

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
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

A REMARKABLE CASE.

THE STRANGE POSITION IN WHICH A BRANTFORD MAN FOUND HIMSELF.

NEWS NOTES.

A republic has been proclaimed in Honolulu, with Sandoz D. Dole President.

New York lawyers say there is a strong possibility that Erastus Wiman may go free.

Mrs. Stollis, the Papal legate to the United States, has given a decision condemning the liquor traffic and approving the expulsion of dealers from Catholic societies.

Twenty banks and 80 leading business houses of Chicago have despatched a telegram to the Senate and House of Representatives at Washington demanding that the pending tariff legislation be terminated at once.

Debs, Howard, Kelliker and Rogers, of the R. U., were sent to jail in Chicago on Tuesday, 17th inst., because they could not secure \$6,000 bail each.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., July 23.—A Commission of Royalist statesmen arrived from Honolulu on Saturday on the steamer Rio de Janeiro, en route to Washington to see President Cleveland and obtain from him an explicit answer to the question whether he will do anything more or not to redress the alleged wrong done to Queen Liliuokalani and the Hawaiian people by the action of Minister Stevens and what answer he makes to various protests of himself and her people recently sent forward against the republic of Hawaii. This commission is composed of three former ministers under the monarchy. Previous to the departure of the steamer a member of the cabinet being asked how the government would receive the communication, replied they were giving themselves no concern about it. If the Queen's friends wished to send a commission and make such inquiries the government would throw no obstacle in their way.

Before leaving Ottawa, Lord Jersey, Imperial delegate, spoke as follows: The intercolonial conference just closed marks an epoch in the history of the empire. What impressed me most was the feeling of loyalty displayed towards the mother land. Good results, including the Pacific cable, faster steamship communication, and closer trade relations will surely follow the deliberations just concluded. The imperial government is deeply interested in this conference of the self-governing colonies. When I return I shall be able to assure the imperial government of the success of this gathering of colonies from all parts of the empire.

A New York despatch says \$120,000 gold were withdrawn from the treasury one day last week for shipment to Canada.

The three national societies of Halifax will give a banquet in honor of Lord Aberdeen on August 8. The Governor-General will arrive in Halifax on July 28.

The bill for the admission of Utah has passed the United States Senate without a division.

The Maine State commissioners who investigated the cause of the late terrible accident on the C. P. R., are of the opinion that the train was deliberately wrecked by sleepers at the western end, throwing the engine from the track and causing the collapse of the trestle. The railway company has offered a reward of \$4,000 for information that will lead to the arrest and conviction of the perpetrators. It is thought that the State authorities of Maine will also offer a reward.
