

GOOD FAITH IN TREATIES FIRST ETHICAL RULE

Root Informs Senate Britain's Claim Must Hold PANAMA PLANS Measure Adopted Providing "One Man" Administration of Canal Zone—President to be in Full Charge.

Washington, Aug. 6.—The future of the Panama Canal will rest in the hands of a "one-man government" through the decision of the Senate today to support a plan already endorsed by the House of Representatives. By a vote of 42 to 14 it adopted a provision giving the President power to appoint a governor to "complete, govern and operate" the canal and canal zone.

Spurns the Protest. "The fact that we had a diplomatic note from Great Britain is absolutely immaterial and irrelevant to me," he said. Senator Lodge declared the United States if compelled to go before the Hague Court will question the rights of the American ships to pass through the canal, "no matter how good it was."

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ATTEMPTED TO DESTROY THEATRE

Militant Suffragettes On Trial for Outrages at Dublin Meeting. Crowds Fill Court Room for Sensational Case—One Woman Misinterpreted Cabinet Minister's Advice.

Dublin, Ire., Aug. 6.—Four militant suffragettes were put on trial here today on the charge of having committed serious outrages at the time of the visit to Dublin of the British prime minister, Gladys Evans was found guilty of setting fire on July 15, to the Theatre Royal, where Mr. Asquith was scheduled to speak the following day on home rule. The charge against Mabel Capper who was accused of being an accomplice of Gladys Evans, was withdrawn, while Lizzie Baker, also charged as an accomplice, pleaded guilty to damaging property.

The attorney general for Ireland, C. A. O'Connor, with three assistants, conducted the prosecution. He demanded the exclusion from the jury of all members of the Society of Molly Maguires. He said that he refused to be insulted by them and did not doubt that they were there by the government's orders.

Mr. Healy's cross-examination developed the assertion that Mr. Hobhouse in the course of a speech had said that the suffragettes would accomplish nothing unless they began to burn houses. Mr. Healy in addressing the jury said that Miss Evans was not a criminal.

GLASGOW WILL HONOR BORDEN

Freedom of City Will Be Conferred Upon Premier—Mr. Hazen to Leave England August 21st.

Ottawa, Aug. 6.—Hon. L. P. Pelletier and Hon. C. J. Doherty return to Canada on August 16. Hon. J. D. Hazen leaves on the 21st. The date of Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden's return is uncertain owing to the amount of business still to be completed. It is probable, however, that Mr. Borden will leave on the 23rd or 30th.

In an interview today Mr. Borden paid a tribute to the debating strength of the House of Commons and to the earnestness with which business is conducted. He was present for the greater part of the debates on the supplementary naval estimates, and those of the Imperial defence committee in which Mr. Asquith and Sir Edward Gray, Mr. Churchill, Mr. Balfour and Bonar Law took part.

Liverpool, Aug. 5—Capt. Lord of the Californian, who failed to go to the relief of the Titanic and was censured by the recent report of the British Admiralty, is still in the employ of the Leyland Line, but has no command at present. He reports himself daily at the office. Nothing is known here of any prosecution or likelihood of it. Captain Lord is married, has a family of six children, and is a very able navigator. Capt. Lord keenly feels the strict censure passed by the board of inquiry on his alleged neglect.

MARINE NOTES

BATTLE LINE. Steamer Eretia, Captain Crossley, left St. Vincent August 6 for Buenos Ayres from Hull, G. B.

LARGE PASSENGER LIST. Steamer Calvin Austin arrived Tuesday from Boston direct and landed 259 passengers.

LOTS OF HARD COAL. The schooner Herald and Ella M. Storer arrived at the port Tuesday from New York, both with hard coal. These two vessels make about six trips weekly with a few days and they will have to wait some time before they can be discharged.

BOTH EMPRESSES AT QUEBEC. Quebec, Aug. 5—The Empress of Ireland is moored at the breakwater near her sister ship, the Empress of Britain. It was the first time in their history that the two ships were so close to one another.

