ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT REPAIRS

Committee Authorized to Proceed With Work—New Power Rate Promised.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors McKay, Ingram, Matthews, Bissett, Devereaux, and the minutes of previous meeting were read and approved. John C. McKay wrote asking that a tax on estate mortgages by the trustee be reduced, as he could not get a buyer for less than the assessed value. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee. The invitation to a social dance at the opening of the new Fire Hall to be held Tuesday, April 6th, was read. Councillor Devereaux moved that invitation be accepted.—Carried. Tenders for printing the Town's annual report were opened and the contract awarded the Tribune its tender being the lowest. Various department reports were submitted and the accounts ordered paid. Councillor Devereaux read a communication from Chief Adams asking that another officer be appointed for the summer months. Councillor Devereaux said that he thought that for the summer months another officer was necessary. The local police did a large amount of work under the prohibition act, for which they received not a cent. The amount of the prohibition act for the month of March amounted to \$1500.00. Councillor McKay said that when the change was made last year it was said that it was a mistake but the two officers did very well. If a special officer is required for a few weeks of a month the Police Committee has power to appoint such an officer. Councillor Matthews said that if the local government get all the money for the fines then the government should put another man there and relieve out police of such duties or agree to pay at least a part of the salaries of the town police. Councillor Bissett spoke along the same lines. His Worship thought that the matter was worth looking into. Councillor Devereaux said that the police certainly had to look after the boot leggers and liquor peddlars. If they did not the town would be overrun with drunks. Councillor McKay moved that a special committee be appointed to recommend a course of action to the Council in order to have the local government pay a portion or all of the salary of a policeman to carry out the enforcement of the Prohibition Act.—Carried. Councillors Devereaux, McKay and Bissett were appointed such committee. Councillor Devereaux asked for authority to ask for tenders for suits for the policemen. Authority granted. Councillor McKay was granted authority to install gasoline tank at store. Councillor Ingram submitted the annual report of the Fire Department, which was received and ordered printed in the annual report. Councillor Matthews submitted the Annual report of the Fire Department, which was received and ordered printed in the annual report. Councillor Ingram reported that he had consulted the Town Solicitor for the granting of an additional amount to the School Board and the Solicitor's opinion was that the Council could not do this. Councillor Bissett stated that the pump had arrived. He said as there would be considerable expense to fit this for a belt drive, and as there was now abundance of water, he suggested that the temporary motor be returned. As a representative of the Alice Chalmers Co. would be here in a day or two the matter was allowed to stand. Councillor Bissett brought up the matter of electric power rates, and said he would deal fully with this matter at the next meeting. It was reported that the roof had been blown off the hose shed at the west end and the Chairman of the Fire Committee said he would have it repaired. He recommended that permanent hose sheds be erected at the building site if lots could be secured. The department had about enough tile to erect these sheds. Councillor McKay moved that the Electric Light Committee be authorized to procure parts to convert the Canada Foundry Co. producers into Smith type producers.—Carried. ILLUSTRIOUS SON OF RESTIGOUCHE

Died at Montreal Last Week After Very Short Illness.

The death occurred in Montreal on Thursday of Lieut.-Col. E. Botsford Busted, K. C., one of the oldest members of the Montreal Bar (for a brief illness) following a comparatively slight dental operation which developed into blood poisoning to which he succumbed. Lieut. Colonel Busted was born at Restigouche, N. B., sixty-three years ago, a son of the late Alexander Busted, and a grandson of the late Senator, E. Botsford. Following early studies at Restigouche public school he took his Arts course at the University of New Brunswick at Fredericton and graduated B.C.L. from McGill. He is survived by two brothers, Thomas Busted, Restigouche, and Frank Busted, Vancouver, and by his brother-in-law, Dr. Andrew Henderson, Powell River, B. C. COLD STORAGE ON Q. O. RAILWAY

Hon. Chas. Marcell Asks Questions About Necessary Arrangements.

