OUR PART.

While the Imperial Government is making prompt and extensive preparation for the worst that may arise, and Canada is showing herself scarcely second, in New Brunswick hardly anything seems to be doing. The Government and people look on at the preparations making around them, and, by the military authorities, in their midst, with some curiosity, but with as much apparent indifference as though it was all to them not a matter of the slightest concern. All that we seem to think of is to get the last telegram from the United States, and to speculate about how much money the movements of British troops will bring into the Province. One would suppose that the quarrel was of no importance to us, and that we felt satisfied that the results of a war between Great Britain and the United States could not affect us in the most trifling degree. The apathy and indifference of both people and Government in the great duty of preparation would be positively ludicrous, were it not so disgusting.

The Govt. are very much to blame in the matter. The Volunteer movement has been almost starved out in the Province, from the fact that the administration think it but a nuisance, and give it the cold shoulder. Seven hundred and fifty pounds was the magnificent grant proposed in the Budget, and voted by the Legislature last winter for the Militia. Men with quite as much wisdom as Mr. Tilley, and who would have been as loath as he to spend the public money without a purpose, thought the grant ridiculous, and thought the movement deserving of a far different treatment from that of which this was a specimen. But Mr. Tilley and men of his way of thinking held the purse strings; and there was nothing for the Volunteers but to get on as they could. That the Government were thoroughly wrong the event has proved. Had proper provision been made for assisting the Volunteers we might have had six or eight thousand men at this moment organized, armed, and drilled. Almost the whole expense has been thrown upon themselves, when they are the very men who should bear none of it; because in giving their time and attention they do much more than their share, and as much as they can afford to do. The country should not allow them to be burdened with any of the expenses connected with keeping up volunteer corps. If the volunteer provides his own uniform, and the volunteer necessary to attain proficiency, gives the time necessary to attain proficiency, he should not be called upon for one penny more—the public should not allow him to contribute one penny more. But, consequently had it not been for its own innate vitality, the movement would have been at this day almost entirely extinguished. But to return to the present—in view of the hurried and extensive military preparations of the Imperial Government—steamers with troops and munitions of war arriving almost daily—frontier towns garrisoned—military men flying hither and thither in the haste of preparation—New Brunswick would do something. One expects that in a crisis like this the Government would lead the way. It is not necessary for them to do very much. Let them place a sufficient sum at the disposal of the Lieutenant Governor as Commander in Chief. From what we have seen of him he certainly does not lack earnest-

ness in the cause. The proper measures taken, in a month the volunteer force would be doubled, in three months it would be quadrupled. Give the young men of the towns and of the rural districts arms, drill instructors, drill rooms, and pay their contingent expenses—they will give the time and attention. Encourage those who are fitted to take the lead in the different localities, support them in their exertions; they will do the work of setting companies on foot, organizing them, and infusing the proper spirit. Take Woodstock and its vicinity for example. It has a Rifle Company of between forty and fifty which has a Provincial reputation; and an Artillery Company which is maintaining a struggle to get into existence—half alive and rather more than half dead. Were the proper steps taken, at a comparatively trifling expense, another Rifle Company could be raised, the Artillery would come at once to full and healthy life, and a cavalry troop would be organized. But it is unreasonable to expect men with not a cent more money, and not an hour more time, to spare than have their neighbors, to assume the inconvenience and expense of supporting volunteer corps which they have not a whit more interest than their neighbors. Let the Government do its duty, and the volunteers will do theirs. Why is it the Government will not only not lead the way but perseveres in refusing to follow in it? Our present apathy is a disgrace to the Province and a stigma upon our manhood.

BARRACKS.—During the past four days energetic preparations have been made in fitting up the Brick houses of Messrs. Connell and Brown for the reception of the troops which were expected yesterday. Last evening a detachment of forty officers and men of the 62nd arrived via St. Andrews, with baggage, and the men took up their quarters in Brown's building, which was found very comfortable. The officers for the present stay at the Blanchard House. Four houses, those recently occupied by Messrs. Grover, F. Bull, H. McLean and Dow, have been engaged for officers' quarters; and Mr. W. F. Dibblee's for a hospital. Three hundred men are expected to-day, and three hundred more to-morrow. Woodstock for a week back has presented an appearance of unusual life and bustle.

NEW YEAR'S DAY.—Yesterday was the first of the New Year, and was generally observed as a holiday. Captain Baird's Company of Rifles turned out for a parade. At 3 P. M., Mayor Fisher presented the gold medal in Connell's Hall, accompanying it with some very eloquent and forcible remarks. The Artillery Company also fired a salute. The day passed off pleasantly.

SILVER.—Country people should take notice that the rate of silver has been reduced in Woodstock to the legal value—for British half crowns sixty cents, shillings twenty four cents, York shillings twelve cents.

DR. RUSSELL'S LETTERS.

