## OVER MILLION DOLLARS IN PROPERTY CHANGED **'HANDS HERE DURING MAY**

Surpasses May of 1920 by \$17,058—Total Consideration For First Five Months of 1921 Is \$3,094,039—Figures For Year Expected To Exceed 1920.

The Bouboulina was formerly the steamer Coronilla. She was built at Newcastle, England, in 1878, and was owned by C. G. Bouboulis of Spazia. Her registered tonnage was 1,312.





#### DECREASE IN NET **DEBT OF DOMINION**

The Income Tax Collections Assisted in Settling Up Obligations.

Ottawa, June 10.-Canadian Press.-A decrease of \$1,785,845 in the net debt of Canada during the month of May, as compared with an increase of \$26,813,586 during the same month a year ago, is shown by the final statement issued from the finance department today. The net debt of Canada now stands at \$2 .-316,804,802, as compared with \$2,318,-590,548, at the end of April, and \$2,-274,082,250, at the end of May, 1920. The decrease in the debt is accounted for by the fact that income tax collections during the past month totaled \$39,556,711, as compared with \$2,412,-802 in May, 1920. This year the tax was collected at the time of making the return, while in 1920 the return was filed for some time previous to the collection of the tax.

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

#### TECHINICAL EDUCATION.

tion for the Dominion it is stated that this year marks the most important advance made in industrial and technical education since the passing of the industrial education bill of 1911. The opportunities for instruction have been materially widened by the opening of new schools in a large number of centers, and by a remarkable increase in attendance at both day and evening classes. The organization has been strengthened also by a more direct adaptation of courses to meet the needs of workers and industries. The report states, however, that unquestionably the most important step has been the passing of the adolescent school attendance bill, which secures to adolescents of all classes more equal and adequate opportunities for training and, at the same time, tends to increase our national resources by providing the means for rendering available for more effective service a much larger proportion of the potential talent

It is asserted that in late years there has been tendency to give attention in discussing the means for improvement in education mainly to the varying factors which modify instruction for those at present

by John Clark, lecturer on education at Aberdeen University, the opinion is expressed that better educa tion and more education are an urgent necessity, national and democratic, and that it is required to mobilize the intellectual resources of the nation against the arduous times that lie ahead, when "parts" developed by education will be of more and more ccount.

Greater variety of method will be rendered possible, and will be adopted. Material refractory under one course of treatment may respond to a different method. 





LONDON, June 9 .- The finance committee of the League of Nations, which has been sitting here for over a week to consider what could be done to rehabilitate Austria, adjourned with the assurance that, if other nations will help, the Austrians can be set on their again. One essential condition is that the governments entitled to repa-rations under the Treaty of St. Germain and to the repayment of loans granted for relief purposes, should postpone their claims for twenty years, and that any fresh loans contracted during the first five years of that term should have priority over these ilens. Partial assurances that this will be done have been received afready from Great Britain, France, Japan and Czecho-Slovakia, and the committee is awaiting what attitude the United States will assume.



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