By Mr. MARCELL:
1. Are any arrangements contemplated for the coming season to assist in the shipping of fresh fish, butter and cheese in cold storage cars from the Counties of Bonaventure and Gaspé?
2. If so, what are they?
By Hon. S. F. TOLMIE:
1. & 2. The Dairy and Cold Storage Branch of the Department of Agriculture has arranged for several years for a weekly cold butter car service to operate over the Quebec Oriental Railway from Bonaventure to Matapedia where it is transferred to the Canadian National Railway. It is intended to continue this service during the season of 1920. The Department of Agriculture has never arranged for cold cars for the shipping of fresh fish and does not know of any proposal that it should be done this year.

Committees Appointed and Many Matters of Importance Discussed.

A meeting of the Campbellton Board of Trade was held in the Town Clerk's office Friday evening. In the absence of the president, Mr. Joe Duncan, Vice-President, occupied the chair. The committee appointed to name the standing committees reported as follows:— Railway and Transportation. W. F. Napier, D. Champoux, W. H. Miller, John Harquail, B. J. Currie, Geo. St. Onge, W. C. Coonan. Finance and Audit. Joe. Duncan, P. M. Shannon, Alex. McLennan. Membership. P. M. Shannon, H. G. Allan, J. J. Bernier, F. E. Sheppard, Charles Goss, L. E. Renaud, F. J. Alciac. H. R. Smith, J. Begis and B. J. Collier. Bylaws and Memorial. W. D. Duncan, D. Murray, M. D. A. T. LeBlanc. Publicity. W. H. Wallace, P. M. Shannon, John T. Reid, H. B. Anslow, A. C. Belleisle. The matter of taking over of the Carquet & Gulf Shore Railway by the government and on motion it was resolved to send a strong memorial to the government in favor of the taking over of the C. & G. S. Railway. The suggestion was made that the Supt. of Railway Mail Service be written to and asked to have the Campbellton mail transferred to the Limited nearly on time. It frequently happens that we get Halifax papers and letters before the St. John mail arrives. Postmaster MacKendrick said he would write to the Superintendent about the matter. It was reported that two or three new industries were talking of locating here and the Industries Committee promised to get in touch with them. The matter of the procuring of the I. N. K. station lot for exhibition grounds was discussed and a committee composed of Messrs. W. D. Duncan, A. A. Stewart, W. H. Gray and B. J. Collier was appointed to act in conjunction with the Town Council and endeavor to have the railway department hand this property back to the town. Mr. W. H. Gray spoke in favor of making an effort to induce the Grand Circuit to have a race a meet and the project was favored. The necessity of a municipal home for the proper care of our poor was brought up but deferred until another time. Mr. W. H. Gray said he hoped that a big effort would be made to induce new industries to locate here. We had the shipping and other facilities and he was sure that if our advantages were set forth we could induce manufacturers to locate here. During the meeting a telegram was received from President Champoux, who was in Quebec stating that he had had a personal interview with members of the Quebec government and that they were very favorable to the bridge proposition. The meeting then adjourned.

MAN KILLED AT UPSALQUITCH

Was Helping Shunt Cars When Crushed—Lived About Three Hours.

Hector Harriman, engaged with Smith & Knowles near new mill at Upsalquitch station was fatally injured Tuesday afternoon. The body was brought to Undertaker Grammond and was forwarded to rest at Richmond this morning. So far as the Graphic could learn no one actually saw the accident, but it appears to have happened as follows:— A number of men were engaged in loading lumber on cars at Upsalquitch. The cars were being moved with a pair of horses along the siding when it is supposed deceased climbed up upon one to set the brakes, when a projecting deal used in loading caught him against the car as it moved slowly. The deal broke off, but injured the man so badly internally that he expired in about three hours. Coroner Martin viewed the remains heard the statements of the accident and concluded that no inquest was necessary and gave permission for the removal of the body. RECORD SEASON IN LUMBER OPERATIONS BUT ALL COULD NOT BE HAULED

The past season has been a record breaker in the lumbering industry at Restigouche and it is estimated that the cut is about fifty per cent more than any previous year. The weather during the fall and winter water made conditions for logging and all other operations favorable. The heavy snow covering the latter part of winter and in February delayed loading to the mills and now the increasing amount of logging roads has made it impossible to get all the logs to the mills as a large quantity will remain for another year. However if the drives carry out there will be log enough to keep all the mills busy.

