THE WORLD'S WHEAT CROP

Canada's Crop This Year Was
More Than 200,000,000
Bushels.

Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture,
Ottawa, September 25, 1911

A cable from the International Agricultural Institute, Rome, Italy, gives the official figures published there on that date concerning the production of wheat during the present season in Great Britain and Ireland, France, Russian Empire, Algeria and Egypt. These figures are new and appear in the Table hereunder. Revised figures are also given for Belgium, Hungary, Italy and India. The estimated production for the latter countries on September 1st, compared with that of August 1st, is given in bushels as follows, with the August estimate in brackets:—Belgium, 14,617,000, (14,054,000); Hungary, 192,691,000, (187,760,000); Italy, 192,170,000, (203,192,000); Tunisia, 6,625,000, (7,716,000).

The following table comprises these estimates (except acreage) together with those published by the Institute to date. For the purpose of comparison the figures for 1910 are also given.

TO ARBITRATE

LABOR DISPUTES

London, Sept. 26.—The Government has decided to appoint a Board of Trade Commission empowered to arbitrate labor disputes. The Commission will consist of twelve Commissioners, representing equally the employers and the employees, with Sir George Asquith, the well-known "strike-breaker," as permanent chief. Sir George represented the Board of Trade at the settlement of various strikes during the past year.

The Government will nominate the Commissioners in order to secure men of judicial rather than partisan type, but they will be trusted leaders. On the men's side, invitations have already been sent to Messrs. Thorne, Bowerman and Elcock Edwards. The scheme will be experimental for a year.

NEWCASTLE CONDEMNS PRESENT TAXATION SYSTEM

Town Council Endorses Ald. R. H. Stuart's Motion Demanding Right for Municipalities to Regulate Their Own Taxation.

Newcastle Town Council met in special session on the 28th ult. Aldermen present: T. W. Butler, John Clark, J. G. Keith, S. A. Russell, Charles Sargeant, Geo. Stables and H. H. Stuart. Absent, Mayor Tedolin and Ald. C. M. Dickson.

On motion Ald. Clark took the chair. Minutes of previous regular session were read and approved. Ald. Sargeant's report of the committee of the whole held on the 25th ult., was read, the question under discussion being the disposition of the \$30,000 debentures, for which tenders were received in July last. The Montreal Investment and Trust Co., to whom the debentures were then awarded had not taken delivery of them, it having been found impossible to get in touch with the people representing the firm. The committee recommended that all previous negotiations regarding the sale of these debentures be cancelled and that Town Clerk be authorized to advertise for new tenders for their purchase.

On motion of Ald. Russell and Sargeant, the report was received and adopted. On motion of Ald. Butler and Keith, it was resolved, That the Town Clerk in advertising for tenders require tenderers to give some standard bank as reference from whom their standing may be learned.

TAXATION

After reports were received and bills passed, Alderman Stuart brought up the question of taxation. He spoke of the great dissatisfaction with the present system evidenced in many quarters and of the great inconvenience and injustice of the provincial law whereby improvements on personal property and income must be assessed at the same rate as land and one-sixth of the total taxes must be raised by a poll tax. The assessors appointed by the authorities having no choice in the matter. There was a growing demand for a change, but no municipality could make any improvement in its tax system without first obtaining special authority therefrom from the Legislature.

This question of taxation was to come up in the approaching Convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities, and it would be wise for this Council to make a pronouncement thereon before the meeting of the Union. He would therefore, in order that, by carrying to the Legislature, either singly or in co-operation with other municipalities or with the Union, a demand for freedom for each municipality to regulate its own tax system, the first step might be taken in bringing about in New Brunswick a comprehensive and radical improvement in the methods of raising municipal revenues, make the following motion.

Resolved, That this Town Council of the Town of Newcastle prepare (or co-operate with the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities or any County, City or Town in said province in preparing) a bill for the next session of the Legislature providing that any County, City or Town in the province of New Brunswick shall, upon a majority vote of its qualified ratepayers have the power to reduce or abolish within its jurisdiction taxes on polls, improvements, personal property and income, or any one or more of these, and raise its revenue by means of a land tax with or without a poll tax and with or without a system of business licenses.

Ald. Butler in seconding the motion denounced the present system of taxation as a penalizing process. As money cannot be easily taxed, people with cash put it in the banks instead of using it to build, for as soon as one builds down comes the tax-payer. On the other hand the holder of idle

NEWCASTLE

LABOR REPORT

In the September issue of the Labor Gazette, Mr. James Falconer, correspondent for Newcastle District, reported as follows:

There was little change in the labor market; every branch of business was extremely quiet. At the present time there is only one new house in course of erection, which will cost from nine to ten thousand dollars when completed. Outside of that there are only a few barns being erected and general repairs being done. Every other branch is quiet.

AGRICULTURE

Farmers have been busy for some time. They are through haying and the crop was a fairly good one, not quite equal to last year, but is about 90 per cent. Last year was extra good. Every farmer is now busy harvesting and the crop is a good one; wheat is good but not so much sown in this section. Oats are a full crop if not a little above the average. Potatoes are looking fine and if there is no rot will be a full crop, turnips and other root crops are fine.

FISHING

Fishing has not been up to the average, at least not quite up to last year, with the exception of mackerel, which has been plentiful and of fine quality.

LUMBERING

The sawmills are still running full time, but there is no demand for lumber. Logs were sold for \$3.50. For a long time they had been bringing from \$10 to \$12 a thousand. This will lessen the winter operations and there will be fewer men employed in the lumber camps.

