Will Adopt Any Measures Deemed Expedient To Maintain Protectorate Over Egypt-Disorders Have Spread Throughout Entire Valley of the Nile.

London, March 21.-Owing to the grave situation in Egypt, and London, March 21.—Owing to the grave situation in Egypt, and the presence of Gen. Sir F. Reginald Wingate, high commissioner for Egypt in London, Gen. Allenby, the commander of allied forces in Palestine, has been appointed special high commissioner for Egypt and the Soudan. He has been given supreme authority in all military and civil matters, and will take all expedient measures to restore order and maintain the protectorate over Egypt, according to an official announcement. Unofficial advices from Egypt show that the disorders in that country have spread through the whole valley of the Nile from Cairo to Assouan, and are being largely directed toward the destruction of railway and telegraph lines. The Reuter's telegram from Cairo, under date of March 15, stated that Cairo had been quiet for two days, with the exception of an incident in the Seyideh Zenab quarter, where an armored car fired on rioters, killing 13 and wounding 37. The situation in the provinces, however, was reported to be worse. Rioters are reported to have removed the rails between El Wasta and Rekkah, and to have sacked the station at Rekkah. Portland, Me., March 22 .- The hospital ship Araguaya arrived today from Liverpool with a detachment of 783 wounded Canadians, including 12 officers, on their way to military districts in Canada. Most of them are from Kirkdale Hospital at Liverpool, the others being from the Warrenton and Lenham Hospitals near that city. Of the total, 734 are convalescents, 83 are in very

The Germans have not broken through any more than the British and French broke through in the offensive of 1917. Towns have been captured, salients driven in, prisoners taken by the thousands and the defenders battered down with weight of metal. But, after more than forty-eight hours of the most intense and desperate attack, with the supreme concentration of men and guns, there was not a note of alarm from the British commander-in-chief. Sir Douglas Haig. In calm phrases he sent hearty words of praise to the troops that were bearing the brunt of the onslaught. "I rely upon you to crush these attacks," was his stern military way of expressing his utmost reliance in our forces

-the English version of "They shall not pass. Even Berlin was not emitting the customary squawks of delight. While there were uncertainty and doubt and the knowledge that many square miles had been taken, the note of defeat did not strike the Allied peoples. So far there has been no hint of disaster as having happened or as impending. And this is regarded as the last determ ed throw of the Germans, born of desperation and the fear that in spite of purchased Russian peace the whole Prussian structure will crumple if the most decisive victory of the war is not won in the

For Germany this last drive means everything. The imminent danger of Austrian defection and re-

bellion at home has been considered. The knowledge that the Allies cannot be beaten by any ordinary methods has led to the final effort to dislodge the whole organization of the western front from its base, casting dismal chaos upon the Allies and securing command practically of bases which would render ineffective a real co-ordination of effort. But while the worst that can happen to the Allies, according to the most careful estimates, is the prolonging of the war for another year or more, worst that can happen to Germany is overwhelming defeat. That is, failure to crush the Allied forces on the west will be a more severe German defeat than if Allied forces made a serious thrust into Belgium or Northern France. The attackers must

And Germany is paying the price. Her reserves must soon be brought into the great strike for victory. Her men will fight as well as men can, no doubt; but while they may develop new offensive tactics, they will be up against a prepared defensive, with ample reserves and inexhaustible ammunition. And, greatest of all, the spirit of humanity's cause.

It will be a few days before definite solutions of the present advance will be given out. The tumult of fighting will sway backward and forward. The Allied commands will be playing their retirement safely. They will also look forward to the possible advantage of Germany going ahead too far. The unusual fervor of the Germans for this of-fensive may blind them to the possibilities of another Marne or a greater Cambrai. Sheer weight has not proved victorious in this war. Another Verdun, on such a scale as will exhaust the enemy completely, will force him speedily to advance peace terms that will lack the flamboyancy of Hindenburg's boasts. German victories up to date have been won by lack of Allied co-ordination, by treachery or by failure of préparation. If the Germans cannot be mastered in the present struggle, there is no possibility of mastering them The chances lie on the Allied side, and up to the present no note of alarm is even faintly sounded.

FOR NATION'S WELFARE

Play Is Essential and Leadership Alone Can Get Best From It.

Knowing his intense interest in having more and better supervised playgrounds for children, several citizens have asked J. J. Syme of the collegiate staff, to agitate a movement in favor of these through the press. Mr. Syme has responded with the following letter: responded with the following letter:
To the Editor of The Advertiser:
I have been requested by several citizens who are interested in child welfare and playgrounds, to open a discussion on the subject with a view of revivifying the movement here. It has been my pleasure to direct the playgrounds at Hamilton, where there is a splendid system in force, and I am glad to give to London any help I can. Playgrounds, as a whole, are a broad subject. Space permits me to merely touch on the benefits derived therefrom, and present as briefly as possible the main thought of the subject, namely, Supervised play in properly equipped playgrounds.