(Continued from page 2)

System. There being only, upon vote taken in favour of the said amendment; the Proposer and Seconder thereof, the same was declared lost, and the MAIN MOTION carried.

The Secretary-Treasurer was instructed to forward copies of the said MOTION to Messrs. Kelly and Bujcaud, M.L.C. and M.L.A. respectively.

Moved by Mayor Appert, seconded by Mayor N. Cyr, that the following Resolution be passed by the County Council as follows to wit:—

"Be it resolved by the County Council of the County of Bonaventure now assembled that

Whereas the waters of the North West Branch of the Grand Caspédia River are working most seriously inland, dangerously menacing the combination Railway and Highway Bridge across the said river;

Whereas crib work is absolutely and immediately necessary to be constructed so as to prevent the said menace, and that it is of vital importance that the same be done forthwith so as to avoid most serious impending damages;

Whereas the said County Council do respectfully memorialize the Local Government at Quebec of the facts as hereinabove mentioned, and humbly pray them for an immediate grant from the Public Funds for the said purpose and work, to be forthwith put through this spring;

Further resolved that copies of this present resolution be transmitted to the Railway Commission of Canada at Ottawa, to J. S. Gordon, Esq., General Manager of the Quebec Oriental Railway and to J. F. Bujcaud, Esq., M.L.A.—Adopted.

It was moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Busted that:

Whereas the Province of New Brunswick have Statutory Enactments entirely prohibiting and preventing GUIDES belonging to the Province of Quebec entering the said Province of New Brunswick and acting as such during the Hunting Season;

Whereas under the present state of affairs in this Province the New Brunswick Guides are allowed to enter the said Province without any restriction or license whatever;

Whereas the said present condition of things results in an unjust and unfair discrimination against the Guides of our own Province, to their hurt and prejudice;

Therefore be it resolved by the County Council of the County of Bonaventure now in session that the Local Government authorities at Quebec be respectfully requested to take up the matter at issue under their kind consideration, with the Local Government Authorities of the Province of New Brunswick, so as to have the whole fairly and equitably adjusted for all those interested, and failing to have fair and just treatment for our GUIDES with reciprocal rights and privileges, that the said Local Government Authorities of Quebec do adopt the necessary proceedings so as to debar the New Brunswick Guides from carrying on their occupation as such in this Province;

Further resolved that copies of this present resolution be forwarded to Sir Lomer Gouin, Prime Minister of the Province of Quebec, Hon. J. H. Kelly, M.L.C. and J. F. Bujcaud, Esq., M.L.A.—Adopted.

It was moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Cyr that:

TOWN MANAGER.

In writing to the Graphic a Woodstock gentleman says:—
"I am enclosing a brief outline of the town manager plan which may be of some use to you in your advocacy of this excellent form of town management. I notice the Tribune today has two or three columns of balderdash on the subject and it may be well to republish the enclosed so that the gentlemen opposed may understand what this form of government really is.
It is to be hoped that Campbellton will adopt the plan and if once adopted will find it the best form of government existing in towns or cities, both large and small."

BOARD OF TRADE FOLDER.

The Tribune devotes considerably over a column in criticizing a little folder issued by the publicity committee of the Campbellton Board of Trade. While many points touched upon are open to criticism, it is hardly a subject for newspaper comment. Feeling that the learned editor of the Tribune might have many good suggestions to make, the committee in charge of the work had numerous proof sheets of the text taken and handed to members of the Board of Trade, one of which was given the editor of that paper for his views on the whole matter. It was then he should have given his suggestions and not turgid cold water upon the first effort made to advertise the town. Feeling that there would be numerous changes suggested the committee printed only a limited edition, and kept the matter standing, when revisions will be made and a new edition published.
Most of the points criticised had already been pointed out to the committee and the necessary corrections made.
All matters could not be dealt with as fully as the committee desired. It was first planned to issue a ten page folder, but so much material was submitted that it was difficult to crowd it into even the sixteen pages, and some of course had to be omitted.
The committee has received many words of commendation for their work on the little folder and have been encouraged to do for something larger and more elaborate, with illustrations etc., which may be published during the summer.