VESSEL SOLD. Schooner Tota, 536 tons net, built at Bath, N. S., and sailing from St. John, N. B., was sold June 30 to Capt. J. M. Scott, of Mobile, Ala. The ship is to be used in the Gulf and West India trade.

THE NEW ALLAN LINE. The two 17,000-ton Atlantic liners now in course of construction on the Clyde for the Allan Line are to be named the Alaskan and Calgarian respectively.

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC NOTES. Bids have been requested for the construction of the roadbed and building of the Southern Lower Quebec Railway, which will bring the Central Vermont Railway from Palmer, Mass., to Hudson, N. B., and thence to the Grand Trunk Pacific station at St. John, N. B. It is expected to have trains running over the new roadbed by the end of this year.

Orders have been issued by the head office of the Grand Trunk Railway that all switchmen must have standard watches which will be regulated every week by the official time-keeper of the company.

Over 25,000 immigrants will be brought open across the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway west of Montreal this year. Of this number 15,000 are in the Grand Pacific section north of Edmonton, the first portion of the famous Peace River country.

A branch running southwest from Biggar now under construction will open up a number of choice homesteads and this section will probably be filled up very quickly.

On February 24 while travelling between Buffalo and Toronto on the Grand Trunk Railway system the following testimonial signed by three prominent residents of Buffalo was handed to the buffet car conductor:


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

## WELL DONE, TRINIDAD!

Trinidad's decision last week in favor of Preferential Trade with Canada completes the list of West Indian Colonies whose representatives on April 9th last entered into the agreement with the Dominion Government. As a victory for the principle of Imperial Preference the occasion was noteworthy. In none of the Colonies were the issues more clearly defined nor the fight keener. Commercial interests in the Colonies were the same, and the same reasons were advanced for their rejection of the agreement. Mr. John Foster Dulles, the emissary in question, by personal canvass and by letters in the Trinidad press expatiated upon the advantages of trading with the United States, and between whiles served notice that if a Preference were given to Canada the products of the Island would be penalized. But Trinidad was not the Island would be penalized. On both Imperial and commercial grounds the agreement was ratified by the Legislative Council and the Chamber of Commerce. The campaign of the United States "interests" ended in defeat.

As a sign of the times that a closer commercial union within the Empire is at hand, the following paragraph in a despatch to the United States Press, announcing Trinidad's decision, is not without significance:

The supporters of the agreement urged that its acceptance would show the Imperial sentiment of Trinidad, and that it would be the first step toward general trade within the British Empire.

"We must take it now, or give it up for ever," said President Taft when advocating the advantages of the Reciprocity Pact with Canada. The West Indian Colonies, following the lead which the Dominion gave them last September, have intimated with no uncertain voice that it takes two to make a bargain; and that the tariff policies of the Dominion and the Colonies of the Empire, henceforth, will be on the lines of Imperial Preference. The strong feeling in favor of Empire Preference in Trinidad is well illustrated by the tenor of an article in the Trinidad Mirror shortly before the agreement was ratified. The article appeared in reply to a letter from the United States agent, Mr. Dulles, published in the Port of Spain Gazette, in which he undertook, "on behalf of several leading business men in the United States," to give advice to the British West Indies not to enter into the Trade Agreement with Canada. The Trinidad Mirror's reply was as follows:

It is very kind indeed of Mr. John Foster Dulles to take up in the Port of Spain Gazette the cudgels for the "several leading business men of this city," who are so loath to leave the loving commercial embrace of our American cousin to seek that of our Canadian sister, but it must strike one as curious that these same commercial gentlemen have been so strangely silent, these few, or in such small numbers, whenever the question has been on the tapis and that they now require the aid of a special emissary from the United States to plead their unpopular cause. It is quite true that there are a few men among us who are thankful to think only a few—who are infatuated, shall we say, saturated with American ideas and equally bereft of any of the Imperial feeling which is rapidly flowing throughout the British Empire and tending towards the inevitable preference within the Empire for Empire products by which means alone will it be possible to fight the hostile tariffs of the rest of the world, headed by the country of which Mr. John Foster Dulles is a native. But these men can no more withstand the howling tide than could the historical old lady and her broom.

