LEGLESS VETERAN OF PRINCESS PATS COMMITS SUICIDE

John Hoar of Chicago Served Overseas With the Canadian Forces and Was Awarded Decorations for Gallantry — Takes His Own Life Rather Than Be Burden To His Wife When Monthly Payments of \$85 Discontinued.

New York, Sept 4.—A dispatch to the Sun and New York Herald from Chicago states that John Hoar, who lost both his legs while serving with the Canadian forces in France, committed suicide Thursday on receiving notice from Ottawa that his diability allowance of \$85 per month had been discontinued. He took this step, says the dispatch, to avoid being a further burden upon his wife, who had been working to support

Hoar is reported to have joined the Princess Pats before the United States entered the war. He was wounded while with his battalion in the Somme. Eefore going to war he had been engaged to Catherine Menrath, and when he returned maimed his fiance insisted on carrying out nise to marry him.

On Thursday, while his wife was away at work, the story runs, Hoar received the letter from Ottawa. Then he killed himself. He had been awarded the Military medal, the D. C. M., and the Croix de Guerre.

Anthracite Miners Want the Wages On Same Basis As Bituminous Workers.

SCRANTON, Pa., Sept. 3 .- Anthracite nineworkers through their union officers today appealed to President Wilson to reopen the wage contract signed vesterday, for the purpose of remedying the "inequalities" of the award recently approved by President Wilson. It is estimated that about 100,000 nine workers throughout the anthracite regions have quit work because, i s declared, they are not satisfied with the terms of the coal commission's

wages of the hard coal men be placed on about the same bases as those in the bituminous fields. The award of the commission gave the anthracite men increases ranging from 17 to 25% per cent, whereas the miners asked for a uniform advance of about 27 per cent for the several classes of workers. Union leaders insist the award gives the men virtually nothing more than the operators offered them last spring, which was rejected. A long telegram was also sent to Secretary of Labor W. B. Wilson, embodying the appeal sent to the president, and urging the secretary to exercise the influence of his office to have a joint wage scale meetoffice to have a joint wage scale meeting held to insure permanent peace and tranquility in the anthracite mining in-

The union has issued no strike orders, and union leaders declare the action of most men in staying away from the mines was done without any authorization from the organization.

Britain Rapidly Regaining Her Pre-War Commercial Position

London, Sept 4 .- Great Britain is well on her way to regain the com mercial position, which she held before the war, says the official monthly summary issued by the American Chamber of Commerce here. The hamber bases its opinion on the July returns received by the board of trade, which make the best showing since the war, Great Britain's ad verse trade balance being reduced to £8,000,000, compared with £34, 000,000 for June.

The present outlook is not so good, says the chamber's statement Some industries are facing a slump, and unemployment was rising slightly at the end of July. It adds, however, that the depression is thought to be only temporary, as the world is still badly in need o goods, and the readjustment of prices will increase the demand. Among the unfavorable factors mentioned, apart from the threatened miners' strike, is the decrease in many lines of their exports to the United States by which sterling exchange is kept down. Moreover, the rise in the cost of living has continued, notably as regards bread, butter petrol and railway freight.

Victim of Accident Believed To Be Resident of Flint, Mich. -Driver Misjudged Turn in Road and Ran Machine Into Ditch-Car Is Alleg ed To Have Been Stolen One.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Sarnia, Sept. 4.—As the result of a motor car accident today on the outskirts of the city, near the plant of the Imperial Oil Company, H. A. Blunden, said to be a Detroit salesman, is in a critical condition in Sarnia General Hospital, while his companion, a Miss Robinson or Watson, of Flint, Mich., lies dead in the local morgue.

According to employees of the refinery who saw the accident during an early morning hour, the driver of the machine misjudged a turn in the road and ran into a ditch, with the result that the car turned over and pinned the occupants beneath it. The girl was instantly killed, while the hospital reports that the man is in a critical condition.

According to the medical authorities, Blunden in a state of semiconsciousness, stated that the girl's name was Robinson, and later he stated that her name was Watson, and that she came from either Jackson or Flint, Mich. The authorities of Detroit, Jackson and Flint have

been wired of the accident, and efforts are now being made to get in touch with the parents of both the man and young woman. A FRUITFUL SOURCE.
Fourth of July wounds in the United States have become a fruitful source of lockjaw: especially wounds of the hands, due to premature explosions of fire-crackers. There has been a revival of tetanus from such wounds in the United States of late, especially on the last Fourth. Years ago their seriousness and the number of deaths brought about the suppression of large crackers, and the treatment of all Fourth of July wounds with tetanus antitoxin.

To make green apple sauce, wash the apples, cut out bad portions, remove stems and blossom ends, cover well with water, and boil as quickly as possible. The quicker the cooking, the betwith water, and boil as quickly as possible. The quicker the cooking, the better the sauce. When the apples are thoroughly tender, mash the pulp through the sieve just fine enough to hold back the seeds. A very useful device for this purpose and for catsup and tomato soup making can be made by any tinsmith. Get one to pierce the bottom of a good tin milk pan concentrically with circles of holes small enough to stop tomato seeds. Fit this pan over a large bowl or kettle and enough to stop tomato seeds. Fit this pan over a large bowl or kettle and crush the apple pulp through the holes with a potato masher. You can do it so completely that from a six-quart basket of apples you will throw away only a cup of skin, seed and tough seed case. Reheat the strained pulp, sweeten to taste, and boil ten minutes. If it is then poured into clean hot Jars it will keep a week or two. If it is poured hot, to overflowing, into sterilized jars, and perfectly sealed, it will keep all winter. It is delicious alone, or in ples, or with a deep biscuit crust, or in tapioca, bread crumb or rice puddings.