NEWSY ITEMS FROM NEARBY PLACES

Gathered by Graphic Correspondents—Contributions to this Column are Solicited from every District of the Bay Chaleur.

New Carlisle, Que., March 29—20. The Ladies Hockey Team of this town created quite a sensation Tuesday last when they assembled at 6.00 a. m. that day and proceeded to the A. Q. & W. Rly. station, loaded a pay freight having for their destination Gaspé where they intended playing the Ladies Hockey Team of that town the same evening. They arrived in Gaspé at 9 p.m. luckily the same day more dead than alive as the saying goes, and although the Ladies Team wished them to proceed at once to the rink they managed to get to Bakers Hotel as one of their ladies was very ill and they wished to get some refreshment and some sleep, so the rink was not opened until 10 p.m. Mr. Oray Calneoune acted as referee, and although New Carlisle had brought their judge of play with them, they were informed that they were in Gaspé (although the Conductor had previously informed them of this) and that they must conform to Gaspé rules, and that if Gaspé had their referee that was all that would be required. New Carlisle not feeling quite up to the mark just then let this important item slip, saying as they did, that if Gaspé had six LADIES for them to play against all would be well. First period started out clean and fast, Gaspé netted the first goal, but owing to offside was not counted, and Suddard made several good rushes from centre but had to change her course when Miss Hall rushed out to meet her, and Miss Caldwell grabbing the puck and passing it to the rubber went to centre at once as New Carlisle's first tally. The Carlisle made no fuss over their goal. Game kept on until Mrs. Dawson stirred the monotony by picking up loose puck and banged it into the web first period ended score 2-0 favor of New Carlisle. During the five minutes intermission Miss Flowers was engaged at her old occupation as nurse (having been overseas) trying to do something to relieve Mrs. Dawson, who had been very ill all the trip from New Carlisle and when the five minutes were up and she could not play without suffering, Gaspé LADIES simply refused to play second period five asses (New Carlisle had no substitutes.) Second period passed with trouble. Miss Hall could not find her stick and as Gaspé refused to stop the game the former set to examining the sticks used by the Gaspé team which ended in the missing property being found on the person of Miss Mackenzie of Gaspé. Of course it was merely an accident but it was also a fore-runner of further trouble and the game proceeded with Gaspé wild and successful and during this period the wild, wild women scored four goals using various means to obtain same, such as Miss Suddard proceeding from centre ice, tripping Miss Chisholm and sending her flying to the boards, and smashing in a goal while Miss Mackenzie attended to Mrs. Crozier. Miss Caldwell made a grab for the rubber, and when within a few inches of Gaspé goal, on her refusal to measure the ice on a trip from Gaspé, the latter used other means and when Miss Caldwell tried to add another point to New Carlisle's tally she found herself minus a stick which though not stolen was shattered to pieces. As Gaspé had no intention of stopping the game, Miss Hall made one jump for the room and presented Miss Caldwell with another stick with the whispered injunction not to let Gaspé know that it was New Carlisle's only spare stick. Shortly after this they were aware of the presence of a referee by hearing him blowing the whistle for time off, and, although Miss Caldwell clutched a whole stick, she found herself minus one stick, as she did not know how it happened, as during the time of the awful massacre New Carlisle was too thunderstruck to play fast, but kept pondering when peace was going to be signed. Second period ended 4-2 in favor of Gaspé. The second intermission was spent by New Carlisle Ladies in a state of gloomy despair, nursing battered and bruised shins and limbs. Although these twenty minute periods had been agreed upon, Gaspé did not want to play the third period at all as seemingly they were tired (although they had not spent the day on the train as New Carlisle had done) but who knows perhaps their consciences troubled them, anyway Miss Chisholm made a rush for the referee which ended in a third period being indulged in. Miss Hall relieved Miss Chisholm on the forward line during this period, as although the former had had her own time of it on defence she was not battered up that time like the others (her turn was to come later.) The last period started out swift and peppery. Mrs. Dawson, feeling better seized the puck, and making up for lost time, followed it up and sent it banging into the net. Referee took puck, and arriving at centre threw it down, and when Miss Caldwell came up to centre and was right on hand for the next centre up and grabbing the disc rushed up the ice and banged in New Carlisle's last goal. At the next centre up Miss Suddard got the puck but on her way to the nets encountered the wall, New Carlisle thinking she was hurt rushed to the rescue, and just as Mrs. Crozier and Miss Flowers got there, Miss Suddard not dead after all seized the opportunity afforded by the absence of the goalie, and sent the puck banging into the net. The next few minutes saw no scoring as when New Carlisle attempted another goal they found a mixture of six feet and three sticks in Gaspé goal. Miss Chisholm trying to pass the puck to centre was tripped up and sent headlong over Miss Hall, the