Mr. John Foster Dulles again parades the stock arguments with which we are all so familiar—the arguments of bluff which, to our sorrow, years ago imposed upon Sir Townsend Fenwick and his brother commissioner, and led to the wilful rejection of the splendid offer made by Canada, which would have proved of inestimable value to the sugar industry, in favor of special offers from the States from which no single penny of benefit resulted. Sir Townsend, and we are pleased to think, has seen the error of his ways, so far as this subject is concerned, long ago, and we trust when the matter comes before Council that the Senior Unofficial will lead the other members with no uncertain tone in the right direction.

It is time that Trinidad struck against American dictation. We do not wish to be ruled by a visitor, but it seems to us that Mr. John Foster Dulles rather presumes upon British courtesy when he seeks in a British Colony to tell us what our relations with a British Dominion should be. It is fresh in all our minds how deeply people in the United States resented a few thoughtless words uttered by a British Minister in regard to American affairs, but it seems that Americans are to be exempt from displaying to others the international courtesy which they are so jealous of receiving themselves.

The United States gives preference to her colonies, to the prejudice of Great Britain and her Colonies; all other countries except Great Britain do the same, and now we are to be told that we, a British Colony, are to be penalized because we venture to do what the United States has always done? The sooner we let Mr. John Foster Dulles know that we are not subjects of the United States and that we decline to model our policy to suit the views and interests of American traders, the better for himself and us. His threats of retaliatory measures are all Yankee bunkum, and he knows it. New York is more dependent upon the trade of Canada and the West Indies than is its trade on that of New York.

To talk of penalizing our cocoa and coconuts is puerile. Both of those products are in greater demand than supply, and a market possibly closed to them in America (not that there is the slightest chance of such a thing occurring) would automatically create a demand to fill the void caused elsewhere. As for asphalt, we fancy the American owners of our asphalt rights are quite capable of looking after themselves. But we don't want to argue the matter with Mr. John Foster Dulles, but merely to politely invite him to mind his own business, and in future to air his views in the more congenial columns of the American Press.

The United States look with an anxious eye on

the British West Indies, as they do on Canada, the country which is now attracting the best citizens of the States as fast as they can hurry across the border. They covet their neighbor's vineyard, and they know the old and trite saying that trade follows the flag, which they shrewdly interpret also that the flag follows trade. They see that trade slipping from their grasp and they begin to bluster. We can afford to smile, but we cannot afford to forget the object lesson given by Mr. Taft's recently published letter as to the result he looked for had the Laurier Ministry succeeded in effecting the Reciprocity Treaty which would have been the death blow to Imperial Preference, and perhaps to the Empire itself. When people talk of Reciprocity with America let them not forget that it means, in the eyes of America, absorption. We don't want to be absorbed, least of all by the United States, and Mr. John Foster Dulles may just as well understand this at once.

The Mirror, in expressing the sentiment which prevails in Trinidad, gives some very pointed lessons to the Canadian advocates of the Taft-Flelding Agreement. Not the least is the reminder that had the Reciprocity Treaty been effected it would have been the death blow to Imperial Preference. The agreement with the West Indies is the forerunner of a further extension of the trade alliance between Canada and the Sister Dominion. Mr. Foster, when he visits Australia, and negotiates complete negotiations to give a preference of 23.13 per cent. to the goods of each country in the markets of the other. The basis of an understanding with New Zealand has already been agreed upon. A reciprocal preference with the Union of South Africa will shortly come up for consideration. The whole trend of events in their effect upon Imperial trade, as well as upon Imperial Naval Defence, is making towards a closer union for protection between the component parts of the Empire.

## ARMED MERCHANTMEN.

(The Globe, London, Eng.)

The Canadian Minister of Marine had much that was interesting to say to the deputation from the Imperial Maritime League which waited upon him yesterday. One of the chief preoccupations of all parts of the Empire in time of war must always be the protection of the food and trade routes which lead towards its centre, since we know that they would almost certainly be strenuously attacked by the enemy.

