New York, Dec. 11.—There was peace in the air at the dinner of the Canadian Society in Montreal last night, Sir John Wilton, editor of the Toronto News, presided on behalf of Canada and Secretary of State Bryan, followed by the United States. England's speech was declared by Viscount Balfour on behalf of the British Empire, who was unable to be present in person, but being connected with an administration which was in the process of being removed, so far as human wisdom could, the causes of war, the secret of state policy of what was being done in Washington to bring the nations into harmony.

Three Shots Fired at South Africa Magnate

REVENGE IS REASON

One Bullet in Neck, Another in Thigh But Condition Declared Not Very Serious—Assailant is Arrested—Shot Down in Johannesburg Street

Johannesburg, Union of South Africa, Dec. 11.—An attempt was made today to assassinate Sir Lionel Phillips, the principal gold mining magnate of South Africa. Three shots were fired at him. One bullet lodged in his neck and another in one of his thighs. His condition is declared not to be grave. The assailant was arrested.

OREGON FIXES \$3.25 AS WOMEN'S MINIMUM WAGE
Portland, Ore., Dec. 11.—A ruling by the State Welfare Commission effective in sixty days, prescribes a minimum scale of \$3.25 a week for all women employed in industrial occupations in the State of Oregon and fixes 84 hours as the maximum they may be employed in any one week. The time of employment in which a woman shall be considered an experienced worker and entitled to the minimum wage, is fixed at one year and the wage of an apprentice period is fixed at \$0 a week.

NOTED SPEAKERS AT CANADIAN CLUB DINNER IN NEW YORK

William Jennings Bryan, secretary of state, represented the Wilson administration, while Hon. W. T. White, the Canadian minister of finance, was the Canadian government's envoy.

In addition, Sir John Willison, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Justice W. R. Riddell, and F. B. Featherstonhaugh, of Toronto, and Alex. D. Fraser, of Montreal, came to the city for the occasion, while Governor Talbot, of New Jersey, Bishop Courtenay, and representatives of the St. George's, St. Patrick's, St. Andrew's, St. David's, and other societies formed the American representation.

The British embassy was represented by Viscount Camden and Consul-General Courtenay, Walter Bennett, R. J. Norworthy, vice-consul, and John Joyce Frederick, the lately appointed consul at Amsterdam, who in attendance.

Mr. Bryan delivered an eloquent plea for international peace, which was supplemented by a powerful address from Mackenzie King for social justice as well.

ROAD BUILDING IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

New Highway Will Open Up Through Route to Edmonton

Victoria, B. C., Dec. 10.—Within the next year or two, British Columbia will possess an up-to-date high-way extending from Kamloops to Tetejaune Cache, and giving connection through to Edmonton, Thomas Taylor Minister of Public Works stated today.

The provincial government has already established a good road for about ninety miles north of Kamloops along the North Thompson river, and it is to be extended later north to Tetejaune Cache, where it will meet the highway built by the Grand Trunk Pacific contractors, east and west.

WILL SING BOTH

Question Whether "O Canada, or Maple Leaf" is Best.

Vancouver, Dec. 10.—Whether the "Maple Leaf" or "O Canada" should be sung at the Canadian Club luncheon in this city was a point discussed at the annual meeting of the club. It was pointed out that there were words in "The Maple Leaf" that might offend certain Canadians and that it was not applicable to present day conditions.

A compromise was effected by including the two odes in future programmes. The club had also under consideration the matter of eliminating all political matters in the speeches of visitors.

FEDERAL SUPERVISION OF GRAIN INSPECTORS IN THE UNITED STATES

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 10.—A bill providing for federal supervision of grain inspection will be presented in congress, it was decided yesterday at a meeting of directors of the National Grain Dealers' Association. According to the proposed bill, a government commission of agriculture will be appointed. This commission will be empowered to examine and license grain inspectors.

Boston, Dec. 10.—A substantial increase in rates is necessary for the success of the Boston & Maine railroad, according to S. M. Felton, president of the Chicago & Great Western railway, who has been making a thorough examination of Boston & Maine affairs.

