Trouble on the Brazilian Border.

A French Mining Expedition Runs Against Brazilian Troops.

Kingston, Jamaica, Feb. 11.-Advices eceived here from Cayenne state that the acute tension between the French and Brazilians of Para, which reached its height in the Mapa district last year, has latterly been revived by the proclamation of St. Marie Delem as free port.

Now the tension has been rendered acute once more by the report that a French mining expedition into the Cachipour district, in the disputed territory from which it was agreed that all troops be withdrawn pending the settlement, had been met by a force of Brazilian soldiers, and been made prisoners, after which one or two of the French prisoners had been shot.



FIRE LOSSES, INSURANCE AND VALUES.

The total number of alarms received was 128, of which 33 were chimney fires, with no damage; 4 false alarms; 4 test runs; the balance, 87, were fires from which damage resulted. Compared with 1895, these figures show a decrease of 15 alarms, 4 chimneys, 8 false alarms, and 10 actual fires. There is also a decrease in the total losses of \$63,374 48, and the insurance and value of the property at stake was \$65,-860 and \$167,025, respectively, less than

the previous year.

The following distances were traveled by the apparatus and men in attendance at fires: No. 1 station, 128 1-8 miles; No. 2 station, 209 3-4 miles, and No. 3 station, 194 1-4 miles. Street Watering

May be Done Much Cheaper by City Teams.

Ratepayers Should Have the Option of Broken Stone or Water.

The second meeting of this year's No. 3 committee of the City Council was held last night, Chairman Mc-Callum being assisted by Ald. Hunt, Olmstead and Dreaney. Secretary Bell, Chief Roe and Market Clerk Wilson were also present.

Chief of Police Williams applied for An interesting estimate of the rela-

tive cost of street watering by contractors and by city work was made by Engineer Graydon, showing the great advantage of city labor. The cost of street watering in 1896 was as follows: Paid contractors, \$2,-304 50; water commissioners, \$2,500; inspectors, \$429 38; repairs to carts, \$150; total, \$5,383 88. Twenty-one miles of streets were watered, making an lege of Disciples at St. Thomas on average cost of \$256 37 per mile, deducting the \$2,500 paid for water, an average cost of \$137 33 per mile for actual work. The engineer estimated that if the present system is continued, excepting that the London Street Railway do one-third, or seven miles three times a day, at \$750, the cost would be \$534 78 greater. If the watering be done by the city teams and the Street Railway Company it would cost \$589 12 less than last year. The estimated cost for watering by city teams entirely is \$4,157 94, showing a saving of \$1,225 94. Some \$199 38 of this estimated difference is in the charges re inspector and repairs. All Mr. George Finnegan, whose stock city work shows an estimated saving of \$437 44 over the system of city teams and London Street Railway.