Our good friends, the Germans, have organized an admirable, if not very magnificent, system, under which, on the declaration of war, their merchantmen become warships. The captain produces his commission, the guns appear from the hold, the war-flag is hoisted, and the peaceful trader has suddenly become a dangerous cruiser. We must do the same, and, with a little ingenuity, we can do it better than our rivals. Many of our great liners already carry an armament, useless, indeed, against ironclads, but most efficient against unarmed merchant ships. Moreover, they have the heels of most things that use the sea, and could overtake nine converted merchantmen out of ten. They are something to begin with, but we ought to encourage the less magnificent of the liners of the Red Duster to keep a gun or two in the hold and a naval commission in the master's cabin.

To make liners or tramps as effective as possible there must be, as Mr. Hazen pointed out, stores of ammunition at the British ports between which they ply. They should take up their duties at the earliest possible moment after the declaration of war, and be ready to defend themselves and their cargoes, and give a little attention as well to the converted merchantmen flying the other flag. But if any use is to be made of the tramp it is imperative that her men should be mainly British. Converted or not, she is of little value if manned almost entirely by dagoes.

## THE MISTRESS OF THE AIR.

While there appears to be some disposition on the part of Germany to dispute Great Britain's long established claim to be Mistress of the Seas, it is worth noting that no nation has yet appeared which has claimed to rival France as the Mistress of the Air in the practice of aviation. France has 208 avions, or military aeroplanes ready for use, and a grand total of 234 machines built or building. They are divided into thirteen squadrons, or squadrons, eight field and five garrison squadrons. The military aviation unit is a squadron of eight avions in three sections—monoplanes, biplanes and multiplanes—plus a reserve section of four avions. The war office has at its disposal 344 avions, comprised in thirty-two squadrons, and it is stated that France's total at the end of 1912 will be between 500 and 600 machines built and building. The French rate of progress is an increasing ratio, with the distinct intention of that country to produce within the next three or four years a fleet of from 2,000 to 3,000 aeroplanes fully equipped and officered for war purposes. France, in order to operate the aerial fleet, has an air regiment of 2,536 officers and men. There are now twenty-six military aviation centres, and Calais, which is strategically important, probably will yet be made a centre for naval aviation. The Republic shows no disposition to relinquish the lead she holds in the effort to perfect the science of flight.

## Current Comment

(Ottawa Journal.)

Earl Grey went to Scotland recently to unveil the great memorial on Table Mountain to Cecil Rhodes. Dominion Day came with Lord Grey on the steamship Edinburgh Castle in mid-ocean, and was celebrated by sports and a concert at which the ex-Governor General of Canada presided and Lady Grey presented the prizes. The health of the Dominion was drunk by all on board at Lord Grey's charge—and it was champagne for all but the teetotalers. Lord Grey keeps a warm corner of his heart for this country.

(Winnipeg Tribune.)

There are some things which will not permit of reference to any international arbitration court. And Germany's increasing economic pressure from within is one of them. When that pressure reaches a certain point something is going to burst. And that something will be European peace. Against that moment Great Britain must be on guard, ready and prepared to maintain what it holds, at whatever cost.

(Campbellville, Ky., News-Journal.)

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## IGNORANCE OF THE FLAG

Union Jack is for Use Throughout the Empire—Red Ensign Only Authorized for the Merchant Marine.

(From Canadian Defence.)

The discussion in the Canadian press regarding the official statement issued by the Colonial Secretary as to the use of the Flag, has revealed a deplorable ignorance among newspaper editors. One British Columbia politician complained bitterly that the people were not to be allowed the use of the "Canadian Flag."

The editor said that Australia and New Zealand had their distinctive flags, and why should not Canada have hers also? The particular flags of Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Newfoundland, like the special flag of the West Indies, has been authorized for the convenience of local merchant marine, just as the red ensign with the particular cross of St. George, St. Andrew, and St. Patrick, and signifies the highest ideals, the noblest traditions, and the loftiest sentiments of the British race.

