OTTAWA, Feb. 16.-A special to the Journal from Kingston says: Forty-four years ago a prominent citizen of Kingston, who died two years ago, loaned a friend the sum of \$400. TORONTO, Feb. 15 .- Strong exception to the restrictions of legitimate business activities by what was termed paternal and meddlesome legislation, was voiced in a series of resolutions adopted at today's concluding session of the annual convention of the Ontario Retail Clothing Merchants' section of the Retail Merchants' Association.

islation was of a meddlesome and paternal character, and that the government has no right to interfere with the operation of a private industry, the convention directed that its executive consider asking the government to exclude the retail trade from the operation fo the minimum wage law. The section indorsed the holding



Financial Report For Year Shows \$21.806.28 Carried Forward.

ELECT NEW PRESIDENT

Six-Day or Longer Exhibition.

The 54th annual meeting of the Western Fair Association was held in the Tecumseh House with Lieut.-Col. W. M. Gartshore presiding for the last time.

The meeting was preceded by a luncheon, at which Col. Gartshore said that it had given him great with the Western Fair Association. but that although his responsibilities were just as heavy now as they were before, and perhaps a little heavier, he felt that he could hand over the direction of the exhibition into other hands and leave it in a good condition to succeed financially and otherwise.

The president then read the report for the year, which showed that the 1921 exhibition had been a decided success from every standpoint.

The total receipts for the year were: \$125,352,31, which included a balance from the year 1920 of \$28,-621.24 and the total disbursements to carry forward of \$21,806.28, without any liabilities.

George G. McCormick, chairman of the finance committee, in seconding the report, said that while most of the committees had stayed well within the estimates some of them had exceeded the amount stipulated, which in each case was excusable.

The Western Fair, said the chairman, was the only fair on the American continent that succeeded in retting along without outside help. managed fair, as a study of statistics would prove.

Directors Elected. The election of directors from the epresentatives of the 51 organizations represented on the fair board was the next item of business, when A. T. Little, E. S. Little, W. Mc-Neil, W. E. Robinson, George G. Mc-Cormick, J. H. Saunders, Pringle, Arthur R. Ford, A. E. Silverwood, F. E. Harley, Capt. T. E. Robson and R. A. Carrothers were elected directors. C. R. May, F. McFarland, John Bridge and J. H. Wilson were also nominated, but withdrew their names.

The new president also said that he thought that the honor of being president of the fair board should be passed around so that those who had served faithfully on the board of directors should have an opportunity of presiding before they left the board.



I am spending a few months in California, and thought per-haps the Boxites would like to hear about the San Joaquin Valley, which is a tract of country of large extent, lying between the Sierra Nevada Mountains and the Coast Range.

Of course, most of the leaves are off the trees and vines now, but just imagine one vast expanse of grape vines and or-chards stretching away as far as the eye can reach. Overhead the blue sky, and in the distance to the east the foothills and snowcapped mountains of the Sierra Nevadas.

California is a very large state, and a great variety of climate experienced within its limits. Just as in Ontario, it is much colder in some parts than in others.

California is a very fine state, and I would much prefer it to any of the middle west states which I have seen, but I still think that Ontario can hold its own with most places, and I have not seen so beautiful a river as the St. Clair since leaving Canada. Here peaches, prunes, apri cots, figs, nectarines, olives and oranges are grown, and especial The latter are mostly dried and shipped as raisins.

When you see Fresno on a package of raisins you will know it came from the San Joaquin Valley. Packing the raisins into cartons gives the women and girls here plenty of work, the other kinds of fruit in their season.







TO RAISE SEWER SERVICE CHARGE

City Engineer Brazier Proposes Material Increase in Rentals.

Residents of the city who are securing sewer service on the rental

At the present time the bylaw cails for a rental of ten cents a foot. mills to 14.813 mills. 


