FINE CHANCE TO LEAVE IT ALONE

The Moderate Drinker's Attitude Towards the vote on July 10—Many will vote for Prohibition.

Most men who have been accustomed to take a drink when opportunity offered have said that they can take it or leave it alone, and most of them are right. Because they can leave it alone and because they know a dry province is a better province to live in, a great many of them are going to vote for prohibition and against the sale of beer and wine on July 10. The man who knows anything about alcohol beverages knows that a variety of prohibition which permitted the free sale of beer and wine would be no prohibition at all, and that the only way in which the benefits of prohibition can be secured is by making it as complete as possible. When faced squarely with the issue for men will be willing to vote for conditions which they know to be bad for the community in order that they themselves may enjoy an occasional glass that is stronger than two per cent.

There is no question about the way in which the temperance folk will vote, and it is equally certain that those financially interested in the sale of liquor will vote the opposite way. The issue will be determined by the great class in-between—the voter who may not look with disfavor on the use of alcoholic beverages in moderation but who knows that moderation is impossible to so many that prohibition is the only sound solution of the problem which strong drink has created, and who are willing to submerge their personal preferences for the general good.

The men who have learned that they can do without the drink they once were accustomed to will face a dry future with satisfaction, because of the better conditions it will create. If a prohibitory act does not change them, they know that it cannot be changed, but that any form of prohibition is better than none.

Young Man of Nineteen Loses Life While Bathing Sunday

The citizens of Waterville and surrounding country were deeply saddened on Sunday morning last when Cecil Prosser, eldest son of Moses and Mrs. Prosser was drowned in the millpond while bathing.

He is company with a boy companion and a younger brother had been absent from the home only a short time when the alarm was given by his brother that Cecil was drowning. The body was located and brought to the surface in about an hour's time and everything done to resuscitate him, but life was extinct.

The funeral held Monday afternoon was attended by one of the largest crowds of sympathizing friends from all over the country. The millmen with whom he worked marching in a body to the grave, as also did his soldier comrades dressed in uniform. Rev. G. A. Gibson and Rev. C. N. Barton were the officiating clergymen and spoke many consoling words to the bereaved ones.

The casket was literally covered with fragrant flowers sent by friends, and most conspicuous was a beautiful pillow of roses and carnations from his fellow workers in the mill.

Cecil who was nineteen years and ten months old, was a manly boy and of a very quiet temperament. He was one of the first to respond to his country's call in the late war, and although under age and with delicate health he persisted and reached England where he did "his bit" faithfully and well.