ACTIVITY OF THE CONFEDERATE ARMY. In our immediate front the enemy have showed some activity; not a Federalist party can stir out without being pounced upon, for they do not care much about throwing out sentries or adopting any precautions, regarding patriotism probably as its own best safeguard. Thus last Saturday a party of 50 men, with waggon, went out from the 30th New York Volunteers to carry off corn from a mill near Falls Church, and were engaged in their work, when Stewart's Cavalry pounced on them and carried them off, carts, officers, and all, "the conduct of our men," says the *New York Times*, "being disgraceful in the extreme." Yesterday the same cavalry came down on the pickets near Falls Church, and drove them in. They are all about "scouting" a few days ago, had to ride for his life, leaving his two orderlies in the hands of the Secessionist cavalry, as the penalty for straying a little outside his camp line for sentries. There has been a sharp skirmish in the Kanawha valley, from 4 p. m. till nightfall, between General Benham's brigade and the confederates. "The loss on our side was two killed. The general pursued them 25 miles amid a drenching rain, but seeing little chance of overtaking them turned back." If he did, perhaps there was reason for it, as in the next line we are astounded to read that the distant enemy turned and were after Benham like lightning; at least so they must have done, as "in the skirmish with the rear guard, Colonel Crogan, and a few others of the rebel cavalry were killed." Who shall learn the truth—or is there any truth at all?

POPULAR FEELING TO BE APPEASED.

Up to the 19th Lord Lyons had received no communication; but no doubt the correspondence would open in London. The correspondent adds:—"The agitation created by the event had not subsided, and I am satisfied there is much secret apprehension of a serious breach with England in consequence of the seizure. Notwithstanding the assumption of perfect ease, founded on legality and right, which is made for external use, there are popular passion and vengeance to be gratified by the capturing of Mason and Slidell; and I believe the Government will retain them at all risks, because they dare not give them up, not being strong enough to do what is right in the face of the popular sentiment. Prince de Joinville speaks of the transaction with the profoundest regret, and evidently regards it as inexcusable, and the Orleans princes share the sentiments of their uncle. In the Cabinet there is a division (so it is said) of opinion in reference to the course to be pursued. The President, Blair and Chase are said to be in favour of giving the captives up. Seward and others are believed to resist this, and to sustain the capture. In the camps among the common soldiers, there is a feeling of pleasure, as I am assured, at the seizure, but many of these men have been taught to believe that this campaign was but a training for a great war with England. The review which is to take place on the 20th will not diminish the arrogance of the anti-British sentiment in the ranks; there will be 65,000 men and 200 guns on the ground. 600,000 men are now drawing pay at the rate of nearly £60 per annum, with rations and clothing, taking the pay a. that of privates alone. There are also 600 pieces of artillery, which cost something also."

SPIRIT OF THE CANADIAN PRESS.

THE MILITIA CALLED OUT.—The people of every portion of Canada will have an opportunity to day of offering to the whole world the noble spectacle of a nation springing en masse to arms to repel the threatening invasion of an enemy. We predict with confidence that the uprising will be to His Excellency's general order as instant as the echo to the word, and that within a fortnight at the farthest, we shall chronicle the act that nearly 50,000 men are mustered shoulder to shoulder, as ready as their fathers proved themselves to encounter hardship and fatigue and to dare danger or death in defence of their own fire-sides, their cherished institutions, their native land. They will bear in mind that all that's worthy to be held dear is menaced. The honor of the flag of which we are all proud is threatened. We know that in the event of war, on us the first and deadliest blow will fall. If we meet it as we ought, we shall preserve our connection with the Empire—we shall hold our soil uncontaminated by the loathed presence of a hostile army. If we unworthily flinch from the encounter, our budding hopes of future nationality is destroyed. But of such consequences we will not for an instant dream. Within a week it will be manifest that fifty years of rest have not dulled the national spirit of Canadians; may have rather given them so great a relish for the blessings of an honorable peace, they will enter into a war by which the renewal and continuance of these benefits may be procured so earnestly and unitedly as to render ultimate victory a certainty.—[Quebec Chronicle, 21st inst.

DEATH OF THE PRINCE CONSORT.

Francis Albert Agustas Charles Emmanuel, Prince of Saxe Coburg and Gotha, was born on the 26th August, 1819, and was the second son of the late Duke of Saxe Coburg Gotha, by his first marriage with Louise, daughter of the late Duke of Saxe Gotha, Altenburg.—Prince Albert was partially educated at home, after which he was sent to the celebrated University of Bonn, where he received an education fit for a statesman. His own taste led him to the cultivation of a knowledge of natural history and chemistry, and he displayed great love for the fine arts, and especially music and painting; and an opera written by him is said to have been performed in London. He was also fond of athletic sports, and became a great proficient in all those arts and exercises which make up the character of the "cortous knight." He was married to Victoria, the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland, in London, on the 10th of February 1840, since which time he has enjoyed great popularity in England. At the time of his marriage he was naturalized and made a Field Marshal. In 1842 he was allowed to take the title of Consort of Her Most Gracious Majesty, and in 1857 by the title of Prince Consort he became a Prince of the United Kingdom. As consort he enjoyed an income of £30,000 sterling a year.