PARTICULAR TRADES

Bricklayers and masons had a very quiet summer. Carpenters were not quite as busy, as there is a little doing in their line. Painters were fairly busy. Plumbers and steam fitters are now busy preparing for the winter.

THE POWER OF SYMPATHY.

Mother's Toe Union - Habit of Constant Reproof.

Although conscious of the power of sympathy, many loving but over-zealous mothers not only forget to show affection but form a habit of constant reproof. Naturally enough, the children, unless exceptionally callous to their surroundings, become sulken and resentful. How can they realize that the nagging is an expression of anxious affection? When Johnny comes rushing into the house full of enthusiasm over some new play or new idea, and eager to tell his plans, such a mother exclaims, "How many times have I told you to wipe your feet before you enter the door?" The greetings fills his enthusiasm, and hurt and wounded he draws back into himself, and will not again expose himself to such a snub. He confides in her less and less as he grows older, and she wonders why.

There is sound psychology in the statement that if you believe a man is honest he will be honest; that if you trust a young man he will prove trustworthy; that if you praise a child he will deserve praise. Benjamin West's mother kissed her boy when he showed his drawings to her; and the boy, when grown to manhood, said that her kiss made a painter of him.

A RAVENOUS INDUSTRY.

How the Paper Makers Are Destroying the Forests of the United States.

The forests of the United States now cover 550,000,000 acres, or about one-fourth of the area of the country. Forests publicly owned contain one-fifth of all timber standing. The timber privately owned is not only less in quantity but is of a lower grade than the public lands.

Forestry is not practiced on 70 per cent of the forests publicly owned and on less than 1 per cent of the forests privately owned, or on only 18 per cent of the total area of the forests.

The original forests of the United States contained timber in quantity and variety far beyond that upon any other area of similar size in the world. They covered 820,000,000 acres with a stand of not less than 5,200,000,000,000 board feet of merchantable timber, according to present standards of use. There were five great forest regions—the northern, the southern, the central, the Rocky Mountain and the Pacific.

The present rate of cutting is three times the annual growth of the forests of the United States. The great pineeries of the Lake States are nearing exhaustion and great tracts have been made into pulp lands. The valuable timber throughout all parts of the country.

The heavy demands for timber have been rapidly pushing the great centers of lumber industry towards the South and West. In consequence, the State of Washington has led for several years in lumber production, followed in order by Louisiana, Texas, Mississippi, Wisconsin and Arkansas. In 1908 the production of yellow pine lumber amounted to eleven and one-quarter billion feet; the Douglas fir of the Northwest held second place, with three and two-thirds billion feet; while white pine came third, with three and one-third billion feet.

The annual cut from the forests, including waste in logging and in manufacturing, is 20,000,000,000 cubic feet of wood.

There is used in a normal year 20,000,000,000 cubic feet of wood, 40,000,000,000 board feet of lumber, 118,000,000,000 feet of shingles, 1,500,000,000,000 feet of siding, 1,500,000,000,000 feet of heading, nearly 600,000,000 barrel hoops, 3,000,000,000 cords of native pulp wood, 165,000,000 cubic feet of round mill timbers and 1,250,000 cords of wood for distillation.

In 1909 4,002,000 cords of wood were used in the manufacture of paper, of which 794,000 cords were imported from Canada. The demand for pulp is making a severe drain on the spruce forests, which furnish the principal supply. The Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture is conducting investigations to determine what other woods, such as scrub pine, white fir, tamarac and the like, can be successfully used. A large drain upon forest resources is made by the demand for railroad ties, of which 123,754,000, equivalent three and three-quarters billion board feet, were used in 1909. White oak, hitherto the chief source of supply, is not plentiful enough to meet the demand indefinitely, and in many parts of the country the supply of chestnut, cedar and cypress is dwindling; however, seasoning and treating methods are being found, largely through the work of the Forest Service, by which cheaper and more plentiful woods, such as lodgepole pine in the Northwest and locust in the South, are made fit for use as ties. Timber to the amount of two and one-half billions feet was used in 1907 for mine timbers. A great saving has been effected in the naval stores industry, also largely through the work of the Forest Service, by the production of the so-called "cup" system of terpenes in place of the old destructive system of "boiling." The new systems insure a larger product of better quality and prolong the life of the longest pine forests upon which the industry depends.

AUSTIN, PA., DESTROYED BY FLOOD AND FIRE

A Patched Dam Breaks and Wrecks the Place Killing One Hundred and Fifty People.

Austin, Pa., Oct. 1.—Austin, a busy mill town of 3000 people, is torn to pieces by water and eaten by fire. Some 400 houses, a score of business blocks, three churches, and several large lumber mills were wrecked, and three miles further down the river at Costello, there are the ruins of more than fifty buildings.

The loss of life at Costello, where the residents had more warning, is believed to be but three. Property loss in the valley is estimated at upwards of \$5,000,000. After the flood fire broke out and finished the destruction.

The immediate scene of the obliteration of Austin covers an area three-eighths of a mile wide and one and three-quarter miles long. This comprises the business section and the valley residence portion.

Nearly a mile above stood the mammoth concrete dam of the Bayless Paper & Pulp Company, people perished.

ONLY PATCHED LAST YEAR

Repairs last spring had consisted of a patch of cement fourteen feet square. One of the several sections yesterday began at that patch. The Bayless dam was examined by experts over a year ago and certain recommendations were made looking to its safety. An inquiry will be held this week. In Austin about 150 people perished.