latter woke from the land of nod some minutes later to find that she possessed a broken nose, a broken wrist and three face wounds, so I think was just as well that the game ended soon after that by the way things were going. New Carlisle found out only too late that the last period had been only ten minutes but since they were mostly always failed to the ice they could not put up a very good fight. Game third score 6-4 favor Gaspé. With such boisterous play only two penalties were served. In the first period Miss Hall and Mrs. Saini Crozier were censuring themselves in the corner down by New Carlisle's goal and as they kept on butting each other they were sent to the cooler for two minutes. Later another penalty should have been served when Miss Mackenzie tried to put it over Miss Hall by tripping her, but the latter promptly took the little girl by the back of the neck and gave her a school m'arn shake with the warning not to try any of that rough on her, but neither party got a trip to the cooler for this. When the game was over New Carlisle beat it to the dressing room to embark for the hotel, wondering what they had in store for them, but Gaspé gave them pressing invitations to go to the refreshment room as they had a treat for them. According New Carlisle took their seats with some difficulty as they had relished Gaspé's tea so far. While tea was being passed around I heard one lady saying she would not partake of that beverage as they had helped the brakemen at Cape Cove unless contents boxes of tea for Messrs. Robin, Jones & Whitman, and wanted no more of it. New Carlisle felt like anything else but eating just then and said so, but nevertheless they ate it out while Gaspé had their fill. But a surprise was in store for New Carlisle, for when the door opened they were being counted the door receipts were being counted for FIFTEEN (15) lunches. That was the last spoke in the wheel that Gaspé had used to treat the visiting team to, and on that bill being settled up (they had to pay for the six of their team, eight of Gaspé's team and last but not least the referee, they made a hasty exit, and went down to Bakers Hotel. Here they found good accommodation, and were treated very kindly by everyone there. Next morning they awakened at 5 a.m., and I met them all at the breakfast table, a jolly bunch in spite of their bruises. As a surprise awaited them when they went to settle up their bill as when they had to pay for a lunch for Gaspé the night before, as the clerk informed them that Mr. Baker had authorized accommodation for them free of charge. This was quite an unexpected piece of hospitality, as leaving out the pecuniary side of the matter, they were not prepared for any kindnesses after having been treated the way they were. I did not see the proprietor myself and I do not think they did either, for I heard them saying on the train that they were going to write him a letter of thanks when they arrived home. Department of Health, N. B. Nuisances The following, Respecting Nuisances, is Published for the Information and Guidance of the Public. Definition of a Nuisance. (Public Health Act, 1918.) Section 2, sub-section (0). "Nuisance" means and includes any state or thing dangerous or detrimental to human health or comfort through uncleanness, filth, impurities, gases, vapours, smells, dust, smoke, overcrowding, lack of proper ventilation, diseased animals, decay, accumulation or deposit, leakage, overflow, drainage, or anything that is, or likely to be, injurious to health. The following are some of the Regulations of the Minister of Health respecting nuisances:— REG. 130. No owner, proprietor, householder, occupier or tenant, nor any captain or master of any ship, shall commit or maintain or suffer to be committed or maintained, any nuisance in or upon any house, land, ship or property of which he is either temporarily or permanently in possession or command. REG. 131. No person shall commit or maintain any nuisance in or upon any public place, or any street; nor shall any person deposit sputum in or upon any public conveyance, street, or the floors, stairs, or parts of any building or ship. REG. 132. No stables or other place in which animals are kept, whether in urban or rural communities, shall be so situated that the drainage therefrom shall pollute, or shall be liable to pollute any source of water used for domestic purposes. REG. 133. In cities, towns and villages all manure from a stable in which any animal is kept shall be deposited in a manure bin or other receptacle so constructed that it shall be impervious to flies and rain; such bin or receptacle shall not at any time be completely filled, and shall be emptied not less frequently than each two weeks. REG. 134. No owner, occupier, tenant or householder, or captain or master of any ship shall permit the accumulation of any garbage, swill, animal organic material, decaying vegetables, excrement, refuse or other matter subject to fermentative decay, or rubbish, in or upon any house or premises or ship under his control. REG. 142. In cities, towns and villages it shall be the duty of each sub-district Board concerned, to have an inspection made of all conditions relative to each house and family in such city, town or village, as is laid down by schedule, at least once in every year, and as near as may be in the month of June. Nothing in this regulation, however, shall be taken as in any degree abrogating or narrowing either the scope or frequency of inspections at other times as may be thought necessary or expedient by such sub-district Board.

