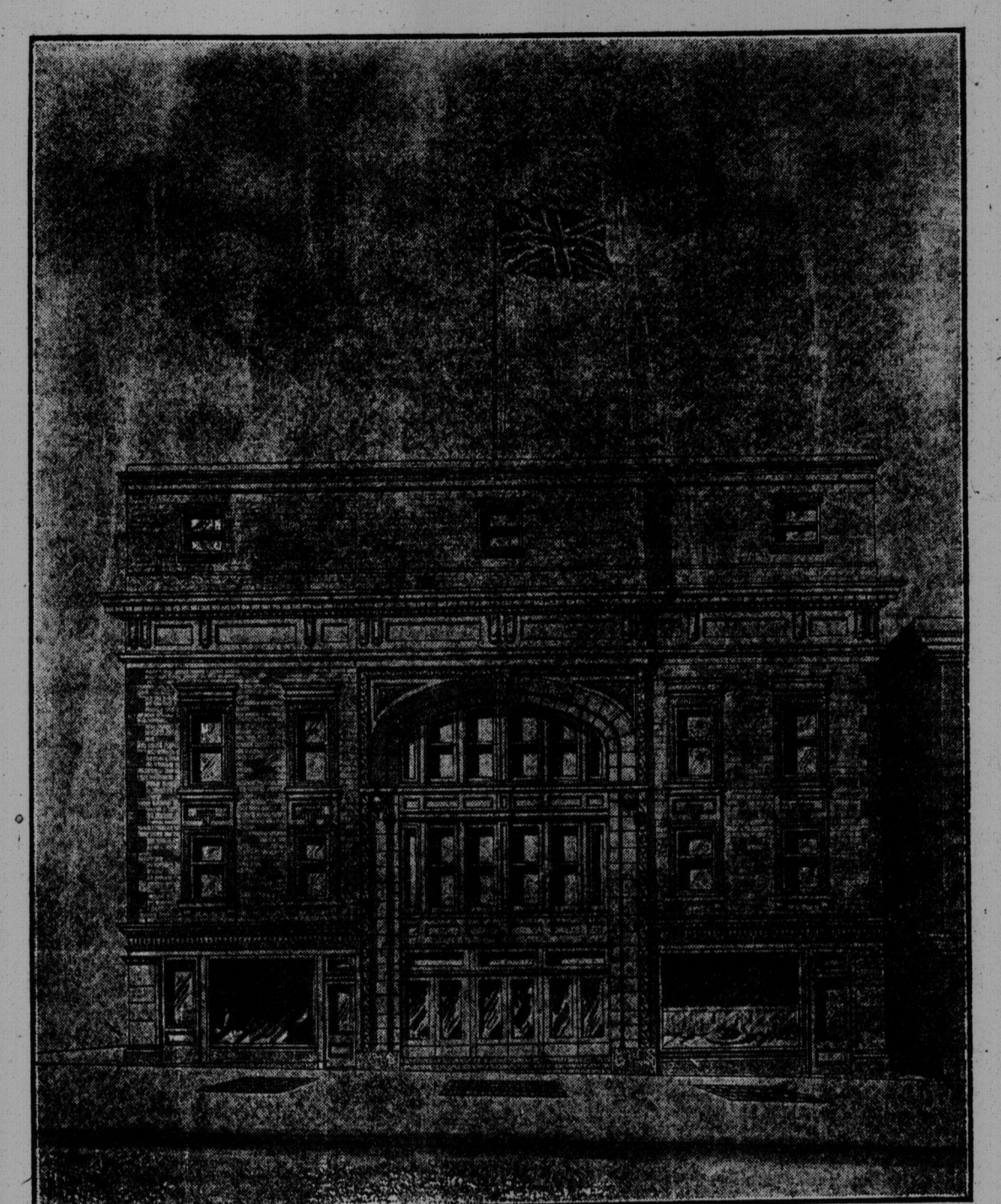

CORSICAN REPORTED.

Allan S.S. "Corsican," was reported by wireless as 118 miles west of Fastnet 4 1/2 miles off land this morning. The Liverpool tonight. It will be remembered that this is the steamer that was reported as having been in collision with an ice berg.

MAY RECOVER.

Three-year-old Joseph Isaacson, who was severely injured about the head and face by being run over by an ice wagon on Saturday, is said to be improving somewhat in the Public Hospital. No hopes are entertained at first for his recovery, but it is thought now that he will get better.

CANADA LOSING ITS BUTTER MARKET IN THE OLD COUNTRY

Ottawa, Aug. 20.—Though the greater proportion of the butter at present imported into Great Britain comes from the overseas dominions and though that importation has increased tremendously with the last decade, Canada has ceased to be a factor in the export of butter to Great Britain.

This fact is learned from a report from the trade commissioner at Birmingham, just issued by the department of trade and commerce. Ten years ago, Canada was the nearest of the dominions to Great Britain, exported the substantial quantity of 23,000 tons of Canadian butter to Great Britain. Twelve months ago the exports fell to 776 tons. For the year ended last winter the exports were valued at a quotation on the London market.

ERIC BREAKS IN TWO

Steamer on Cape Sable Total Loss—Crew Saved

Montreal, Aug. 20.—The office of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company received word this morning that the Eric, which went ashore at Sable Island has broken in two and has become a total wreck. The crew were saved.

The company's operator at Sable Island reported that the Eric began to break up during the night after being pummed by the heavy sea. The crew was on board when she began to go, and for a time position looked poor. They were all taken off safely this morning when the surf subsided.

