

They got together and decided to ship fifteen million dollars out of Canada at a time when money was none too They called in all the loans they could, and sent that amount of money to New York to be loaned there. As a consequence the price of money at home has been unduly enhanced. The nation is starving for cap-Ital. Is it fair? Is it just?"

It is very desirable that whatever Is written regarding the financial institutions of the country should be strictly true. There is nothing more liable to be easily affected for good or evil than public opinion in financial matters. There is a cry in the west for local banks, because the branches of banks established there are not supplying the needed money.

What has caused the sudden strin-There has been expansions in every direction. Cities and towns have increased and multiplied, and these have a sound way of using more money if they can get it. In Winnipeg, Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver, and all through the west the requirements have been great. In the east nearly every branch of business has expanded and with it the need of money. Added to this is the speculation in land, the prices of which went up steadily for a few years. This is by no means confined to the west. It is equally true of the east. Lands idle for as long a time as the vacant lots of Winnipeg, suddenly became saleable, and the demand with it for more money. London, for instance, has a healthier and more rapid growth than at any time in 50 years. The money sent to New York is therefore only one circumstance, and it is quite likely too much is made of it. In the last report to the Government of the banks, as published in the Monetary Times, the total amount of call and short loans outside Canada is placed at \$60,629,114, while the deposits elsewhere than in Canada amount to \$58,421,023. The amount due from agencies and banks in the United Kingdom is \$5,729,317, while from agencies and banks abroad it is \$17,-

It is fair to point out that the banks having the deposits elsewhere than in Canada are the banks that have also made the bulk of the call and short loans outside of Canada, so that the charge that millions of the savings moneys of Canada are loaned abroad is not true.

Much is due the cautious banker. He may sometimes prevent successes. He oftener prevents disasters. 

#### WEYLER'S MEMOIRS DONE

The General Has Finished Story of His Rule in Cuba.

Madrid, Sept. 16.-Gen. Weyler has finished writing his memoirs of the time he was governor-general of Cuba, according to an announcement just issued.

Gen. Weyler was prominent in the Carlist war in Spain and in the Spanish war against the Moors in Africa. He was a great favorite with Valmaseda, who was his predecessor in the unenviable title of "butcher," as he was in his military and civil title. But Weyler's reputation soon outgrew that of his commanding officer and the stories of his cruelties during the ten years' war in Cuba survived the pacification of the island, and gained in terror, so that when he was appointed to succeed Capt.-Gen. Campos as governor-general of Cuba, the Spanish Government was accused of selecting for commandern-chief a man whose repute for atrocio inhumanity would scare the rebels into submission.
