THE DREADFUL GRIP.

How a Person in Ordinary Health May Avert a Serious Attack.

Avort a Sorious Attack.

In a mild and recent attack, the victim being in ordinary health otherways, the trouble can be controlled by very simple means. If needed, an active cathartic; fect in hot water, made still hotter by the addition of mustard; drink freely of hot lemonade, wrap up warm and go to bed and sweat. In six hours commence the use of carriers in two to five grain doses every lemonade, wrap up warm and go to bed and sweat. In six hours commence the use of quinine in two to five grain doses every three or four hours. Keep this up for three or four days. If whisky has not slready been taken, a little now will be of great advantage as a shield against relapses. In relapses or second or third attacks lie the greatest danger from grip. And it has a peculiar tendency to return after once visiting a patient, and at each return its effects are more prostrating—deady. This is strikingly true when the disease has passed into a chronic state. The aged or feeble with low resisting forces, die quickly. It has yet to be learned what the final result or results will be in those cases with life forces sufficient to contend against a fatal result of the grip, but not enough to prevent serious inroads upon comfort and health. In many cases this feature of the grip is a perplexing matter. Patient neither dies nor gets well, but remains in that condition to relapse at any moment. Unexpected Death of Sir Morell

The Distinguished Doctor Dies from Bronchitis. All the Eider's Specie and Mail

London, Feb. 3.—Sir Morell Mackenzie, the distinguished physician, whose serious illness with bronchitis was announced a few days ago, died to-day. Sir Morell Mackenzie was born in Leytonstone, Essex, in 1837, and was educated at the London Hospital Medical College and in Paris and Vienna. He was the author of numerous publications on larnygological subjects, and in particular of a systematic treatise, in two volumes, on diseases of the throat and nose, which is acknowledged to be astandard work. Dr. Mackenzie was also the author of monographs on dipintheria and hay fever, and of an article on specialism in medicine, which appeared in the Fortnightly Review in 1885, and which excited considerable attention. Dr. Mackenzie was in attendance on Frederick III., the German Emperor, during the latter's last illness, and as knighted in 1887. He published, in 1888, "The Fatal Illness of Frederick the Noble," At the close of that year he resigned his connection with the College of Physicians. In 1889 he contributed to the Contemporary Review some cssavys entitled "The Voice in Singing and Speaking."

Testimony as to the Manner in Which Mr. Hyman's Friends Conducted It.

A good many innuendoes and false state ments have been circulated by Mr. Carling's friends with regard to the manner in which the last Dominion election was fought. But it is a noticeable fact that those upon whom the allegations are fathered are generally anonymous scribblers, who have not the manliness to come out into the open, as, for example, in the unfounded attack upon Geo. FARMERS' INSTITUTES,

Their Status and Their Requirements Fully Discussed.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISEN:

As you well know, the present list of annual Farmers' Institute meetings for January, 1892, have now been fully held and concluded on Saturday, Jan. 23, after lasting some seventeen days or about three weeks. During those Canadian January days the nine committees appointed by the Ontario Government, through the Minister of Agriculture, each of them consisting of three delegates, one an Agricultural Collegejprofessor, one a noted practical farmer, and one an appointee of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association, and a good practical man, visited 112 different points of central interest in Ontario, and at many of them two days' seasions were held. 


