I held Bruce up and called, Ferguson to get a doctor, which he did ab. 5 minutes after the blow, was struck. This was between 4 and 5 in the afternoon. Dr. Price, was got by Ferguson. I helped Bruce into the wagon but did not go be the hospital. I saw him at the hospital later, about 8 p. in Hessemed to be conscious when he was in the store, but he appeared to be askeep when I saw him at the hospital. His eyes were closed and I did not know whether he was conscious or not. Bruce, to any knowledge, said nothing after he was struck. I only saw one blow struck in the store, but Bruce had his hands up as if to ward off, another blow. It was a beautiful clear day and the sun was shining. As far as I knew Bruce was in normal condition. I did not hear him complain in any way. There was nothing wrong nor was there any wound round the eye before Bruce went into the store. I saw the wound made by the accused. It was bleeding and swollen. I did not examine the wound. When accused was arrested by the police he asked Ferguson and myself where Bruce was and I replied be with in the dospital.

Ses examined by Mr. Powell:—If first saw the accused in Ferguson Bros' store in the morning. I saw him again on the street about 2 p. m. and later between 4 and 5 p. m., when the occurence happened. I saw him coming up the street alone. I did not see him speak to anyone. He had his umbrella with him. He spoke to Bruce in an ordinary tone and did not, as far as I could see, indicate anger or excitement. He just asked Bruce into the store. I was farthest down the street. Bruce was sitting on the steps quite close to me and Ferguson was further up the street. I was facing into the store. I did not hear what they said, but could not help but see them. Witness swore that Bruce did not hit the accused. When I jumped into the store accused had turned round facing the street. I held the accused till I saw Bruce reel. Accused said nothing to me. My holding him might have stopped him for a second. I did not go to the hospital at first. I went there after tea. Bruce was carried out a an automobile. He was apparently asleep and I did not speak to him. In the store there was a large flow of blood over the show case, about the size of a man's hand, which continued till Dr. Price arrived.

Dr. Doherty came along the street and spoke to Bruce who followed Doherty into the store. Mr. McGinn then called out "Look," and I turned round and saw the accused just striking Bruce with an umbrella. I could not say what position the umbrella was in for sure but he seemed to have it in both lands, 'he point facing Bruce and the handle in his right hand. I could not say how he hit him. I heard no conversation in the store, but had they been talking above an ordinary tone I certainly would have heard it. It was somewhere as and one or two minutes from the time Bruce entered the store before I saw the blow truck. After the blow was struck I heard Doherty say, "Take that." Those were the words to the best of my knowledge. I was standing facing the street and McGinn was facing the store. When Doherty came up I could not say whether Bruce was sitting or standing. I was standing on the steps in iront of the collar show case at the front door. I could see right in the store by turning round. McGinn was standing more in front of the door than I was. The doors were wide open. I did not see anything the matter with Mr. Bruce's eye when ealthing with him at the door. After the blow was struck I saw his eye bleeding, but did not examine it closely. Blood was dropping on the show case. I went into the Lounsbury store and telephoned for Dr. Price. I happened to see him passing down the street and called him into the store. 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THE WORLD'S WHEAT CROP

Canada's Crop This Year Was More Than 200,000,000 Bushels.

Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, September 25, 1911

A cable from the International Agricultural Institute, Rome Italy, gives the official figures published there on that date concerning the production of wheat during the present season in Great Britain and Ireland, France, Russian Empire, Algeria and Egypt. These, figures are new and appear in the Table I ereunder. Revised figures are also given for Belgium, Hungary, Ital. and I'unia. The estimated production for the latter countries on Se. ... 1st, compared with that of August 1st, is given in bushels as follows, with the August estimate in brackets:—Belgium, 14,617,000, (14,054,000); Hungary, 192,691,000, (187,760,000); Italy, 192,170,000, (203,192,000); Tunis, 6,625,000, (7,716,000).

The following table comprises these estimates (except acreage) together with those published by the Institute to date. For the purpose of comparison the figures for 1910 are also given.





[Mr. Powell—"Long enough to kill a number of people," to which Dr. Pinsailt replied;—"and to save a good many too.") I was called by Dr. I.traam at 9 p. m. and saw Mr. Bruce at his residence. He was in bed, unconscious. Respiration was a little labored and hourdan. He had a dressing soaked with blood over his left sys. Br. Luman and I removed the dressing, examined the would and found the left cyclid badly swollen and a cut on the upper left cyclid. There was blood issuing from the wound, which we washed, and put on a new dressing. We applied an ice bag to the top of Mr. Bruce's head, not water bottles to his feet, and then I went ways. I did not make further examination of the wound or of the body at all. I saw Mr. Bruce' the next day, 22nd of September, in the same noon. He was then dead. I had orders from the coroner, Pr. A. Martin, to make a post mortem examination of the body of Daniel J. Bruce, I made the examination and this is what it revealed.—The body was in a state of rigor mortie, no sign of putrefaction, hypostatic congestion on the back of the body. No wound on the body except the cut on the upper left cyclid already referred to. This cut was 3-4 of an inch long and was situated at about 1-4 of an inch from the edge of the eyelid, the middle of the cut being about in a line with the external corner of the eye, half inside and half outside of that. 