The Eric was a British steamer 3,376 tons, owned by Turnbull Bros. of Cardiff. Her master was Captain Curran. She was bound from Rosario in the Argentine to Quebec, with a cargo of maize. She went ashore in a dense fog on August 13. A part of the cargo was saved.

MATTERS IN CHANCERY

The August sitting in the supreme court, chancery division, was held this morning. Mr. Justice McLeod presiding.

In the matter of John E. McDonald, lunatic, not so found, A. Barry for the petitioner produced an affidavit showing that service of Mrs. Isabella McSherry's petition and notice of motion had been served on John E. McDonald in McLean Hospital, Waverly, Mass. He also read an affidavit of Dr. George T. Tuttle, superintendent of the Waverly Hospital, in which it was stated that Mr. McDonald was suffering from general paralysis and unable to manage himself or his business, and was growing weaker in mind, and pointed a guardian of the estate until the man had been declared a lunatic, and he would not like to do that himself without a commission. The matter was adjourned until Friday. Dr. W. B. Walker, K. C., C. H. Ferguson and W. J. Mahoney appeared for parties interested.

In the matter of James B. Miller, infant, W. A. Ewing, K. C., moved to confirm the master's report and an order to discharge the guardian and the bond filed by the guardian as well as an order for costs of passing accounts. The complete order was made.

In the matter of R. Heber Arnold et al., trustees, Hon. John Robertson vs. Wm. J. Weldon and Laura Weldon, his wife, Bowyer S. Smith moved for an order for foreclosure and sale of the premises, situated in the city of Moncton. The amount of the principal is \$4,650, and the interest \$146.18. An order on reference was made for the sale of the premises, all parties having leave to bid.

The case of the attorney-general vs. the St. John Lumber Company, Condon vs. Shaw and Potts vs. Potts were stood over until the next sitting.

VOTE OF \$500 TO CARRY ON POLICE PROBE

This Sum Set Aside by Common Council This Morning

MAY NOT NEED IT ALL

Mr. McLellan Wants to Have it in Case of Need—West Side Petition for Street Opening—Early Closing Matter Goes Over.

The weekly meeting of the city council was held this morning, commissioner Wigmore presiding in the absence of His Worship Mayor Frink. This meeting was to have been held yesterday, but on account of the holiday was postponed until today. There were present, besides the chairman, commissioners Agar, Schofield and McLellan and the common clerk.

The matter of the petition in connection with the early closing by-law was laid over until the next meeting.

A petition was read from west side residents asking that the portion of Lancaster street between Charlotte and Winslow be opened to traffic. This was left with the commissioner of public works to deal with. In speaking of the matter the commissioner said that it was desirable to comply with the request, as the section of street in question was a splendid residential locality, and while it might not be possible to do much this year, the matter would probably be dealt with early next season.

The commissioner of public safety recommended that he be authorized to employ such help and incur such expenses as he may find necessary in conducting the proposed investigation into the police department, as ordered by the council. The commissioner pointed out that there would be the need of funds to do this properly. A stenographer's services would be necessary, and it might be imperative to have advice from some matters. He did not know how long the investigation would last or how far it would go, but he would like to know that there were sufficient funds to carry it through. It was decided to allow the sum of \$500 for the investigation. The commissioner said it was mainly that the enquiry would cost anything near that amount.

The commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands in his report recommended that renewal lease issue to Mary Elliott, widow of George Elliott, of Lot No. 25, Block B, Lancaster, for seven years upon the common clerk being satisfied that she is entitled to the same.

A new lease issue to Louis Green of Lot No. 303, 59th ward, for seven years from November next, and that renewal lease issue to him of Lot No. 803, Brooks ward, for seven years from May 1, 1913, and of Lot No. 10, Brooks ward, for seven years from May 1, 1911.

That renewal lease issue to G. W. Williams of Lot No. 2, Block B, Prince ward, for seven years from May 1, 1911, upon the common clerk being satisfied that he is entitled to the same.

That the offers of John F. Gleeson to purchase the fee simple in lots 1092, 1098 and 85, Brooks ward, be not accepted.

That the commissioner be authorized to call for tenders for a steel for the gas lifting doors on the south side of Shed No. 4, Sand Point.

That Charles E. Colwell be granted leave of absence, during the will and pleasure of the common council, to construct and maintain a bridge or run-way from the front of New wharf to the front of his property, recently leased from the city, such bridge to be constructed to the satisfaction of the city engineer, and that he have no claim for compensation at the termination of his license, and that he be also liable for any and all damage to the public and wharf, and that an agreement be drawn up by the recorder.

The commissioner further reports that on the 17th instant, the following city lots were sold at public auction, and the following persons became the purchasers, namely:—

He recommends that deeds issue to the several purchasers under the common seal. This report was adopted and the recommendation ordered to be carried out.

CONSTABLE STILLWELL TODAY FINED \$24

Several Other Cases in the Police Court This Morning

Wallace Stillwell, a constable, was arraigned in the police court this morning and was fined \$8 or thirty days in jail for drunkenness and \$10 or two months in jail for resisting the police. The charges for creating a disturbance in the Lyric theatre and using profane language in the street were allowed to stand.

James Elliott, charged with lying and lurking in a box car on the Ballantyne wharf, was remanded to jail. There may be a more serious charge than that of lying and lurking.

John Watson, charged with being drunk and using profane language in the I. C. R. depot, and also with voluntarily resisting the police, was fined \$8 or thirty days in jail for drunkenness and \$10 or two months in jail for resistance.

Four prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined \$8 or two months in jail. John Allen, charged with obtaining money under false pretences, was again remanded. Howard McNally, a sixteen year old boy, called upon to answer to the charge of using abusive language to his stepmother. He pleaded guilty and was sent into jail.