Prince Albert has ever stood in high esteem with the people of England, and what may be considered remarkable for a man of his high position, always abstained from any undue interference in the foreign affairs of the nation. He devoted his time to the improvement of agriculture and to the development of the industrial resources of England. He was also a liberal patron to the English fine arts; and probably did more real good than any man in England. The success of the Great Exhibition of 1851 was in a measure owing to the exertions of Prince Albert, and the Exhibition of 1862 will greatly miss his labors. Prince Albert was a Field Marshal, a Member of the Privy Council, a Knight of the Garter, Knight of the Grand Cross and Acting Grand Master of the Bath, Knight of St. Patrick, Knight of the Thistle, Knight Grand Cross of the Order of St. Michael and George, Governor and Constable of Windsor Castle, Colonel of the Grenadier Guards, Colonel-in-Chief of the Rifle Brigade, Colonel and Captain General of the Honorable Artillery Company of London, Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, Master of Trinity House, and Patron and Member of many useful associations.

Later from Europe

"Arrival of the Asia."

HALIFAX, Dec. 31.

The steamer Asia left Liverpool, 21, Queens-town, 22nd. She has on board 500 troops, stores, &c., arrived at Halifax at 5 P. M. Tuesday.

Warlike preparations unabated. Additional troops are ordered to be ready to embark.

The Army and Navy Gazette of the 21st, says, no more troops are likely to be placed under orders until hostilities are actually declared. The steamer Adriatic, with nearly 1,400 troops of Scots Fusilier Guards, and Parana with about 1,000 more Grenadier Guards, left Southampton on the 20th for British North America—

with more soon to follow.

Mail steamers of Peninsula and Oriental Co., numbering about 50, were to be armed and made capable of resisting privateers in event of war.

The Morning Post reports that instructions to Lord Lyons combine such judiciousness and temperance of procedure that America most tender of his pride will be unable to complain of England's course as menacing or haughty.

A Telegram of the 20th from Berno contains the following important announcement, the Federal Council has received a circular addressed by the French Government to European powers declaring the arrest of Mason and Slidell as contrary to principles which are regarded as essential security to neutral flags.

Circular states that French Government deemed it necessary to submit this opinion to the Washington Cabinet in order to determine it to make concessions, which the former consider indispensable.

Cobden strongly advocates arbitration in the American dispute. Says cry for peace is hardly enough at present moment.

The Times editorially disputes Cobden's argument, says: "We insist upon knowing clearly whether we are in the region of war or of peace—if seizure of prisoners was an act of American Government or if adopted by them, now it is an act of War, and as such to be encountered by War, if they disown it, they must prove their sincerity by repairing it. It is impossible to negotiate in the former case the latter has not yet arisen, there is therefore no room for arbitration."

The Daily News is in favor of arbitration. The article concludes by denouncing the tone of menace and insult adopted by some Journals. In another article it defends the North from the charges of the Times that War was brutalizing the Northern States.

Movements were taking place between Government and the authorities of Liverpool, looking to defences of that port.

English funds 20 cents firmer, advanced half per cent—demand for money was still increasing.

The Queen and Royal family had gone to Osborne, owing to the satisfactory state of the Queen's health. No further bulletines issued.

FRANCE. Bourse a shade firmer on the 20th. The suspension of one company per regiment in the French army is spoken of.

INDIA. Cotton goods firm and advancing; export of cotton from Bombay to England during the present year is estimated at 920,000 bales.

It is stated that Sir Charles Wood decided to remove the seat of Government from Calcutta to Hillah.

The Observer, ministerial paper, says: "England wishes peace, but would gain by a war, which would enable her to supply American frontiers, and open Southern ports and give a lesson to Americans."

Washington, Dec. 20, 1861. The following despatch to Gen. Marcy, Chief of Staff, from Gen. McCall was received this evening:

DRAINTSVILLE, Dec. 20—4 P. M. To Gen. Marcy: Gen. Ord's Brigade, with the 1st Rifles and Easton's Battery, had a brisk affair with four regiments and a battery of the rebels at 12 m. to-day. I arrived during the action, and sent for Gen. Reynolds, who was left at Difficult Creek. The enemy were defeated, and fled before Gen. Reynolds arrived. We have found 40 killed of the enemy, and 10 wounded on the field. Our loss: 2 killed, and three wounded. We have taken two caissons with the harness, the horses having been killed. The Rifles behaved finely. Col. Kane is very slightly wounded, but still in the field. I have collected the dead and wounded, and am about to move back to camp.

New York Dec. 28. Washington intelligence this morning publishes correspondence between Secretary Seward and Lord Lyons, by which it appears that Mason and Slidell are to be surrendered.

This and other peaceful indications show that war with England will not take place. The rumor gives firm and buoyant tone to stock market.