The flag of the British Empire is the Union Jack. Most people call the ensign the Union Jack, this of course is a mistake. The Union Jack is the flag for use on land in Great Britain, in all Dominions, colonies, and dependencies of the British Empire.

It is the one flag that embodies in its folds its proper proportion of red, white and blue, and it represents the union of the world's redoubtable St. Andrew, and St. Patrick, and signifies the highest ideals, the noblest traditions, and the loftiest sentiments of the British race.

The Union Jack represents Imperial unity in spirit, if not in fact. It makes no distinction between those born in the British Isles, or those born overseas. It is the flag of the highest in the modern world. Therefore, Canadians should be glad that they have the privilege of being under the Union Jack and also to consider all the privileges that belong to British citizenship.

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## The News in Short Meter

Gets Big Price for Farm.  
It is reported that Thomas M. Davidson, of St. John, has sold his farm to English capitalists through Allison and Thomas, for the sum of \$100,000. The property which is rectangular in shape, stretches from the junction of the Lower Loch Lomond Road and the Black River Road, extending back an area of 100 acres, with a very long frontage on the Lower Loch Lomond Road. There are 110 acres in the farm, all cleared, and also considered particularly valuable for subdivision purposes.

Meeting at Westfield.  
The meeting held at Westfield Monday evening for the purpose of discussing the building of the new wharf at Public Landing and also to consider the questions of having a rural mail delivery and dredging work done at the mouth of the Nepesee, was largely attended. While many were in favor of the mail delivery between South Bay and Blenheim, still the scheme had some opponents, since it is understood that the establishment of the delivery would result in the closing away with the post office at Ingleside.

ROSE CONFESSES HIS PART IN GRAFT... Submits Written Statement of His Duties as Collector for New York Police Ring--Two Arrests at Spencer, Mass.--May be "Leftie Louie" and "Gyp the Blood."

New York, N. Y., Aug. 6.—"Bald Jack" Rose, the shadowy figure whose testimony was chiefly based in the indictment of Police Lieut. Chas. Becker on the charge of instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, today furnished District Attorney Whitman with a written statement disclosing in detail the history of his relations with Becker as one of the police officers' alleged graft collectors.

Hon. G. H. Perley Proved His Worth Capable Minister as Acting Premier During Absence of Mr. Borden and Mr. Foster—Third in Seniority.

Reason for Assignment. Referring to a statement in an evening paper to the effect that he had made an assignment yesterday, A. J. Solloves informs The Standard that he assumed on account of the failure of R. S. Crawford and Co., of Yarmouth, who were not manufacturers, but in the retailing of hardware and building materials.

When a rich man goes into politics for a career he will perform certain kinds of work which it would be unfair to ask, and wrong to accept from a man without private means. The laborer is worthy of his hire, but there is some labor which cannot be hired for money.

At the time Mr. Borden went to some pains to make it known that his resignation was not intended to be the announcement of a resignation. Here before cabinet ministers without portfolio have been somewhat lightly regarded.

But Mr. Borden who had spent part of his time as leader of the opposition in studying what to do when premier, had a definite view as to the action, quite apart from the desire to do honor to the capable chief of the party. It has dawned upon people that when the prime minister is away the post of acting premier goes by seniority. This summer Mr. Borden and Mr. Foster have been away—and Mr. Perley has been acting prime minister.

A Busy Summer. All summer Mr. Perley, whose residence is in Ottawa, has been the man in charge of the party in the provinces. He has administered quite a dozen departments. He has occupied the Prime Minister's office. He has kept the Prime Minister's secretaries quite as busy as healthy young men like to be kept in summer. He has convened council meetings, kept the routine business going, attended to several distinctly important pieces of business, and discharged the duties of the office in no ordinary manner.

Next, he must have executive ability, and it is a paradox of the present cabinet that one of the best executive men in the country has permanent charge of no department. Finally there are the ordinary small chances of conciliation in a way that takes away the breath of ordinary politicians and has as its result the business of politics on much the same principle as those who rule in the firm of G. H. Perley and Co.