Just as soon as the green apples begin to fall we can have green apple sauce, and all the good desserts that the windfalls and imperfect fruit, and store the best of the apples away for winter use. crust, or in tapioca, bread crumb or rice puddings. Apples that will not keep, which otherwise go to waste, may be preserved in this way, and literally you can hardly have too great a supply of canned apple sauce. The flavor may be varied by the addition of lemon, or orange, or spices, such as cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg.

On Being Threatened.

ON BEING THREATENED.

When a doctor examines a patient

those precautions are.

When a doctor examines a patient and then announces that the patient is "threatened with pneumonia," the doctor is marking time, passing the buck, treading water, waiting to see what is going to turn uup. He is not deceiving the family, understand. He is merely playing it safe—for the patient and for himself. Naturally he orders the patient to remain in bed, and that is certainly best for the patient.

The reason why it is always best for one with any acute illness, accompanied with fever or fevishness, to remain in bed, is simply because REST helps to resist or overcome inflammation, exactly as REST of a broken arm helps in the repair of a bone. To needlessly work lungs, heart or any other organ when one is ill with even a mild infection like sore throat or coryza or any respiratory infection. Let us recall what those precautions are:

1. Keep outside the patient's five-foot barrage. In talking or laughing, the patient throws out an invisible spray of droplets of moisture which may contain the germs of the disease, and this spray ordinarily does not carry more than five feet. If the patient sneezes or coughs without covering nose and mouth with handkerchief or hand or mask, then the barrage may extend to ten or more feet, and it is unsafe to be in the same room with him. Anyone up and about who perpetrates an open-face cough or sneeze ought to be then and there punished for his ignorance and viciousness.

2. Never touch the patient or any other respiratory infection. Is flinging definance to nature and inviting trouble.

Another very good reason why one developing any kind of respiratory infection. Let us recall what those precautions are:

1. Keep outside the patient and it is always out an invisible spray of droplets of moisture which may contain the germs of the disease, and this spray ordinarily does not carry more than five feet. 



MARRIAGE LA W **CAUSES FLURRY AMONG LAWYERS**

Furore Occurs When Bar Association Favors "Uniform" Motion.

DECISION SNAP

Another Warm Exchange Over Question of Judges' Salaries.

OTTAWA, Sept. 3.—Once again the monkeywrench of discord was suddenly thrown into the machinery of the Canadian Bar Association this afternoon just as members were looking at their watches and hoping for an early ad-

The question that caused the furore was that of the recommendation that judges' salaries should be raised, and that they should not be subject to income tax collections.

This question came up at the morn ing session, and there was evidence that the convention was strongly divided on the question, and that there was a strong feeling among the mem-

In discussing the matter, Mr. Gregory, K.C., of Toronto, said that judges had just received an increase in salary. The

just received an increase in salary. The country was against any further increase. The association might better devote its attention to the present social unrest, the matter of re-establishing the solder, and other vital problems.

Makes Fiery Speech.

Hon. Hartley Dewart, Opposition leader in the Ontario Legislature, rose and made a fiery speech, in which he referred to the attorney-general of Ontario, and to Mr. Gregory as "regular faddists." They were in a judicial position, and had no right to throw the apple of discord into the meetings of the Canadian Bar Association in the manner they had. Gentlemen who accepted a position under the crown had no right to come here and dictate their views, which were possibly not of the greatest value.

After some discussion W. T. Sweatman's motion to refer the matter to a
committee appointed by Sir James

Alkins carried.

Uniform Marriage Law.

Just before adjournment there was another flurry. The members of the association, all but fifteen, had left the room to prepare for his excellency's reception, when Mr. N. B. Gash, K.C., Toronto, introduced his resolution on uniform marriage laws in Canada. This resolution, after a preamble reciting the facts, states:

"The Canadian Bar Association, convened in annual meeting at the city

the facts, states:

"The Canadian Bar Association, convened in annual meeting at the city of Ottawa, the third day of September, 1920, hereby affirms and records its opinion that it is highly expedient that a general law applicable so far as it is practicable throughout Canada upon the subjects of marriage and divorce should be passed at an early date by the Parliament of Canada, and for this purpose we hereby respectfully recommend that the Government of Canada take such steps before the next session of Parliament as will insure a careful study and investigation of the matter, and the framing of a well-considered and moderate bill upon the subjects of marriage and divorce for submission to Parliament at its next session; and that copies of this resolution be sent to the premier of Canada and the minister of justice, accordingly, and that such further or suitable action be taken by the council as will carry out the objects of this resolution and promote the passage of a measure under the powers of Parliament in that behalf."

Principle Adopted.

Sept. 3.—(By the Canadian Press.)—Canadian export trade in animals and animal products during the first four months of the present fiscal year shows a faverable trade balance amounting to \$59.071.148 representing 80 per cent of the total trade value of agriculture. The export trade, however, shows a reduction in value of agriculture to the total trade of agriculture of agriculture of agriculture. however, shows a reduction in value of approximately 50 per cent when compared with the exports of the same period of 1919. The trade balance in Canada's favor in 1920 was \$22,071,148, against \$62,528,573 for the corresponding four months of 1919.