Dominion of Canada Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

- 1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more. 2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more. 3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920. ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1. FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A. CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2. Penalty Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable. Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

- Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters. Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in. Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation. Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties. Address INSPECTOR OF TAXATION, ST. JOHN, N.B. R. W. BREADNER, Commissioner of Taxation.

R. M. CURRIE TALKS ON INSURANCE

Speaks to Members of Kiwanis Club of Saskatoon—Insurance History.

The Saskatoon Star of March 11th contains a long report of a talk on insurance delivered by Mr. R. M. Currie, a former resident of Campbellton and a native of Restigouche county. Mr. Currie is manager of a very large company doing business in Saskatchewan.

"The past, present and future of life insurance was the subject of an interesting and informative talk which R. M. Currie gave members of the Saskatoon Kiwanis Club at their weekly luncheon today. Mr. Currie put up a vigorous defence for the insurance solicitor, who, he said, was badly treated by the public but never found a nuisance the day after the funeral.

"Most people," said Mr. Currie, "think insurance is a modern invention for the temporary cure of family economic problems. The best care for their young only as long as they live, but our hearts disengage more. The answer is life insurance."

Mr. Currie quoted the Shulamite woman who said, "My husband is dead, the creditor has come to take my two sons as bondsmen." He also picked a stanza from Burns to illustrate the value of insurance.

Insurance for everything was a comparatively recent development, but the principal on which it was founded dated back to the commencement of human history. Some people gave Joseph credit for the idea of storing up against a rainy day; others said Noah did it first. But it was certain that the Romans instituted marine insurance in the reign of Claudius. Cicero in one of his epistles had expressed the hope of finding a Lodoicean security by which he could retain the money of the republic without being exposed to danger in its passage. The Romans, too, must have had some form of life insurance.

Until 200 years ago there was little development in insurance. But then, like a real estate boom, it seized England. Lloyd's was one of the principal places where insurance was carried on. The London Times in 1768 said: "The introduction and amazing progress of illicit gaming at Lloyd's Coffee House is among others a powerful and melancholy proof of the degeneracy of the time."

Mr. Currie declared that Lloyd's had remained a gaming house, but that life insurance which evolved from this condition became the backbone of our financial greatness.

"It is supposed," continued the speaker, "that life insurance was in operation by the end of the 17th century. The value of insurance agent was not appreciated, as evidenced by his treatment at the hands of the public. The old agent of 30 years ago he said, was crude but he was honest. The doctor of 30 years ago as compared with the medical man of today.

"If the insurance agent is a bit of a nuisance, just remember what his experiences are. It is a compliment to you when six insurance agents call on you in one day."
