Ans: All horses must not be fed in the same proportions without due regard to their ages, their constitutions, and their work, because the impropriety of such practic is self-evident, yet it is constantly done, and is the basis of disease of every kind. Never use bad hay on account of it cheapness, because there is not proper nourishment in it. Damaged corn is exceedingly injurious, because it brings on inflammation of the bowels and skin diseases; chaff is better for old horses than hay, because they can chew and digest it better. Mix chaff with corn or oats, and do not give them alone, because it makes the horse chew his food more and digest it better. Hay or grass alone will not support a horse under hard work because there is not sufficient nutritive body in either. 