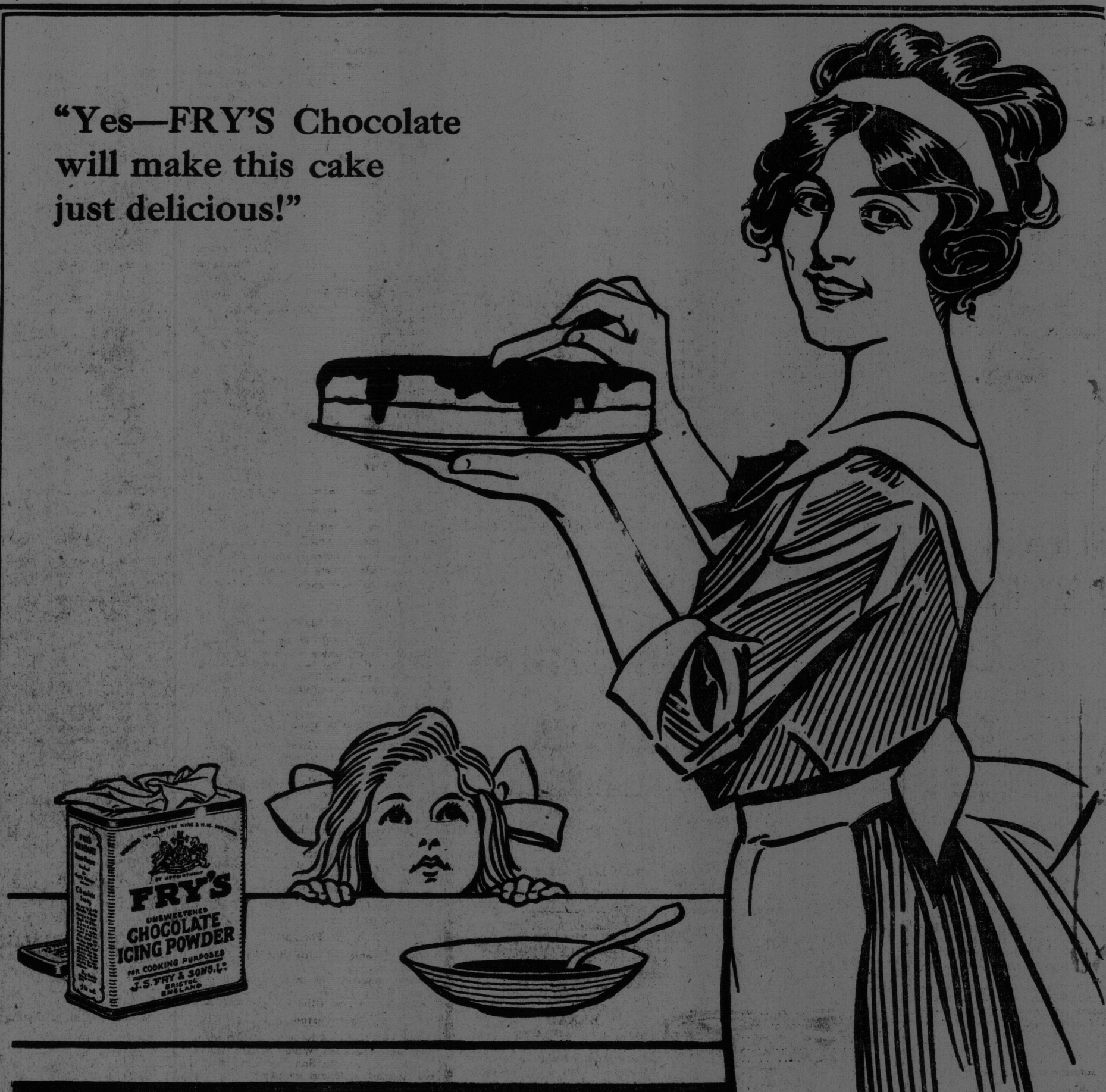
Mr. Felton's findings were filed today with the public service commission.

Mr. McLean went across as first mate and said they had a fine trip and although it was rather rough on the sea and that they put into Brierley Island only when they ran short of water for the boiler. They stayed there until Monday, leaving for Meteghan in the afternoon. While the steamer was lying at the wharf on Monday Captain McLean said that it was necessary to keep the engines going continually as she was wildly tossed about by the heavy sea. Although the work was high, the Champlain left for Meteghan that afternoon and arrived there in the evening and was hailed up the next day.

LEAPS TO FREIGHT TRAIN AND MAKES ESCAPE
Chain Gang Prisoner's Spectacular Get-Away After a Hard Chase

Among the passengers from the city on one of the freight trains going over the L. C. R. on Tuesday night, who had become tired of working for the city without remuneration and decided to leave for parts unknown, was William Delaney, who was arrested about a month ago on a charge of begging from travelers in J. C. B. street, was sentenced to serve six months in jail with hard labor. On last Tuesday the guards, Delaney watched his way clear for an escape, bolted from the rear of the gang and started down the street on the double quick. The I. C. R. Gilt to the C. P. R.—Free Haulage of Empties from Halifax to St. John?



Under the Railway Act, all rates on the Intercolonial Railway are governed by order-in-council. If Mr. Galtelin has given a rate to the C. P. R., which was not endorsed by the governor-in-council at Ottawa, then that rate is illegal, but it is impossible to conceive that Mr. Galtelin did not submit the rates to the privy council at Ottawa for endorsement through an order-in-council, and therefore the Hon. Mr. Hazen is responsible for whatever injustice may be embodied in any freight tariff on the I. C. R., which is adopted.