I hope that the thoughts expressed will be accepted in the same spirit as I give them, and thus help promote a wider and higher appreciation of play and of its value in education, and add somewhat to the sum of child happiness the world, especially in the city of London. Supervision Needed.

Supervision Needed.

In several sections of the city one may observe the efforts of those who in the past endeavored to establish playgrounds, but as they stand today they are a monument to the mistake of playgrounds acquired and operated without provision for supervising and directing. In all cases I know of, experience has shown that it is not desirable to establish playgrounds any faster than adequate supervision can be provided. Moreover, it shows conclusively that a dangerous tendency lies in sively that a dangerous tendency lies in the over-emphasis placed upon acquir-ing playgrounds, and the lack of em-phasis or even appreciation concerning adequate maintenance and administration after the grounds are acquired, and at the other end the relaxation of

Two Ways.

Two Ways.

Two Ways.

The playground movement is one of the desirable ways through which this demand can be met. But just a place, just a lot of land open to public use, will not answer the requirements. Experience has taught this and re-taught it. There is play that grows like a weed and never gets beyond the weed state, and it flourishes alike in the street and alley or free and easy playground. There is also play that has careful cultivation so that it becomes a useful plant. The latter kind is required to accomplish results worthy of efforts expended. Directed or supervised play is necessary.

efforts expended. Directed or supervised play is necessary.

Personal Supervision.

This means somebody whose definite duty is to direct and supervise.

Following the trail, we quickly see that this type of playground suggests something vastly more significant than the common reference to teeters and swings for little children.

The playground movement is just as much a part of the general tendency of modern people to escape from the armor

that are local and sectional in scope. All these interests should be tied up with the playground movement, and it with them, so that playgrounds might be admittedly a part of the broader purpose. Playgrounds are not a means in themselves, apart from other interests, but are just one expression of the underlying truth that has been a long time coming to be believed—that men and women are created to enjoy life, not to be slaves to their surroundings all the time; and to enjoy life, good health and physical efficiency is a fundamental physical efficiency is a fundamental need. Hence the use of playgrounds and

other open-air recreation facilities.

Planning and Thinking.

As playgrounds are likely to become a park, sooner or later, of the general scheme for civic betterment locally—to make better the appearance and living conditions of this fair city—it is important that there be comprehensive planning and clear thinking; a careful study of actual conditions, physical, economic and social, based upon the very best expert advise obtainable. It is necessary that simple means should terest. We of today must do something for the benefit of those who will live here 50 years and more from now, as well as for our own good. 



On April 27, 1910, the Rev. Robert E. Speer delivered a lecture before a missionary convention in Cincinnati on "Our Duty to Our Benighted Brethren of South America." This lecture had been previously delivered in Rochester, N. Y. On both occasions the Rev. Mr. Speer repeated his slanders against Catholics of the South American Continent, and quoted as his justification therefor a pastoral letter of the Archbishop of Venezuela and an encyclical of Pope Leo XIII. to the clergy of Chile. It took more than two years to force the Rev. Robert E. Speer to acknowledge that the documents he had used were forgeries. On October 18, 1910, this "outstanding figure in the religious world" was informed that Rome had pronounced the encyclical in question "a palpable fraud and forgery," and that the Archbishop of Venezuela had styled his alleged pastoral "a wicked and vile calumny, a coarse fraud." It was only on the 30th of April, 1912, that the Rev. Robert E. Speer, in a letter over his own signature, admitted the forgery. He made no apology for his unspeakable offence, but with a callous disregard for decency expressed his pleasure that "the matter has been definitely settled, not only by the statement of the secretary of the archbishop, but also by the acknowledgment on the part of the original inventor." Meanwhile the vile calumny had been given wide publicity by Dr. Beach, a professor in Yale University, and by Dr. Ward, editor of the New York Independent.

Thus the latest charge of mariolatry against Catholics rests on the authority of the Rev. W. P. Blakeney, who makes use of a "spurious" work; of the Rev. Robert E. I saw fastened up there a catalogue of sins, with a specification of the prices at which remission of each might severally be obtained." On investigation it was found that there was indeed a catalogue fastened to the door of St. Gudule's Cathedral. The inscription, translated, ran as follows: "A chair without cushion, one cent; a chair with cushion, two cents. On great festival days, a chair with cushion, four cents."
